ENGINE AND SPEEDER COLLIDE--ONE KILLED

Wife of C. P. R. Agent Dead—Husband Badly Injured—Baby Saved.

The lower railroad yard of the C. P. R. company, at Greenwood, was the scene of a dreadful accident on Wednesday evening, resulting in the death of Mrs. Jos. Davidson and serious and possibly fatal injuries to her husband, the company's agent at Midway. The unfortunate couple, with their two-year-old baby, were travelling to Greenwood on a motor propelled speeder and in an effort to reach the depot before the ore train, the speeder collided with tremendous force into engine No 3450, which had just set a train of ore out on the siding.

The danger was seen by the engineer, who applied every pound of air in his effort to avert an accident, but although the locomotive was brought to a stop inside of twelve feet the impact threw the couple out on the track and the engine passed over them, severing the agent's right arm and one of his wife's legs. The injured were hurried with all speed to the Sacred Heart hospital, where Mrs. Davidson succumbed about three hours after. Her husband's case is regarded as very critical as in addition to the loss of his arm, he sustained a fracture of three of his ribs. The injuries to the baby are trivial, it being thought that the mother threw it off the speeder when she realized the danger.

Mr. Davidson has been in the service of the company for some years and is very popular among his brother employees as well as the general public to whom the news of his affliction and sad bereavement will come as a severe shock.

Forest fires have already commenced to make their appearance in northern British Columbia.

Dunedin to Make Shipment

Ore averaging \$180 to the ton is now being taken out and sacked for shipment from the Dunedin mine, four miles from Sandon, says Jas. Marshall, one of the co-owners. "This summer, with ordinary luck, we expect to ship in the neighborhood of 80 tons to the Consolidated company's smelter at Trail." Word was received recently that the trail is now open for horses, the latter being the only method possible as rawhiding would necessitate a continuous shipment in order to keep the track open. Operations at the mine have been seriously hampered the past winter by reason of snow slides, one of which damaged the blacksmith shop and caused the death of one of the miners. Mr. Marshall expects to leave for a visit to the property within the next ten days.

Rawhide vs. Mother Lode Game

On Sunday afternoon, the Rawhide football team drove to Greenwood for the purpose of trying their skill with the Mother Lode eleven. The game was of an unusually stubborn character, the first goal being landed by the representatives of the big mine just a minute after the kick-off. After this the honors were fairly even up to a minute before the finish, when the Mother Lode bunch cut another notch. Final result: Mother Lode, 2; Rawhide, nil.

Death from Pneumonia

The funeral of Michael Birkupskye, a Russian Pole, who died of pneumonia on Monday in the hospital, took place on Wednesday in the local cemetery. The deceased was a mucker in the Granby mine and little or nothing at all was known of his history. The interment took place in the presence of Messrs. R. K. McCammon, Jas. McKeown and the Rev. A. T. Bell, the latter of whom officiated in his capacity as minister.

Mining Notes of British Columbia

W. R. Will is clearing the trail to the Capella mine on Goat Mountain, and work will probably be commenced this month. Some of the highest grade ore mined in the district was taken out of the Capella some years ago, one car of ore giving smelter returns of \$10,000.—Slocan Record.

John T. Blackburn, mine owner and operator, of Spokane, arrived in town Tuesday on his way to Leadville, via Tulameen. For some dozen years he was engaged in mining near Twisp, Wash. Mr. Blackburn will spend the summer in the district and will carry on extensive development work at Leadville, where he has acquired mineral interests.—Similkameen Star.

Simon Fitzgerald and his brother John are prospecting a portion of the famous Bitter creek placers. They have only just returned to Stewart from O'Donnell river where they staked some valuable property. J. F. MacLaren of Vancouver, has been testing the gravels at the junction of Bitter creek and Bear river on behalf of Vancouver capitalists.—Portland Canal Miner.

The Cariboo Observer says that the warm weather prevailing for the last three or four days is bringing the long looked for freshets in the various creeks, much to the satisfaction of the hydraulic mine managers. A few of the claims have been piping for the last week with two or three inch nozzles, but it is expected that in a day or so all the claims will be working under a good head of water.

J. L. Warner, of the Richmond Consolidated Co., returned from the coast early in the week and has started a force of men preparing the foundation for a 12-drill Sullivan air

compressor and erecting the gallow's frame for the hoist. The compressor plant will be located at the Lily May shaft, and from this point the several promising properties of the company will be operated. Work will be pushed rapidly with the end in view of placing the Richmonds company's holdings in a productive state as soon as possible.—Rossland Miner.

