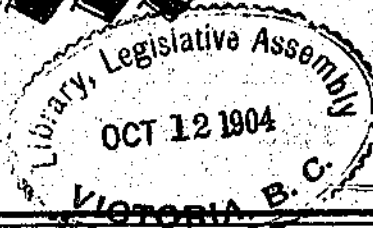

MONTREAL AND BOSTON SMELTER.

Last Monday the party of Montreal & Boston directors, shareholders and friends, who had come out from New York, as the guests of Munroe & Munroe in the private car Twilight, to inspect the smelter and mines of the new corporation, started on the return trip, reaching Spokane that night. From there they proceeded via the Burlington to St. Louis and thence home to New York.

Before they left, and after they had inspected the various properties of the company, the Pioneer secured an expression of opinion from members of the party regarding what they thought of the company's holdings, and of the Boundary generally. It will be noted from the following that there is a remarkable unanimity of opinion regarding the possibilities of profitable mining in the Boundary, and that the gentlemen referred to were agreeably surprised at the potentialities of this section, as well as more than satisfied at the bright prospects of their own company.

James J. Hill's Friend.

Ex-Senator Warner Miller, of Herkimer, New York, is one of the best known Republican politicians in the east, having represented his state at Washington for years. He is a warm friend of James J. Hill, of the Great Northern, and of President Roosevelt. Mr. Miller, who has had a good deal of experience in mining, said:

"My investigation into the properties of the Montreal & Boston Consolidated during the last three days, have been most satisfactory to me. I found ore bodies in the several mines much larger than anticipated, and of such a grade as to permit of their being mined and being worked in a profitable manner. The company is peculiarly fortunate in having several mines, the ores of which make a most desirable flux at the smelter. With one or two exceptions, which will be overcome, they are so located that railway facilities are immediately available—a most important consideration. The smelter itself is well arranged and built for three furnaces, with 1,000 tons daily capacity. Its location is such that its capacity can be doubled or tripled as desired.

"The grade of ore in the Boundary being low, a large tonnage is required to produce satisfactory profits, and this requires large combinations of capital. The Montreal & Boston people have this combination, and with continued wise management cannot fail to make the property a large producer."

Charles A. Fish, a director of the Montreal & Boston, who is a member of the firm of Geo. Kissam & Co., of New York, said:

"I am simply delighted with the country, and I can see that it has a great future, in which the Montreal & Boston will share. From my observation it is apparent to me that the entire district is almost a limitless body of ore. As a business proposition it seems to me that the capabilities for making money here are simply limited to the smelting capacity. The reduction of ores here is simply a manufacturing process, and with proper management and economy in mining and smelting, the financial result should be very profitable.

"I am so much delighted with the country and your people whom I have had the pleasure of meeting, that I feel like returning next year and spending a couple of months here.

"I think that the Montreal & Boston have a great proposition, and I have been much astonished at the amount of development work already accomplished. I believe that all investors in the shares of the company will eventually receive large returns on their money."

John F. Plummer, a retired capitalist of New York, and a director of the Montreal & Boston, was one of the most enthusiastic of the entire party regarding the properties. He said:

"I am greatly pleased with the appearance of the properties, greatly pleased with the country and greatly pleased with the people here. I regard the Montreal & Boston as an ideal smelting proposition, backed up by all the requisite elements to make it an unequivocal success. It is much greater than the Munroe boys represented it to me to be, and I am very glad I came out here.

"I have been across the continent 24 times, having been at one time a government director of the Union Pacific Railroad, and while I have been in the States and Alaska, I have not been much in British Columbia before this. I can readily see there is a wonderful future before the Boundary, and the Montreal & Boston will do its part."

Quincy Ward Boese, of New York, attorney for the Montreal & Boston, said:

"I have seen half a dozen copper properties before this, supposed to be high grade, but in those cases the cost of mining was so great that the profit was greatly reduced. Here, in your large ore bodies which can be quarried, the cost is reduced to one-fifth of that of extracting the high grade ores. With coal and timber not high, and good railway facilities in a few months I can see profits accumulating for the Montreal & Boston shareholders.

"What struck me was that our properties are not prospects, but highly developed mines now shipping ore, with the others ready to ship. The business management is particularly good under Mr. H. T. Pemberton, and with such skillful men as Mr. Collins in charge of the mining, and Mr. Welch at the smelter, with their associates, the future of the company is certainly, in my opinion, bright."

Dr. A. E. Magoris, of Birmingham, New York, is a mining engineer, the president of two hard coal companies in Pennsylvania, and is interested in California mines as well. He is interested in the Montreal & Boston, and said:

"Our company certainly has a magnificent group of properties for low grade mines, that are being rapidly turned into even greater mines with an abundance of ore of just the right grades for successful smelting. The combination could not be excelled to reduce the ores to the best advantage. The mining is along the best lines of economic science in the mining art, and remarkable business ability has been shown in selecting the properties and the men to handle them."

