Hot for Creston.

There will be a big delegation from Moyie to Creston next Monday to attend the Labor Day celebration. The special train will leave Cranbrook at 7 in the morning, and will arrive at Moyie about 3. Returning it will leave Creston at 9 o'clock sharp in the evening. One of the main features will be the baseball game between the Moyie and Cranbrook teams. There will also be a rock drilling contest, the first prize being \$25, and \$5 for a second prize. It is likely some of the Moyie miners will enter this contest. The Cranbrook band will be there. We understand the rate will be a fare and a third for round trip.

District Meeting.

(Contributed.)

Some eleven members of the East Kootenay District were at Moyie Thursday and Friday of this week. Rev. J. H. White, D. D., Supt. of Methodist Missions for B. C., was also present. Rev. W. L. Hall, B. A. B. D., of Fernie, chairman of the district, welcomed a number of men. Rev. J. F. Rutherford, B. A., of Creston and Rev. J. Wesley Miller, B. A., of Moyie, who have come from other parts of B. C., into the district since June 1st. Rev. G. T. Chenoweth, B. A., of Michel has just come from Toronto University with a gold medal, and is an ordained married man, whose wife is a graduate in medicine. Rev. Lee of Hosmer is a new man from England who has had considerable experience and splendid power as a preacher. Mr. Johnson now in Elko has just come from Toronto and is made of the right stuff. Another man is on the way to take work at Marysville and points near Cranbrook. Recommendations were passed asking for grants of money from the mission board necessary to carry on the work. All the towns made a substantial advance in the money to be raised for church purposes. The new brick church at Fernie, costing about \$18,000 will be ready for opening during October. This church is one to be proud of and being fully equipped to carry on the work of an institutional church we are hoping for great things for Fernie. A lengthy discussion took place on the question of the best methods for doing work in mining towns. It was agreed by all that the present method of the different denominations striving to outstrip one another was a great loss and a disgrace, and it was resolved that the time had come when a change should take place in some of the towns at least. A commission has already been appointed to investigate the situation and a conference with the Presbyterian church September 13th. It is hoped will help settle the question of churches in the towns of the Crow's Nest. For instance the Methodists have a scheme for building a church in Michel with a gymnasium, reading room and refreshment room which would cost \$10,000. This is the only way to handle it, otherwise there is no reason why a minister should waste valuable energy and time in a losing game. The ministers enjoyed their stay very much in Moyie. They spent a few hours on the lake and are a bright and cheerful crowd and mean business.

Joe. Wilson's Death.

Five hundred persons would be a conservative estimate of the number who attended the funeral of the late Joseph Wilson at Creston Wednesday afternoon. Mr. Wilson had been provincial constable at Creston for almost 12 years, and was liked by everyone. Even with the Indians in that vicinity his word was law, for they always found in him a faithful friend. Rev. Philip C. Hayman, vicar of the Church of England, conducted the funeral ceremonies, and interment was in the little cemetery near town. The Odd Fellows, of which deceased was a member, marched in a body and there were 42 in number. The Moyie lodge was represented by Louis Collin, Edward Hutt, Con Caser, Oswald McDougall and F. J. Smyth.

The late Constable Wilson was born in England 37 years ago. He was the first constable at Kuskanook, assuming office there in 1897 during the construction of the Crow's Nest Pass railway. In the same year he came into prominence by the arrest of a man named Doyle on a charge of murder, who was subsequently hanged in Nelson. From Kuskanook the late Constable Wilson removed to Creston where he has since acted as deputy mining recorder in addition to fulfilling his duties as provincial police constable. Death was caused by over exertion on the part of the deceased while out on a prospecting trip with Brock Moran of Creston some ten days ago, during which the heat was most intense, rendering the journey an exceptional hard one. Nephritis set in while the deceased was in the Cranbrook hospital, resulting fatally.

Creston Men Buy Park.

Creston Review: At last the business heads of Creston have done something definite towards securing a permanent park site for Creston. A beautiful piece of land near Erickson, which has all the necessary attributes for the desired object, such as shady trees, running water, a level expanse for horse racing and athletic purposes has been secured near Robt. Long's ranch. This will be fixed up in a few weeks, but it will not be ready, of course, for the celebration this year.

Times Good at Yakh.

Sam Benzie, manager of the East Kootenay Lumber Co.'s sawmill at Yakh, was in Moyie the first of the week looking for a house for his family in order that he might send his children to school. He will probably move his family here for the winter. His company is employing 75 men and times at Yakh are good.

not be attended to, more clerk should be provided to do the business.

The other day in Winnipeg J. Hill was speaking in behalf of the American settlers at a "banquet at the Canadian Club. He said: "Don't be afraid you won't get people. There is no other place on the American continent where they can go. But don't try to get people who will have to be re-civilized. It is a long and hard job to assimilate a foreign population," continued Mr. Hill. "Those who come from our western states speak your language and know your institutions. I am sure they will quite rapidly fall into your local municipal organizations and as a rule you can collect a judgement from them." And Hill is right.

Wells' Political Record

W. C. Wells, new Lieutenant governor, is well known in political circles in this province. For some years he was a resident of Palliser, near Golden, where he was the proprietor of some large lumber mills and timber limits. In the provincial election of 1908 he contested the Columbia riding and was defeated by 10 votes by W. G. Neilson, who however, did not live to take his seat in the house. Mr. Wells in the bye-election which followed, was elected and was again successful in 1909, when he won out against Armstrong and Burnett. In the election of 1908 Mr. Wells was elected by acclamation.

He was given rank as a cabinet minister under the Dunsmuir regime in June, 1902, as chief commissioner of lands and works and continued in that position under the Prior ministry, which was formed in November of the same year. He resigned in May, 1903.