Much interest attaches to the possibility that the Lucky Jim Zinc Mines, Ltd., may remodel the Monitor & Ajax Fraction concentrator at Roseberry and use it for concentrating the milling ores of the Bear Lake zinc property. The plant was put in about eight years ago by Maurice Gintzburger, now a mining broker of Vancouver, and was designed to take care of about one hundred tons per day. Although a large expenditure was made, for some reason it was never made use of, the plant having lain inoperative since that time.

On Wednesday night (May 28) says the Omenica Herald P. J. and George Jennings returned from a trip of inspection to the Highland Boy group on Rocher de Boule. They have selected a camp site and arranged for a trail to their property. They found the snow disappearing very fast from the basin. On top of the mountain the snow is gone and it is a matter of only a few days until the basin is clear also. Arrangements have been made for the trail and work is starting in a few days. Mr. Jennings went down to Rupert for a few days and upon his return will have the first bunch of supplies taken up to the new mine and developing will be under way in a couple of weeks at the outside.

To Advertise Mining Possibilities

Mining men and prospectors in the vicinity of Phoenix and throughout the Boundary district, are reminded that another splendid opportunity to advertise the merits of their respective properties is afforded by the forthcoming Vancouver exhibition, where a special building, devoted to mines and mining is being provided. The exhibition management announce that they will defray the cost of transporting the specimens and will accept large blocks of ore as well as the smaller samples. Too little attention has heretofore been directed to this method of advertising the mining possibilities of a district, but now that the big mining investment companies are commencing to establish agencies on the coast, the importance of such an opportunity as that afforded by the Vancouver exhibition will readily be seen.

Welsh Concert

We take pleasure in publishing the program for the forthcoming Welsh concert, which is to take place in the Phoenix Opera house, next Thursday, June 19. The well-known aptitude for music possessed by the people of the principality, is of course recognized the world over, and requires no recommendation from us, suffice to say that every number has been carefully practiced, and the concert will provide its patrons with one of those few opportunities that come our way of listening to a really first-class musical production. The proceeds are to be devoted to the purchase and erection of headstones over the graves of late Welsh residents, who have been laid to rest in the local burial place.

The British police raided a warehouse in London on Sunday last and discovered 3,000 rifles and bayonets. The weapons were intended for use by the Irish Unionists.

No Orders Received As Yet

J. P. McCallum, Dominion inspector of immigration in the Boundary district, came up from the Forks on Tuesday for a few hours' visit. Interviewed as to the report that specific orders had been issued to all immigration officials throughout the Dominion to enforce the Dominion regulations regarding entry into Canada, Mr. McCallum said that he had not as yet received any official intimation himself, and had only learned of the matter through the newspapers. He, however, expected some such orders, and thought that about July 1st, certain restrictions laid down by law, but now in abeyance, in the case of those coming in to work on railroad construction would again be put into effect.

Repairing Sidewalks and Streets

The much-needed repairs to the sidewalks in various parts of the city, as well as the renovation of the city streets, was commenced in earnest a few days ago under the supervision of N. Lemieux. The street leading from Knob hill to the Central hotel has received a liberal filling of fine rock, while the road leading to Brooklyn avenue has also received the necessary attention. Few interior provincial towns can boast of cleaner and more serviceable streets than those of Phoenix.

Returns From the Coast

Geo. L. Elkins, district deputy of the Phoenix lodge of Knights of Pythias, who was the local delegate to the annual meeting of the Grand Lodge of the order, which took place at North Vancouver recently, returned to town on Tuesday, coming here from Lebanon, Oregon, where he paid a short visit to his father. Like all other returning travellers, Mr. Elkins is not impressed with the present business outlook on the coast. He stated that there were between two and three thousand on the unemployed list in Vancouver alone. "I feel convinced from what I saw myself that the former figure is close to the mark. The principal downtown streets are full of them. The price of all kinds of real estate is on the downward move. You can tell those of your readers who have invested within the last two years in property lying outside of either Vancouver or North Vancouver, that it 'may be for years' and the rest of it before the big majority of them ever see the color of their hard-earned cash again. The few days I was there, train load after train load of immigrants were being dumped into the city and I was informed that the same scenes had been witnessed for the past ten weeks; some of the trains had arrived in as many as three sections. Heaven alone knows what they are going to do for a living. I for one couldn't figure the problem out, and for that matter neither could anyone else with whom I talked the matter over."

