ALIEN ENEMIES CANNOT CLAIM

Mr. Justice McDonald Dismisses Case Against The Granby Company.

That a mere stay of proceedings during hostilities in cases in which alien enemies were plaintiffs did not satisfy the law was the decision of Mr. Justice McDonald on Monday, and his lordship dismissed entirely the suit in which the administrator of a man named Pankovitch sought damages under the Workmen's Compensation Act against the Granby Consolidated. The administrator sued in behalf of the father and mother of the deceased who are residents of Austria-Hungary at the present time.

Counsel for the company cited an English case in which it was held that unless an alien enemy was within the realm by license of the king he could not sue, but he could be sued and could defend and had a right of appeal. In Ontario, too, Mr. Justice Sutherland had decided that although he would have preferred to grant a stay he was bound to dismiss, even though hostilities might last until the plaintiff might be barred.

J. F. McDougall, who appeared for the plaintiff, argued that only a stay should be granted, and said that Mr. Justice McDonald was not bound by the Ontario judge, who sat alone, and did not appear to have good grounds for his decision.

His lordship, however, dismissed the action, saying that while he was not bound by Mr. Justice Sutherland's decision, he was pleased to follow it. He also referred to similar decisions by other judges supporting his view.

The Nottingham lacemakers were saved from closing their factories by a timely order from the government for immense quantities of mosquito netting.

War Prisoner's Letter

The following letter was recently received by Wm. Delahay, local customs collector, from Edward Hurrell, who was among the Canadian prisoners captured by the Germans at Langemarck. The letter was written on August 25th, from the "Kriegsgefangenen Lager, Senne III:

"I am writing to thank you and Mrs. Delahay for the cake, and I also received a parcel from the Patriotic Society and cigars and tobacco from Paddy Clune. Will you thank them for me, as our writing is restricted to two letters and four postcards a month. I can tell you the things were very acceptable, but I would like another suit of underclothes. I was very glad to hear that the other two who enlisted with me were all right. This is the 24th, and I have been out of hospital a month. It was a narrow shave for me, as I was unconscious for two days. I am now getting stronger but my leg is still weak.

When you hear of anyone writing to Jas. Porter and Dan Paterson, tell them to remember me, and if the society sends any more to me, any canned stuff would be very welcome. There are twenty of my regiment here, and I think they are all out of hospital. I will write one letter a month to you. Give my regards to all enquiring friends."

Just Marking Time

Interviewed recently by a Vancouver World reporter, Sir Richard McBride stated that he had not given the matter of the provincial election a thought. Affairs were very quiet and they were simply marking time.

So far as prohibition was concerned, he said that although the government recognized the earnestness of the advocacy of these principles by the World, he had nothing to add to what he had stated publicly. The people were more or less excited and imagined that such things could be done with a stroke of the pen, but they took time.

Damon And Pythias

The photo play of Damon and Pythias will be shown at the opera house on Friday next. An immense amount of money has been spent on the reproduction of this ancient, soulful and absorbing drama, which for ages before the Christian era told the story of man's humanity to man. The staging of the scenes is superb, and from first to last the closest attention to even the minutest detail is especially marked.

"I have no words in which to tell you of the deep impression made upon me," wrote the Supreme Chancellor of the Knights of Pythias, "as I witnessed the story of Damon and Pythias, as it is told on your splendid film. . . . Every man who believes in maintaining the purity of our homes. Every man who believes in the uplift of his fellow men should witness this wonderful production."

Significant Visits

Chesaw, Wash., is much concerned over the recent visit of F. J. Longworth, smelter manager of the British Columbia Copper Co., and H. D. Quimby, one of the company's mining engineers, both of whom made an inspection of claims situated near that city. "It is needless to suggest," says the Chesaw News, "that the B.C. Copper company is deeply interested in the ore on our big mountain, or such frequent trips would not be made here. These men, however, judiciously guard their conversation and enquiries so as not to divulge too freely the object of their mission, or the motive which prompts the big copper producing corporation to send them here."

Copper

Copper is very much stronger and the volume of sales has largely increased this week. Lake is 18½ to 18½ cents and electrolytic is 18 to 18½ cents a pound. Domestic consumers are again in the market and foreign buyers have taken very large amounts of copper. There is a disposition on the part of some of the producing interests to raise their prices and it seems not improbable that the market may advance soon to 19 to 20 cents.

