STRIKE ENDS

Men and Company Reach an Agreement.

Conferences Are Finally Successful.

The good news has been sent out that the strike of the smelter employees of the British Columbia Copper Co. at Greenwood has been declared off, a basis of agreement regarding wages has been reached, and the men at the company's mines and reduction works are returning to work. All this week there were conferences between a committee of Greenwood Miners' Union No. 22, consisting of Frank Steel, T. J. Gould and Roland Rolinson of the smelter staff, together with Ernest Mills and R. A. Waterson, also of the union, and J. E. McAllister and Frederic Kiefer, for the company. Mayor G. R. Naden, of Greenwood, who was active in bringing the parties together, was also present at the meetings.

The union sent the company notice that it was ready to consider the differences in the wage scale, over which the strike occurred, and the company took the matter up, an amicable arrangement being the result of the deliberations. Manager McAllister, of the company, arose from a sick bed to attend the meetings, but was forced to go back before they were completed. Yesterday the text of the agreement was being drawn up by the interested parties and prepared for signatures, and in the mean time the men resumed work at the smelter, clearing things up preparatory to blowing in one or two furnaces probably today. The men employed at the mines also resumed work yesterday, and in a few days all the mines and the entire smelting and converting works of the B. C. Copper Co. will be running at fullest possible capacity.

A regrettable feature of the difficulty is the fact that many good men, who were temporarily out of employment, drew their time and scattered to other parts, a number of them coming up the hill to Phoenix to secure work. Thus, it will take a little time to secure a full and competent force of miners once more.

A rare treat will be given next Wednesday night at the Phoenix opera house, when the beautiful melo-dramatic comedy-drama, "Out in Idaho," will be presented. Boundary Side Lights

Robert Gaw has been awarded the contract for the erection of the new skating rink at Grand Forks.

At Grand Forks the enrollment of the public schools now number 295 scholars, and another division is to be added after the holidays.

At the Providence mine last week Friday Walter Murray lost the sight of one eye and had the other severely injured by a premature explosion.

James McQueen, of Rock Creek, died in a sleigh at Midway last week Friday, while returning from Greenwood, death being said to be the result of a long drinking bout.

The jury in the case of the death of Louise King, who was killed in the Niagara hotel explosion last week, found that death was caused by dynamite being used by Frank Pambanc, also known as Frank Cedia, who was assisted by an accomplice, Sam Rovello, the latter being in jail at Grand Forks. The government offered \$1,000 reward for the arrest of the assassin.

NEW RECORD
AT DOMINION

Boundary Falls Smelter Treats 5,328 Tons.

Best Week Since the Works Were Built.

This week the Dominion Copper Co.'s smelter at Boundary Falls treated 5,328 tons of ore—as will be noticed by the weekly table printed on this page of this issue of the Pioneer. This establishes a new record for this smelter, being two or three hundred tons higher than the best previous treatment for any single week since the smelter was constructed.

Supt. Thomas states that matters are running along very smoothly at the works and that the new work is beginning to make substantial progress. The new giant Giroux hot blast furnace is partly set up, and with a couple of cars more of machinery, soon expected to arrive, it will be completed some time in December, or at least, by the first of the new year, the new furnace will be in commission, giving the works with three furnaces a total capacity of from 1,200 to 1,400 tons of ore per day, or between 40,000 and 50,000 tons monthly.

At the company's several mines work continues uninterrupted, and Manager Drummond expects to have no trouble whatever in supplying the increased tonnage required whenever the smelter is prepared to receive it.

In and Around Phoenix.

The Hunter-Kendrick Co. office force is getting high toned, the office having been elevated and placed more to the back of the store this week.

R. H. Eggleston, secretary of the British Columbia Copper Co., Ltd., arrived in Greenwood from New York this week, spending a few days in the camp.

The subject for Sunday at the Methodist church will be, "Destiny," being the conclusion of the series, Anthem, "In the Secret of His Presence," solo, "That Beautiful Land."