B. C. Copper Treatment

The B. C. Columbia company's smelter treated 11,075 tons of ore this week, as follows: Mother Lode, 5,256; Rawhide, 4,804; Napoleon, 362; Queen Vict., 475; others, 178.

GRANBY COMPANY'S ENORMOUS RESERVES

Estimates 7,000,000 Tons of Ore at Phoenix—16,000,000 Tons More at Hidden Creek.

A recent visitor to the Granby company's properties both at Hidden creek and Phoenix is quoted in the current issue of the Boston Commercial as follows:

"The development of the Hidden creek properties of the Granby company is showing up wonderfully. Both by drill and underground work 16,000,000 tons of ore have already been demonstrated, and it is the estimate of the management that the old Phoenix properties now have 7,000,000 tons of ore remaining, or a ten-year life at Phoenix on the present basis of operations.

"The new smelter at Hidden creek will not be in operation much before the first of the year instead of September 1st, as originally estimated.

"In 1914, with two big smelters in operation, Granby will make a record of production and earnings which, on its small capitalization, should make a record to meet the desires of the most optimistic."

B. C. Copper Company's Staff

A few slight changes in the official circles of the B. C. Copper company have gone into effect this week. Jas. Johns, the Mother Lode supt. has resigned his position and leaves for Sudbury, Ont., where he has accepted an appointment under E. Hibbert formerly in charge of the above mine. F. S. Norcross, the company's general supt., who hitherto has made his headquarters in Phoenix will now be located principally at the Mother Lode and P. E. Crane, formerly of the Granby staff, has been appointed engineer and surveyor for the B. C. Company in Phoenix.

Another Scientific Triumph
Pellagra, the mysterious skin disease prevalent in the Southern States which has baffled medical authorities for nearly two hundred years, is caused by infected water, according to Professors Scala and Alessandrini, of the Institute of Hygiene in Rome. The scourge has long been ascribed to the consumption of bad corn, but according to the professors' announcement, they have found that in the districts of Italy where the disease is most prevalent the water is infected with flint stone in colloidal solution.

The professors declare that the theory of the maize ptomaine is altogether groundless. They are endeavoring to induce the authorities to proceed with a thorough examination of all the waters of the infected districts and rid Italy of a plague which claims 50,000 cases annually. The professors have found that the infected water may be easily made safe for drinking purposes by putting into it a quantity of carbonated chalk.

Kennewick Fruit Crop

Spokane, Wash., June 13.—All stores, offices and shops in Kennewick, Wash., whose continual operation was not essential to public welfare, closed every day this week that employers and employees might harvest the Strawberry crop. When sufficient pickers could not be had at any price the business men determined to forsake their businesses rather than lose the berry crop, which is large this year.

The Turbulent Fraser

The Fraser river is now in one of its ugly moods and has claimed a number of victims recently. Among the drowned were Mrs. Skelov, the wife of a Russian sub-contractor and a laborer of the same nationality, who were descending the river from Tete Juane Cache to Fort George on a raft. The raft, which was carrying nine persons, struck a log jam and threw the occupants into the water. The seven survivors were picked up three hours from the log-jam by the steamer, Chilcotin.

Concentrates

The name of Ross and the word "boss" are synonymous in Ottawa. The provincial poultry show is to be held in Grand Forks this year.

Wong Woe, a Great Northern Chinese section hand, was accidentally killed last week while at work in the smelter yard at Grand Forks.

The first attempts to investigate lightning by a method resembling wireless telegraphy were made by a Russian scientist in 1895.

The Wenatchee fruit growers have secured a reduction of twenty per cent from the Great Northern on shipment of fruit to points on the prairie.

The Steffansson expedition to the north, while in every respect well equipped, lacks but one thing necessary to style the outfit perfect—wireless telegraphy.

The body of Alfred Austin, the late poet laureate, was cremated at Golder's Green without any ceremony. A memorial service was held in the Chapel Royal, St. James Palace at the same hour.

"Launch Sea King, wrecked off Sable Island, May 1, 1913," signed "Hall King, Tom Donahue," was the message enclosed in a tightly-corked bottle found floating near Jericho beach on Monday afternoon by Mr. F. A. Edon, of the registry department.