Death of R. Milkie

The friends of Richard Milkie, formerly of Phoenix will regret to learn of his death which occurred at the Mamie mine, Hadley, Alaska, on September 15th, the result of an accident. The body was conveyed on the steamer Humboldt to Seattle, where the funeral took place under the auspices of the Masonic fraternity and the Knights of Pythias on September 28th.

The amount of prize money for the officers and men of the British navy that has accumulated since the outbreak of war, has now reached the enormous total of over twenty million dollars. Up to the present not a single cent of the money has been distributed, but it is proposed to share it out to the entire navy.

B. C. Mining

The Bertha mine at Bannock City, which is being worked under lease by Republic parties, on Wednesday made a trial shipment of a carload of ore to the Granby smelter. Those who have seen the ore say that it is high grade. The Bertha has splendid shipping facilities, being located within a short distance of the North branch of the Kettle Valley line.—Grand Forks Sun.

E. C. Rice, has been working on the Spokane group on the headwaters of the east fork of Dewdney creek, Ranger basin, four miles north of Summit camp, near Coquihalla pass. He has showings on three claims, and assays run \$140 gold, zinc 34 per cent., silver 20 per cent. He intends rawhiding ore this winter to the railroad eight miles distant.—Similkameen Star.

It is understood that arrangements have been made by the Florence Silver-Lead Mining company to secure four motor trucks to be used in hauling ore from the Florence mine on Princess creek, to the Highland concentrator, at the Cedar creek landing. The first of the trucks was expected to arrive this week, and was to be set to work hauling gravel for road ballast. This is the first occasion that motor trucks have been brought into the district to be used for ore hauling, and the outcome of the experiment will be watched with interest by mining men.—Kootenain.

A four-foot lead, carrying gold silver and lead has been staked out by a couple of prospectors, on Harrison lake. The lead occurs between diabase on the hanging wall and an altered lime on the foot wall. These two formations are in the form of a dyke which forms a contact between granite on the west and slate on the east. The new discovery is about one mile from the lake. From the appearance of the ore there is no doubt as to its carrying values, but average samples are now in the assayers' hands, and upon the results obtained will depend to a large extent the amount of work which the discoverers will do next winter on the property. They have already done considerable surface work, built a blacksmith shop and cabin, and are prepared to develop this into a shipping proposition if the appearance of the ore is borne out by the assay values.

The Everlasting Topic

Foster's weather forecast for last week has proved remarkably accurate, and the warning of storms on the coast and cold weather was fulfilled to the letter. Further cold spells are predicted up to Sunday next, October 10th, when a few days of warm weather is promised us, to be broken on the 13th and 14th by a series of violent storms accompanied by cold and rain. The heaviest storms may be expected on October 19th, 23rd and 27th.

The Prussian casualty list for the fighting on the western front for the period between September 17th and 28th, includes the names of 63,468 killed, wounded and missing. This, however, does not include the losses among the Bavarians, Saxons and Wurtembergers.

Summoned As Witness

Provincial Constable G. Howieson, returned to town on Tuesday from a trip to Comaplix, to which place he was summoned as a witness for the government enquiry into the circumstances surrounding the destruction by fire of the saw-mill at that place. It seems that the various insurance companies were reluctant to meet the claims until the matter had been satisfactorily cleared up by the examination of witnesses under oath. Before coming to Phoenix, Mr. Howieson was stationed at Golden, and Comaplix was included in his police district. A representative of the Burns Detective agency, who gave evidence stated that he had been unable to form a conclusion as to the origin of the fires, although four detectives had been employed on the case for three months.

Military Items

Captain Williams, adjutant of the new battalion of pioneers, now being recruited, is experiencing little or no difficulty in enrolling men. The impression seems to prevail among the men of other regiments that the new unit will leave for the front long before any of the others. In consequence of this belief large numbers of the men of other regiments are applying for transfer to the pioneers.

Nothing of an official nature concerning the date of the removal of the troops from Vernon, has been given out, but the contracts for the supply of food will expire on the 15th inst. Drafts consisting of 250 men each from the 62nd and 47th Battalions left recently for the east.

