Matthews, president of the Consolidated Mining and Smelting company, after spending a few days looking over the comrany's mines and mining properties in Rossland and the smelter and refinery at Trail, left on Saturday for his home in Toronto, says the Rossland Miner. During July and August the gross output of the smelter of the Consolidated company at Trail was \$985,000, as compared with \$635,000 for the same two months last year. The tonnage smelted in July was 36,-000 tons and August 44,000 tons, the latter being the largest quantity of ore smelted in one month at the Trail plant since it was established.

An addition is being made to the lead refinery building, which is 550 feet in length, and 50 feet tween the two places will be in width. This will give the refinery structure a total length of 600 feet. The older portion of the structure has a width of 50 feet. 