The annual meeting of the Phoenix Hockey club will be held in the Brooklyn hotel next Wednesday evening at 8 o'clock. Every one interested in the formation of a hockey club for the coming season is requested to attend.

Quite a number of residents of Phoenix observed the American Thanksgiving by discussing the time-honored turkey, of which P. Burns & Co. disposed of some 600 pounds to the various hotels and residents.

O. B. Smith, Jr., W. S. Macy, L. Y. Birnie and John McKee, with Scott McKee, of Greenwood, had a successful hunting trip up the main Kettle river, coming back with nine deer to their credit. Their friends here are now enjoying the venison.

S. C. Holman, superintendent of the B. C. Copper Co.'s Mother Lode mine in Deadwood camp, has resigned to take effect January 1st. Mr. Holman has been employed at the Mother Lode for eight or nine years, off and on, the last three of which he was in charge of the property. He expects to settle down on a farm near Spokane.

An evidence of the equable climate of Phoenix is found in the fact that P. Burns & Co. are fitting up the basement of their new block for meat storage, and expect to bring in the meat supply for the entire Boundary and store it here in the winter till wanted. In the other Boundary towns the climate is so variable that this cannot be done to the same advantage.

Rev. R. A. Heath, rector of St. John's church, Phoenix, together with some of the members of the organization, are endeavoring to improve the services at the church on the hill. Mr. Heath has had considerable experience in full choral services during his ministry in this country and in England, and efforts will be made to make each service as fully choral as possible.

Last week Friday Mike Caulfield and William Fields, two miners, were driving a team and cutter owned by M. McIntyre of the Palace stables, when the team ran away. The men were thrown out and bruised, and the team ran off the road into the gulch near the first milkrack below the city. The legs of the animals were broken and they were shot, the loss being over \$500 for the horses and cutter.

ORGANIZED CARNEY
COPPER COMPANY

J. L. Martin, of Phoenix, the President.

J. L. Martin, of this city, returned Sunday from the Couer d'Alene country, in Idaho, where he became interested some months ago in promising copper groups of claims. Mr. Martin has interested the Greenoughs in his Carney group, and while absent organized the Carney Copper Co., with a capital of \$1,500,000 in one dollar shares. The incorporators of the company are W. D. Greenough, J. L. Martin, Joseph Carson, C. D. Miller and Hans J. Rice. Mr. Martin will be president, Mr. Greenough vice-president and manager, and Mr. Carson, who was in charge of the Morning mine for eleven years, will be the superintendent of the new company. Dr. Edwards, who put in the leaching plant for the Snowstorm mine, owned by the Greenoughs, will also be interested.

The Carney group is located four miles from Mullan, on Willow creek, and consists of eight full claims and three fractions, with favorable copper showings, which have been declared by experts to be some of the best copper surface showings in the Couer d'Alenes, the outcrop running from three to twenty per cent copper. There are two well defined ledges 150 feet apart, one being 40 feet in width and the other 33 feet. No. 1 tunnel is in 35 feet, all in ore. No. 2 tunnel was driven 85 feet, and since Mr. Martin took hold a crucuit was made from this for about 100 feet, and is now in good copper ore. It is the intention of the company to thoroughly exploit the property, and another tunnel will be driven lower down that will give a depth of 500 feet on the ore body. Mr. Martin who makes frequent trips to Mullan to look after his mining interests there, thinks he has one of the best copper groups in the district.

Odd Fellows' New Officers.

This week Snowshoe Lodge No. 46, Independent Order of Odd Fellows, elected officers for the six months beginning in January, the following being the list: N. G., John McIver; V. G., William McMillan; Fin. Sec., Wm. Picard; treasurer, F. J. McDougall; Rec. Sec., Carlton Cook. As has been the custom in the past, the lodge will likely hold a joint installation with Greenwood and Grand Forks, one or both in January.

This evening the Scandinavian Brothers will hold an opening ball at their newly rented hall, Anderson-McArdle building, Old Ironsides avenue, the grand march starting at 9 o'clock. Good music will be provided, and there will be no admission charge, all Scandinavians being invited with their friends. The committee in charge consists of Carl Helmer, Carl Johnson, G. Fridstrom, Frank Lundamo and J. Nilson.