Wrecking Machines

Bars of iron placed in grain sheaves has been the means of wrecking threshing machines and tying up harvesting operations in parts of the Macrorie district, south-east of Saskatoon, Sask. Mystery surrounds the attempts, and alien enemies are suspected.

MADAM BISHOP'S ENTERTAINMENT

Noted Singer Arrived Unannounced—Concert In Aid of Our Wounded

Owing to an error in the date of the concert to be given by Madam Bishop, whose tour is under the auspices of the Calgary News-Telegram Wounded Soldiers' Fund, the noted singer arrived in the city on Thursday only to find that no arrangements had been made for her visit. The difficulty, however, was partially surmounted by her appearance at the usual motion picture entertainment, the program of which was curtailed to allow the singer sufficient time to render a few of her songs. The ordinary admission fee was unchanged, but a collection was taken up.

Previous to her entertainment, Madam Bishop told her audience that the receipts from the first sixteen of her concerts had netted sufficient to purchase thirty machine guns, but that further receipts at the advice of the militia department would be donated to the newly-formed Wounded Soldiers' Fund. She paid a tribute to the generosity of the American tourists, that this year she had met in great numbers at the beautiful resorts along the system of the Canadian Pacific railway. The war, and the needs of Canada's troops had done more to advertise this country than anything else she could think of. Her songs were necessarily few, but her wonderful voice, recitative ability, together with her sallies of native American wit, both pleased and charmed her hearers.

N. J. Ogilvie of the Dominion geodetic branch, who has been out with a field party on the northern coast for the greater part of the summer, has returned to Ottawa to make his report.

army must have given him an uncomfortable time on the subject of war time strikes.

"It was no use me telling them how much the employers were to blame for the strikes," he writes. "Their very firm conviction was that no personal gain or loss on either side justified the slightest delay in the production of munitions, and the workman or employer responsible for such delay should be shot as a traitor to his comrades and brothers in the trenches."

The increasing figures in the price of metals ought to do something towards bringing into actual production many mineral properties now lying idle in B.C. There can be no denying the fact that if many of the prospectors of this province had their opportunity it is now or in the course of next year, but unfortunately, as has been the case in past years, many a highly promising deal is being held up by the pig-headed obstinacy of one solitary pipe-dreaming "millionaire." The time has gone by for ever when exorbitant figures will be paid for prospect pot holes, and the sooner the owners realize it, the better it will be for themselves and the industry in general.

Our fashionable physicians are said to be feeling the war very badly indeed. The malady imagineaire is disappearing. People are eating less and more sensibly, going to bed earlier, and thinking less of themselves and more of others. Consequently they are in better health. And as these virtues are likely to become still more widely practiced during the next few years, the prospect for the type of physician which Mr. Shaw so mercilessly satirized in his B.B. may yet share the fate of the dodo.—Pall Mall Gazette.

When parliament meets there is likely to be some trouble for the cabinet. Ministers are to be asked why it is that extra-special privileges are allowed Norwegian shipping trading between Canadian ports. Time was when ships hailing from Canada were to be seen quite frequently in all the important ports of the world, but what with orders-in-council and orders out of council, all in favor of the foreigner, the Canadian mercantile flag has well-nigh been driven from the seas.

According to government reports the demand for game hunting licenses is not nearly as great this year as in former seasons. The reason is not far to seek. Twelve thousand of our boys have turned their attention to shooting other game in Flanders and France.

Sir Thomas Skinner has resigned from active participation in the affairs of the Hudson's Bay Co. The honorable company of skin traders will no doubt regret losing the services of such a good Skinner.

The British government have given permission for Dr. Dumba to cross the Atlantic—and the doctor was the representative of Germany's ally.

Our Basic Industry

Victoria, B.C., Oct. 8th.—The timber returns for the month of August issued by the Minister of Lands show that the total output of sawlogs for the province amounts to 64,257,966 feet board measure, in addition to 71,383 lineal feet of piles and poles, and 9329 cords of railroad ties, shingle bolts, fence posts and cordwood. Of this total there were exported 13,984,874 feet of sawlogs, of which 13,302,413 feet was from the Vancouver Island district; also 5320 lineal feet of piles and poles from the same district. Timber sales recorded during the month cover an estimated total of 10,100,857 feet of sawlogs, 85,000 lineal feet of sawlogs, 85,000 lineal feet of poles and piles, and 1234 cords of pulpwood, cordwood, etc., the estimated revenue from this source amounting to \$18,160.36.