A rich placer strike is reported from the Alaska side of Shushana rivers tributary to Tanana, 15 miles across the divide from the head of White river. Two men are said to have cleaned up \$900 in a few days. A large party of prospectors have left for the district.

John Johanson, of Maghera Co., Londonderry, who is considered to be the tallest boy in Ireland, has left his native land, on the Lake Manitoba, for Regina. He is only 20 years of age, and is still growing fast. At the time of leaving he measured 6 feet 11 inches.

Richard C. Miller, the prisoner of state, who has been incarcerated in the Carleton county jail since February because of contempt of parliament has been released. The contempt consisted of refusal to answer questions put to him in the public accounts committee as to certain payments alleged to have been made to secure government contracts.

The first despatch of mail for the interior of Alaska via the Yukon river was sent north last week, eight tons of accumulated matter being forwarded to Skagway. At Skagway several more tons have accumulated and when the first mail is sent down the river with the opening of navigation on the Yukon twenty tons will be ready for distribution among the inland stations.

The police committee decided not to grant the application of J. H.

MacDonald for a permit to be allowed to stage a skilled boxing contest of fifteen two-minute rounds, under clean break Marquis of Queensberry rules, with eight ounce gloves, to take place on or about July 12, in the Kalenberg Hall, South Vancouver, the contestants being two residents of British Columbia.

Telephone experts all over the world generally, and those of the B. C. Telephone Company's staff in particular, are anxiously awaiting the answer to that question. And the answer probably will not be forthcoming until something about the end of the present month, when the longest and most costly submarine telephone cable in the world will have been laid between Vancouver and Nanaimo and the delicate electrical tests made that will determine whether the practice prevalent in telephonic engineering of utilizing the "phantom circuits" to double the capacity of the existing talking circuits is applicable to great depths.

When the British Sloop of war, *Algerine*, was at Pitcairn Island, the isolated island in mid-Pacific, her officers secured one of the native goats that abound on the island, and brought it north as a mascot. This precocious animal can be seen any day, wandering leisurely around the naval yard, making new acquaintances at every turn, and on good terms with everybody. He is a hardy little chap, and totally oblivious of any danger. It is stated by the officers of the *Algerine* that the goat comes from a breed that was taken by the bounty mutineers from the Tahitis to Pitcairn Island. Goats of this breed are supposed to have originally been taken to the South Seas by Captain Cook, the famous navigator and explorer.

It is reported that a Vancouver company has struck oil in two wells near Fort McKay on the Athabasca River, 250 miles north of Athabasca Landing.

Britain to Build Three Ships

The decision of the British government to commence at once the construction of three additional dreadnoughts for the Imperial navy, to take the place of the trio of warships which the patriotic Liberals in the Dominion Senate have decided shall not be contributed by Canada, ought to produce an unbecoming blush on the countenance of those who have opposed the Borden measure. The Liberals have hitherto waved airily aside the contention that an emergency exists, but does any Liberal, in the light of what has now occurred, imagine for one minute that the British government and a Liberal one at that, would wilfully impose an additional tax of \$35,000,000 on their already overburdened people simply and purely for the fun of the thing, and can it be possible that the Canadian Liberals are taking any stock in the contention of our former minister of defence, that we are relying on the Monroe Doctrine and the United States navy for our protection. Canadian opinion will surely revolt at such a suggestion and yet the statement was uttered in all sincerity by Laurier's minister of militia during one of his speeches in the House of Commons.

Hawaii—75 Per Cent Oriental

The Oriental population of the Hawaiian islands, according to a recent statement, is 75 per cent of the whole. The number of Japanese citizens in the islands makes it possible for that nation to raise its flag tomorrow over the territory involved and bring its frontier within five days of the Pacific slope without the firing of a gun, the raising of a voice, or the shuffling of a single pair of feet.

The acquisition of the territory is absolute and complete in every way—economically, sociologically and commercially. It has been accomplished by the ceaseless inpour of Orientals of both sexes, by the acquirement of land, by the extension of local business and by the sheer dynamic force of numbers.

Politically, Hawaii is American territory. In point of fact, it is known to those cognizant of military conditions, and the government at Washington best of all, to be strategically Japanese, as it has been for many years.—Ex.