IN YEAR 1907

Predicted Copper Production For Boundary.

Smelter Capacity Will Be 200,000 Tons Monthly.

The tonnage output of copper ore in the Boundary district of British Columbia in October amounted to 95,160 tons, which compares with 81,311 tons during September, according to the Boston News Bureau.

The output for both months, in tons, was as follows:

During September the new British Columbia Copper Co. smelter was not in commission. The falling-off in the Granby October output of 5,458 tons (equivalent to 110,000 pounds copper) compared with September was due to the shortage of fuel, which necessitated the blowing out of four furnaces for a few days and for the month it did not treat much better than 2,000 tons per day.

Granby's output for October was about 1,400,000 pounds of copper, while the Dominion Copper Co. produced about 400,000 pounds, and the British Columbia Copper Co. about 250,000 pounds.

The Granby Co., when its eight enlarged furnaces are in operation, should treat from 80,000 to 100,000 tons of ore per month. The British Columbia Copper Company, when its three furnaces are in commission, should treat 50,000 tons per month, and the Dominion Copper Co., when its new large furnace is installed (it is now being set up) should treat 40,000 tons per month.

The Boundary district for the past ten months produced about 1,000,000 tons of ore, and for the 12 months this year it will probably treat 1,200,000 tons, from which the refined copper recovery should be rising 30,000,000 pounds.

In 1907 the Boundary companies will have a smelter capacity sufficient to treat nearly 200,000 tons of ore per month. The smelter capacity has been increased this year to permit of practically doubling the Boundary district copper output.

The provincial government is certainly to be commended for offering a reward for the capture of the perpetrator of the dynamite outrage last week at Niagara, on the North Fork. Such gentry should be given no chance to escape the law.

Silver is literally humping itself. One day within the last week, it jumped seven points in New York and London. The silver miners are watching the market with a good deal of equanimity, as that metal is keeping pace with the rise in value of copper and lead.

The Conservatives in this riding have begun to guess who may be the nominee of the party in the next election contest. Our present member, G. A. Fraser, has moved to Victoria, and does not care to run, but of course there are others willing to do so. It is time Phoenix had a representative, as turn about is fair play.

On, no; the Spokesman-Review does not believe in yellow journalism at all—not in the least. At any rate, that is what some of its editorials would lead one to believe, when it gets the anti-Hearst fever in good shape. But just note how it is playing up the notorious Sloane murder trial, now going on in that city. Consistency is simply thrown to the winds.

It was unfortunate that, just as the B. C. Copper Co. was ready to do business on an extensive scale, after spending hundreds of thousands of dollars in new equipment, etc., a difference with the smelter employees should have caused a cessation of operations, even though temporarily. But with a cleared atmosphere, a little give and take, and a thorough understanding, this company will do big business and make a record for itself.

The Grits of the province have predicted an early election so often that they are really lengthening their cords and strengthening their stakes, and girding their loins for the coming battle of the ballots, which their leaders state is near. Already they have made some nominations in several ridings. Well, perhaps they think their cause is so precarious that they will need additional time in which to prepare, in case an election is called this winter. They will not be caught napping, at any rate.

THE OBSERVATORY

If there is one thing more aggravating than another it is to have poor telegraphic service, where a reasonably decent service is supposed to exist. That is exactly the condition in the Boundary today, at least as far as Phoenix is concerned. The only virtue of a telegraphic service at all is promptness, and that lacking it is all but useless. Today the Great Northern wire service between Boundary and outside points is a disgrace to civilization, even to James J. Hill himself. Between Phoenix and Spokane from 24 hours to three and four days are required for the transmission and delivery of telegrams, as many a business man knows to his cost. It is understood that the railway wire is so busy that there is little chance for commercial business at all, hence the congestion, even when the line is in good condition. If the new wire now being strung is brought into the Boundary, it will relieve things somewhat, but at present the service is putrid. The C. P. R., which also reaches Spokane in a roundabout way, does a little better, we are pleased to note, and the result is that the C. P. R. gets most of the business, as it should.