From that time until about 18 months ago the new lieutenant governor lived at Palliser, managing his lumber business. He sold this, together with his timber limits and in 1907 came to Nelson to reside at Humewood ranch, on the Granite road.

It is understood that it is Mr. Wells' intention to invite his brother and sister-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. J. Douglas Wells of Chicago, to reside with him at government house, Victoria, where Mrs. Wells will act as hostess.

The Cranbrook Fair.

On September 14th and 15th Cranbrook will hold her big race meeting and agricultural fair. Large prizes are being offered and the people of the district are very enthusiastic. All of the ranchers and fruit growers of East Kootenay are working to make a big display so as to show what this district can produce. The horsemen have interested the racing people of Western Canada and the Northwestern States and in consequence there will be a fine showing on the track. Cranbrook has a reputation for making good on any entertainment that she attempts and the people in charge of the fair this year propose to do better than was ever done in this city before.

The Goat Comes First.

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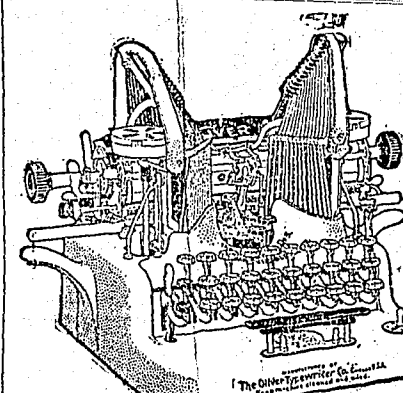

Boon to Humanity.

An air-cooling device which can reduce the temperature in an apartment twelve degrees in a few minutes has been perfected by Dr. William J. Manning, medical and sanitary officer of the government printing office. Dr. Manning is not seeking commercial advantage from his invention, but purposes its free use for the benefit of humanity. He has already gained prominence in the United States and abroad for other inventions designed to promote health and prevent suffering, and has received premiums and honorable mention from foreign government.

The Dr. Manning referred to in this article is a son of Mrs. Manning, now residing in Moyie, and a brother of Mrs. A. P. Macdonald. The article is taken from the Evening Star, Washington, D. C.

His latest device for rapidly lowering the temperature of the air has been erected in the emergency hospital at the government printing office, which institution is also of his creation.

Those who have seen the device demonstrated say it will be a great boon for hospital wards, crowded workrooms in factories, offices and other places where men and women toil. Dr. Manning will not patent the device and any one may use it.

The cooling apparatus is based on the principle of the cooling effects of the evaporation of water. Suspended from the ceiling of the emergency hospital in the government printing office is a strip of cotton twill in a verticle plane three feet wide and forty feet in length. Through a hem in the upper edge he has run a tube one inch in diameter and perforated on the bottom with holes one inch apart and one-eighth of an inch in diameter. At the lower edge of this strip of cloth is a metal trough. Connecting the tube with the water faucet by means of a common rubber hose, water is passed through, and percolating through the holes, trickles down through the fibers of the cloth, thoroughly saturating it in a few moments. The trough is inclined slightly, and the flow from the cloth is run off through an outlet at the lower end. Thus a moist area of great extent is produced, and all that is necessary is to induce rapid evaporation. This is accomplished by Dr. Manning by means of two electric fans, one at each end of the strip. As these are set in motion the cloth screens, saturated with water, rapidly vibrates and ripples and waves in the breeze created by the fans. Thus the water is quickly evaporated, and as the flow is continuous the process of cooling goes on without interruption.

The installation of the device can be accomplished as small cost, the materials being inexpensive and the work of construction simple.

Dr. Manning, who has already won prominence through his methods and devices for improving the health and comfort of the 5,000 employees of the Government Printing office, is not seeking commercial advantage from his invention, but generally without restriction offers the device to the public, and to all who care to take advantage of it. Having once been a printer, he sympathizes to the full extent with the discomforts endured by workers, and wishes to do all he can to alleviate their conditions of labor.

Willing Inspectors.

A Kansas editor wanted to announce that church attendants on the following Sabbath would be permitted to inspect the "most beautiful stained glass windows in the West." King May Aid Straw Hat.

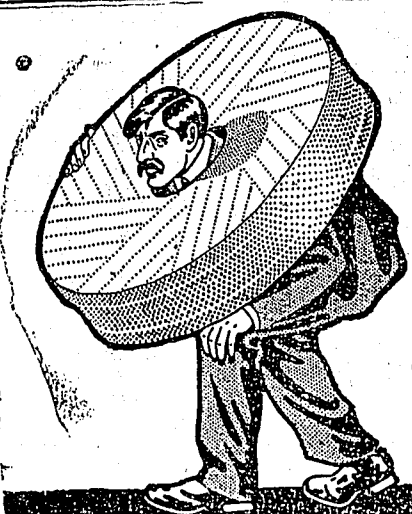

Mrs. Conrad arrived home from Missoula, Mont., Thursday evening. Her sister Mrs. Shaughnessy and two children came with her.

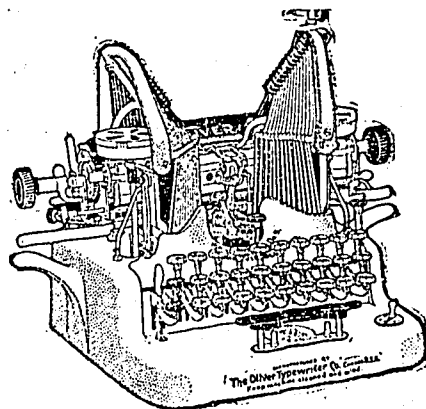
The office of the Society Girl Mining Company is to be located in the Farrell building, formerly occupied by the Co-Operative Store.