C.P.R.'s Cruelty to Russians

Excuse us whilst we conceal a smile. The Russian Consul-General in Canada has drawn the attention of the Dominion government to the alleged ill-treatment by the C.P.R. company of Russian immigrants in Saskatchewan. But after investigation it was found that the charges were absolutely without foundation, i.e. "entirely inaccurate and grossly misleading." It's very good of the consul to keep a watchful eye on the Little Father's children in Canada, but what about those American naturalized Russians who were thrown into jail and half-starved a year or so ago when they returned to bring their families back to the United States. Surely we are not mistaken, but is there not a place on the map called Siberia?

B.C. v. Washington Game Laws

The recent amendments to the Game Act which were passed at the last session of the provincial legislature, more especially that portion which imposes a \$2.50 license for carrying a firearm and hunting deer, have aroused the ire of a number of residents. But strict and necessary

as the new law is, it is mild in comparison with the condition imposed by the state government of Washington. In this province, a person whether a British subject or not, has only to pay \$2.50 for the privilege of carrying a gun or rifle and hunting, but in Washington, a Canadian has to pay the sum of \$15 before he can even apply for a license to hunt or fish in that state. We quote from a recent ruling by the Washington state attorney.

Disallows French Novels—But

John Bull is an inconsistent old fellow in some respects. He rolls his eyes in pious horror and sternly forbids the publication in England of certain English translations of French novels. He, however, sanctions the publication and sale of certain literature only to be obtained from the Suffragette headquarters and bookstalls, the contents of which, according to several well-known English editors, are absolutely unprintable. It has also been declared by the same authority that if the tenets of this literature advocates were adopted, it would throw the British people back into that condition of affairs which marked the decadent days of the Roman Empire. There is much more behind the Suffragette movement than appears on the surface and the sooner men and women realize it the better it will be for society at large.

There is no ground for the apprehension that unless a general election can be brought about, Hon. Sydney Fisher's occupation will be gone. He can go back to the land. He has a farm and when it comes to farming, as he himself admits, he has no equal. Anyway it will be a long time ere Sydney will have another opportunity to bounce one of Wilfey's "foreigners."

Here is another example of how little the Laurier government really cared for the agricultural community. Take the case of traction ditchers. These machines are of great value in the improvement of low lands. They cost from two to three thousand dollars apiece and are not manufactured in Canada. The Liberals imposed a duty of 27 1/2 per cent. The Conservatives put them on the free list.

The women of the new Chinese republic are becoming quite civilized, and have renounced their former practice of throwing their newly-born daughters into the gutter. The infants are now left on the doorsteps of the Christian missions.

Is Canada's Bubble Pricked?

A recent despatch from the New York Journal of Commerce, says: "Bank officials at this centre are more than usually concerned at reports they have been receiving from Canada. The Canadian banks have withdrawn their balances at New York down to an unusually low point, and they also have small supplies of free funds in London. This movement on the part of the banks is considered precautionary, and is taken as an indication that the unbridled boom that Canada has been enjoying during the last few years is coming to its natural close."

SYNOPSIS OF COAL MINING REGULATIONS

Coal mining rights of the Dominion, in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, the Yukon Territory, the Northwest Territories and in a portion of the Province of British Columbia, may be leased for a term of twenty-one years at an annual rental of \$1 an acre. Not more than 2,500 acres will be leased to one applicant.

Application for a lease must be made by the applicant in person to the Agent or Sub-Agent of the district in which the rights applied for are situated.

In surveyed territory the land must be described by sections, or legal subdivisions of sections, and in unsurveyed territory the tract applied for shall be staked out by the applicant himself.

Each application must be accompanied by a fee of \$5 which will be refunded if the rights applied for are not available, but not otherwise. A royalty shall be paid on the merchantable output of the mine at the rate of five cents per ton.

The person operating the mine shall furnish the Agent with sworn returns accounting for the full quantity of merchantable coal mined and pay the royalty thereon. If the coal mining rights are not being operated, such returns should be furnished at least once a year.

The lease will include the coal mining rights only, but the lessee may be permitted to purchase whatever available surface rights may be considered necessary for the working of the mine at the rate of \$10.00 an acre.

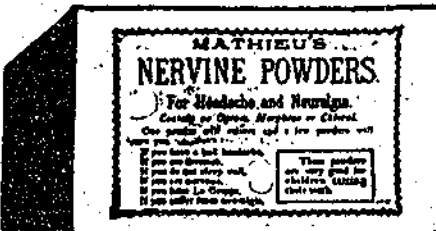
