OBSERVATIONS ON **BOUNDARY MINING**

By E. Jacobs, Well-Known Mining Writer

E. Jacobs of Victoria, the wellknown mining writer of British Colimbia, who recently made a trip through he Boundary and Kootenay, districts. has returned to the coast.

The chief industries of the districts visited, according to Mr. Jacobs, are in a fairly satisfactory condition on the whole, though in places there is room for considerable improvement. Min ing, to which he paid particular attention, appeared to be making pro gress, speaking generally. The Con solidated Mining and Smelting company of Canada, Ltd., which owns and is energetically working the big smelting plant and refinery at Trail and mines in Rossland, Boundary, Slocan, Nelson and East Kootenay districts, is steadily expanding its oper ations and contributing materially to the growing production of minerals in those several sections. In both cop per and lead smelting, and in lead re fining at Trail the company has established a large and useful industry, which is an important factor in the progress and prosperity of southern Kootenay in particular, and of the Boundary as well, though in much smaller measure.

Gold, silver, lead, copper, zinc and coal are produced in the Kootenay and Boundary districts. Both in tonnage of ores and value of metal extracted copper heads the list, and the production is being well maintained. The larger copper mines are in the Boundary, and these are operated by four companies, the Granby, British Columbia Copper, Consolidated and New Dominion. The BC. Copper com cany now holds a controlling interest in the New Dominion, so henceforth will direct its working affairs.