SYNOPSIS OF COAL MINING REGULATIONS

Coal mining rights of the Dominion, in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, the Yukon Territory, the Northwest Territories and in a portion of the Province of British Columbia, may be leased for a term of twenty-one years at an annual rental of \$1 an acre. Not more than 2,500 acres will be leased to one applicant.

Application for a lease must be made by the applicant in person to the Agent or Sub-Agent of the district in which the rights applied for are situated.

In surveyed territory the land must be described by sections, or legal subdivisions of sections, and in unsurveyed territory the tract applied for shall be staked out by the applicant himself.

Each application must be accompanied by a fee of \$5 which will be refunded if the rights applied for are not available, but not otherwise. A royalty shall be paid on the merchantable output of the mine at the rate of five cents per ton.

The person operating the mine shall furnish the Agent with sworn returns accounting for the full quantity of merchantable coal mined and pay the royalty thereon. If the coal mining rights are not being operated, such returns should be furnished at least once a year.

The lease will include the coal mining rights only, but the lessee may be permitted to purchase whatever available surface rights may be considered necessary for the working of the mine at the rate of \$10.00 an acre.

Concentrates

There are 150 Chinks in Merritt. The Northampton boot factories are turning out sixty thousand army shoes every 24 hours.

Percy Bean, a Fernie hunter, recently bagged a splendid specimen of the silver tip variety of grizzly.

General Kuropatkin of Russo-Jap war notoriety, has been appointed to the command of one of the czar's armies.

The Russian government is advertising for a large number of men for railroad building. Hundreds are applying in Vancouver.

New Westminster has adopted the curfew bell. Children under 15 years of age are now forbidden on the street after eight o'clock.

British sappers, driving a tunnel under the German trenches recently, ran into a German mine, cut the communicating wire and "stole" a ton and a half of the enemy's explosives.

After one of her performances in London, Mlle Lydia Kyast the Russian dancer, distributed eight hundred cigarette cases filled with cigarettes to the wounded soldiers in Charing Cross hospital.

It is estimated that at least nine hundred families will be destitute in Greater Vancouver this winter, and allowing twenty dollars a month for each family, \$18,000 will be required every month for relief purposes.

The tribunal appointed under the Defence of India Act to try the Lahore conspiracy case, has announced its judgment. Of the sixty-one accused, twenty-four were sentenced to death, twenty-seven to transportation for life, and six to terms of imprisonment.

Sir Edward Carson, in reply to a question in the House of Commons regarding the prosecution of the newspaper, the Labor Leader, said it might be news to the House to learn that that paper had been described in the German press as a "wholesome study."

Speaking at Wesley church, Vancouver, a few days ago, the Rev. Ernest Thomas discussed the "crisis in B.C." from a religious standpoint. In the course of an eloquent sermon, he declared that the preface to the famous pamphlet "The Crisis in British Columbia" was unworthy of a body of ministers.

While steaming within 130 miles off the English coast, the Norwegian steamer Jonas Reid sighted what was at first thought to be a derelict, but on approaching the vessel it was found that the whole of the crew had gone crazy. The Netherlands consul stated that he thought the trouble was the outcome of religious dementia.

The regulations regarding alien enemies in London are becoming stricter. An order has just been issued that every male German, Turk or Austrian of military age, who has not been granted exemption, is required to surrender at once to the police. Austrians under 51 years of age, and Germans under 55 years will be interned.

Among the second list of casualties of Welsh territorial regiments at the Dardanelles, there were 32 Jones, nineteen Williamses, sixteen Evanses, thirteen Robertses, and twelve Davieses. Many of them had the same Christian names, and one of them named Davies had been reported missing after he had returned home wounded.

One hundred Alaska sled dogs, the pick of the dog teams in the north have been purchased by the French government for the use of the troops in the Vosges mountains. Among the animals are the Allan-Darling racing team, the victors of the annual Nome race. Scotty Allan, the well known driver accompanies the dogs to France.

