About 250 men are working in the mines around Sandon.

The pay-roll of the Crow's Nest Pass Coal Co. for Michel for October was \$98,800.

For Thanksgiving Spokane got away with 50,000 pounds of turkeys.

It is said that "Billy" Poole has struck another fortune in the Nugget mine at Salm.

Electric power is being installed at the Silver King and Victoria mines near Nelson.

A committee has been formed to try and adjust the affairs of the Sullivan Group Mining company.

The concentrator at the Montezuma mine near Kaslo has been destroyed by fire. The loss is \$37,000.

The zinc smelter belonging to the Canadian Metal Co. at Frank is being dismantled and will soon be a thing of the past.

At Trail the refinery is turning out sixty tons of lead daily. A small amount of the output goes to Toronto and the balance to China and Japan.

Revelstoke is to have another newspaper, and the first issue of the "Observer," edited by E. A. Haggan, will be published on December 4th.

When in Spokane last week, Madam Lillian Nordica, the famous singer, made an offer of a million dollars cash for the new Paulson building. The offer was rejected.

Duncan Ross, ex-M.P. for Yale Cariboo is in Ottawa and it is stated he is looking for the vacancy on the railway commission rendered vacant by the death of Hon. Thomas Greenway.

Two Chinese women, wives of Russian immigrants, were admitted this week into Vancouver from the east without payment of the \$500 tax on the ground that they are the same nationality as their husbands.

The Victoria Times says that Dr. G. A. B. Hall, M. L. A., has secured an office in the Jewell block in Victoria next to that of his brother, Mayor Hall of that city, who is a dentist by profession, and is arranging to leave Nelson and take up his residence at Victoria about December 1st.

A gold refinery is being built at Ottawa, and the production of gold coins will soon be in order. Mr. R. Pearson, chief assayer in the Ottawa mint, has been traveling through the Kootenay and Boundary, with the object of investigating the gold resources of the lower part of the province. He will probably also visit the Yukon.

Shares Going Up.

Consolidated Co. shares have advanced several points during the past few days, and yesterday \$85 was bid for them and \$95 asked. There have been sales made at the bid price during the last few days. Holders of the shares are not inclined to part with them at present prices, as they are fully satisfied that it will go to par and beyond par within a short time. The increase in the price of copper is one cause for the advance. Another is the excellent condition of the mines of the company in the Rossland, Moyie and Phoenix camps. A third cause is the large production of ore from the several mines of the company. Besides this the smelter is reducing more than 1,000 tons of ore a day, the refinery is turning out about 60 tons a day and a good profit is being made by the industrial section of the company's assets. The mines and smelter were never in better condition than they are at present. The intention of the company, too, is in the direction of expansion and within the next year the quantity of ore mined and reduced by it will be considerably larger than it is at present. The advance in the price of the shares is based on a meritorious and solid and enduring foundation and it seems certain that they will never again be quoted at a less price than at present.

St. Andrews' Night

The thirtieth of November which has been celebrated by Scotchmen the world over for generations past, will again be duly honored by the "Sons and descendants of the Kilt and the Heather" in the good old time style in the Miners' Union hall on Monday night next in the form of a "Smoker."

The spirit of the pipes will be the signal for all present to be seated and partake of the good things provided which will consist mainly of coffee, cake and sandwiches served in regal style by a committee appointed for that purpose, and clad in native highland costume with heather trimmings.

The toast list will be brief, five in all, and while response is being made, enthusiasts will elevate their intellect to an appreciative point by a "Free O' the Crater," while the chairman "Mixes a was admonition due."

The program will be a lengthy one, and will be composed principally of national dances, Scotch songs, Highland flings, sword dance, recitations, step dancing, violin and Accordion solos, dialogues, horn pipes, bagpipes, clay pipes and Wind Pipes. Although arrangements have been made hurriedly, the committee who have charge of the entertainment leave no doubt in the minds of any one as to its ultimate success.

A Tragedy.

Had walls mouths as well as ears, the rotting timbers of many a shack lost in the overgrown clearings which speak dumbly of some premature and abortive effort to make a homestead in the wilderness would tell strange stories—stories of privations borne with fortitude, of sickness endured out of reach of mortal aid, of death in the ghastly silence of the cabin ten miles from anywhere, says the Vancouver World. A skeleton found in a bunk, the dim pages of a diary lying on a rough table, the other signs that woodmen know, these years afterwards may bring to light the bare facts of the lonely fight against ill-health ending in defeat, and imagination may reproduce the sightless eyes staring at the roof, the invasion of the shy little denizens of the bush no longer afraid of the tenant now so quiet, the gradual obliteration of the marks of human occupation, and the silent reclaiming by the forest of its own.

Sometimes there is more than one actor in these tragedies of the frontiers of civilization. In the case of Haines of the Naas there was a little boy, Haines, so we learn in the last budget of news from up coast, was a white man whose Indian wife had gone away for a time to visit her friends, leaving her four-year-old son she had borne with her father. Then came the heavy rains and the flood. Haines' boat, this only means of travelling to the distant settlement from which he obtained supplies, went adrift, and he swam out after it and brought it back. Failing, probably, to take sufficient care in the matter of dry clothes, he fell ill and realized that since no help could reach him in time he would die. The boy might die too—of starvation. That must be averted, if possible. So with such strength as he could muster and with the courage of the true pioneer, he prepared a quantity of food, told the child to eat it when he was hungry, but not to disturb him as he was going to sleep for a long time, bade him put a cloth over his father's face when father went to sleep, and not be frightened if he did not wake up as usual—and laid himself down and died. Four days later the little boy was found perfectly safe and well in the cabin with the body.

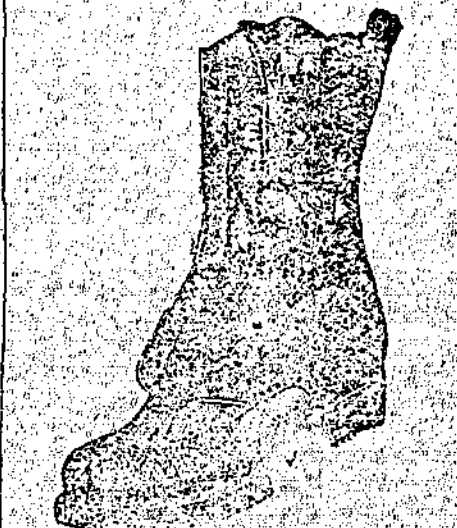
