



Written for the San Francisco Mining and Scientific Press by Matt W. Alderson.

My Dear Tom:

I have decided to make you foreman of the Imalulu mine, and you will please arrange to begin service on the first of the coming month. You will naturally wish to know the measure of authority granted you and what will be expected of you in your new position,

You will have absolute authority over the mine, including the hoist and blacksmith shop, and all men employed therein. You will hire and discharge all men. I expect to make frequent tips through the mine, to take my own samples and keep in close touch with what is going on; but I shall have no orders for any of the men; so you may know there will be no conflict of

I want you to get a force of good men under you-not the kind that requires constant watching and prodd ing. You may have noticed that the good thoroughbred horse needs but a word to cause him to walk off with his load with a quiet consciousness of power. If you wish to get the same work done by a plug, you must pound him on the back to get fair service out of him. There is just as much difference in men. Take your time to get good ones. We will stand by you if we have to hang up half the stamps in the mill. There is a mine just over the range where they hire every man who comes along in order to keep the mill running. One look at the crowd is enough. We don't want that kind.

You will be able to judge a good many men who apply to you by their appearance and the answers they give to a few leading questions. Take time to satisfy yourself by inquiry concern ing any others. You have nothing to lose by the impressions getting abroad that you are particular in putting on new men. Some men hire and fire and there is a steady stream coming in and going out of camp. I would rather it would be said of you: "He's slow about taking a man, out when he puts one on, he's there to stay."

There are several kinds of men you don't want. You don't want the spiritless man. You don't want the habitual rover, the man who never settles down in one place for any length of time. You don't want the great talker. You want a worker, one who is muscled well in the shoulders and arms, not in the mouth. You don't want the kind will think bronchos "just the thing," of a man who thinks he knows better and a third will take cayuses. You want men of good habits. I do not accept and undoubtedly there were mucked out after men who thought they could play cards in a saloon all night and do good work in the mine the next day, and I didn't need a car. You must size up the applicants and choose for yourself. ve mucked out after men who It takes time to break a new man in to do the work just as you wish it done, and time is money.

I have always found a man who saved part of his earnings a good man to employ. This does not say that men who do not save will not be good men. I have had splendid workmen whose money went from them after pay-day like water through a sieve. That a man does not save is no reflection on his character. The civilized man is known by the grandeur of his wants and when a man doesn't save, it only shows there are other things he prizes more than he does money. This is all right, if the things he values are good in themselves. But some men are exceedingly wasteful and extravagant and such persons in some places in the mine will require your constant! care and oversight.

You will be told that if you want good miners you must get Cornishmen. Don't you believe it. No one country has a monopoly of brawn or brains. Of four premium men, not born in the United States, whom I had at one mine, one was a native of Germany, one of Sweden, one of Nova Scotia, and one of Switzerland. There is many a capable, skilled miner among the Cornish, but you will get better work out of your men if they feel that you are not prejudiced in favor of some one nationality, but that you judge every man on his merits, regardless of where he may have been born.

It is a rule of the Miners' Union that all miners must receive the same remuneration, regardless of their being skilled or unskilled; but it is no fault of the Union if you choose to give employment to poor workingmen or to men who will cause you trouble. "But," I hear you say, "every mine can't have a force of picked men." Yes, it can, if it so chooses. One must not make the mistake of thinking right quantity of the best form of Iron and Phosphorus, it is so scientifically prepared that not one person in a thouthat in choosing good men every foreman will take the same type. I have seen a force of very superior men gathered by one foreman go all to pieces in a few weeks under his successor. The new man was better educated than his predecessor; he was more intelligent, but he was lacking physicians everywhere have fully endorsed FERROL, and used it largely in their practice.