The kaiser, who is not without a little superstition, is said to be worried a deal over the loss of a talismanic ring. The article is of gold and set with a square stone of a dull dusty color. It was formerly the property of a Margrave of Nuremberg, who during the crusades slew a Saracen chief and after the manner of the crown prince, stripped him of all his jewels.

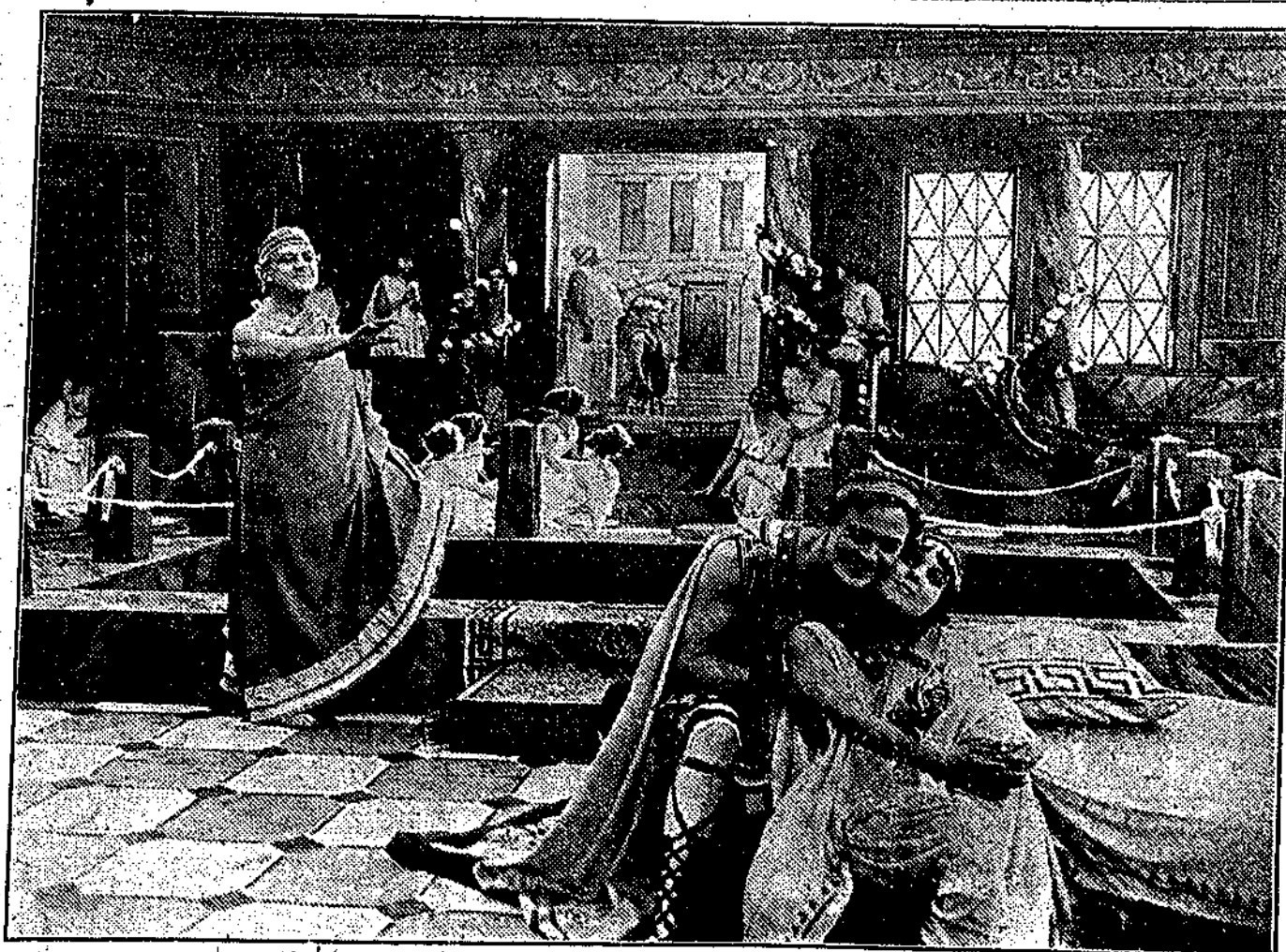