Quite a number of readers of this great family journal were complaining last Saturday when they failed to receive their Pioneers as usual. The explanation is simple. While the G. F. J. was being run off the press last Friday night, a break occurred, and more than half the edition was forced to await repairs. W. G. Fraser, master mechanic at the Granby mines, kindly sent one of his best men, George Pratt, and the break was repaired in the best possible shape in the shortest possible time, the machine being made good as new, and the papers going out to our large list of subscribers by the next mail. For which thanks are due those above referred to.

Under the caption "Bears and Other Big Things," the Greenwood Times remarks:

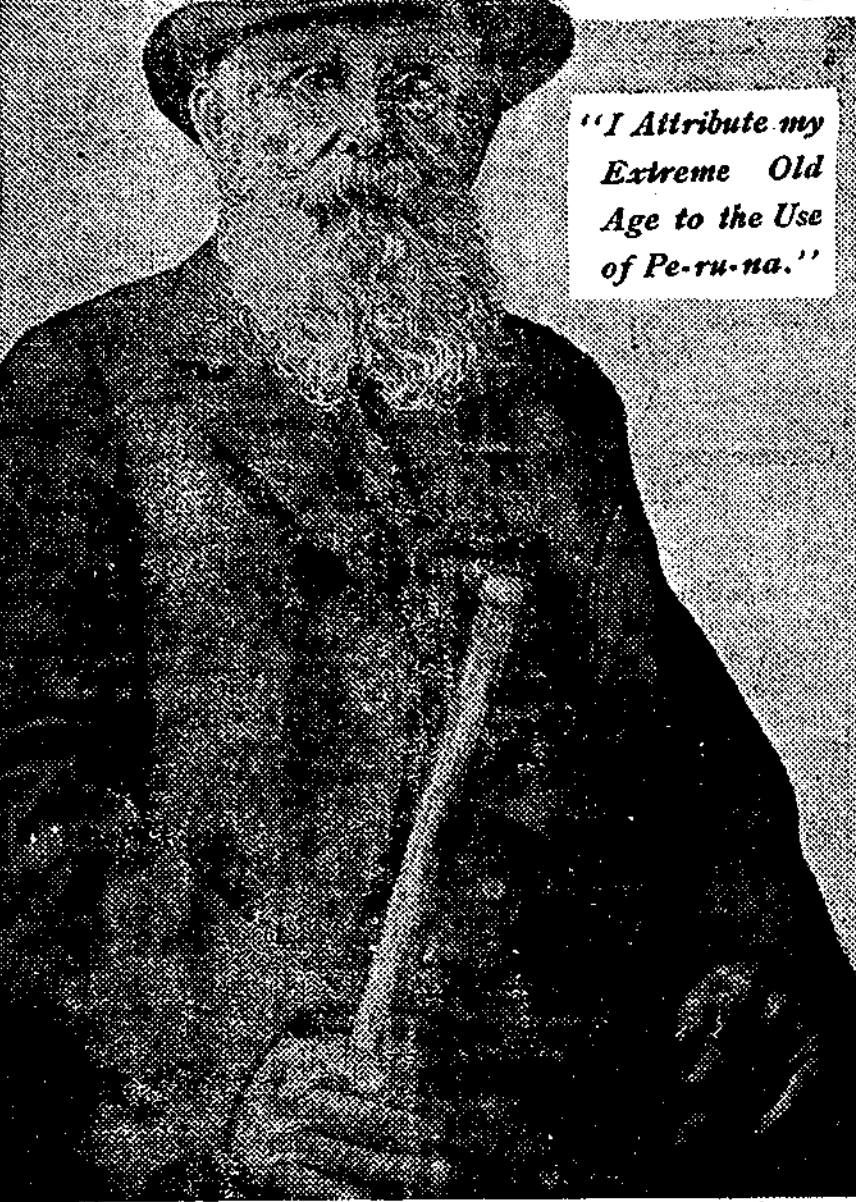