Chas. McDonald, a veteran civil engineer, of New York, and a Canadian by birth, said:

"I came out here at the invitation of Mr. Plummer, and I am immensely pleased. From my knowledge of railway work I took a great interest in the methods of development, removal of ore, putting on cars, etc. It is all done in good economical shape and with a view to keeping down costs as low as in any place I have ever seen.

"The Rawhide was a great attraction to me. When in shape to ship, the ore will be sent out at the minimum of cost. It has an immense tonnage available, and it is richer than the Brooklyn. The Athletan was very interesting also, on account of the cheap mining. Its ore could be taken out with a steam shovel.

"The smelter is very compact, with everything needful for economical working, and yet with no unnecessary expense. In fact, the whole property

of the company is in excellent shape." Dr. Homer Gibney, who is house surgeon to the New York General Hospital, the oldest hospital in the United States, and is also connected with the Orthopedic Hospital, the largest of its kind in the world, having 300 beds for orthopedic cases, said:

"As a result of my visit here, I have most pleasant impressions of the Boundary country. It is a wonderfully rich country to me. My idea is that the Montreal & Boston people have but faintly represented the proposition in the east. It has been underestimated rather than overestimated, and great credit is due to the Munroe Bros. for what they have done to interest the easterners.

"I am pleased with what I have seen, the class of people, the progress and the general development of the district. The professional men in my line are also up to date and fully competent, as I have noticed in several cases in which I have been called in consultation."

### GETTING READY AT SNOWSHOE

Machinery Being Put in Order.

AFTER IDLENESS OF TEN MONTHS

No Announcement Yet Made, But Amalgamation With LeRoi Is Among the Possibilities.

There are strong indications that there will be something worth while doing at the Snowshoe mine in this camp before long. This week, on receipt of orders from the management, two or three men began the work of preparing the machinery in the camp building for use at an early date, putting it together, cleaning it, etc. This will be completed probably some time next week. Locally nothing seems to be known of the intentions of the Snowshoe company, the orders referred to coming from Anthony J. McMillan, the managing director.

Mr. McMillan is also the manager of the LeRoi mine, at Rossland, and it is not unlikely that something in the way of an amalgamation of the two companies may be proposed, and the unwatering of the mine be for the purpose of sampling or expert examination, as George S. Waterlow, vice-chairman, of the Snowshoe corporation, is now on the way to this section. It has been an open secret that the Snowshoe ores contain just the right ingredients for mixing with LeRoi ores at the Northport smelter, and the near advent of the Great Northern to Phoenix would give the desired direct connection with that reduction plant.

#### September School Report.

Following is the Phoenix public school report for the month of September, furnished by Principal Thornber: Pupils actually attending 1,000; total daily attendance 1,615; total actual attendance, 1,581½; average daily attendance, 76.90; average actual attendance, 75.30.

Announcement has been made that the Eastern Townships Bank will offer medals to the Grand Forks and public schools, the details of which will be announced later.

About \$1,600 was spent by the city recently in taking out rock on Knob Hill avenue.

### NEW GRANBY DIRECTORS

Chosen at Annual Meeting at Montreal.

AMERICANS ARE NOW IN CONTROL

Net Profits For Year of \$283,000, with Net Surplus of \$833,000—Head Office Removed to Grand Forks.

President, not yet chosen. Vice-President and Manager, J. P. Graves.

Secretary, Northrup Fowler.

The above are the new officers of the Granby Consolidated, as chosen by the new directors at the annual meeting of the company held at Montreal last Tuesday. The following dispatch to the Pioneer gives the details of what was done at that meeting:

Montreal, Oct. 5.—At the annual meeting of the Granby Consolidated, held yesterday the following directors were chosen for the ensuing year: John Stanton, Wm. H. Nicholls, Geo. M. Luther and Jacob Langeloth, all of New York; J. P. Graves and A. L. White, of Spokane; W. H. Robinson, of Granby, Quebec; H. L. Higginson, Arthur C. James, Geo. C. Clark of Boston, and George M. Baker, of New York.

The retiring directors were S. H. C. Miner, A. C. Flumerfelt, Fayette Brown, J. H. McKechnie and C. S. Houghton. The head office hereafter will be located at Grand Forks, B. C., and the Montreal office removed to New York.

The annual report that was presented showed the amounts received and expended for the year ending June 30, last were as follows:

Making a net profit for the year of \$283,514, which with the surplus from last year made a total surplus of \$833,000.

In addressing the shareholders President Miner said: "It is now seven years since I became identified with this property. These seven years have been years of very strenuous work and the progress which the company has made has been secured only by your management with much difficulty, always working together with mutual confidence and unity of purpose. I ask that my name be not put up for re-nomination to the directorate. I am, however, one of the very largest shareholders in the company, notwithstanding reports to the contrary. I have good faith in the property if well managed, and shall always have a deep interest in and best wishes for its success."

From the above it appears that the American interests now have control of the Granby Co., but there is nothing to indicate that James J. Hill, of the Great Northern, has secured a dominant interest, as so loudly proclaimed a few months ago, and steadily denied then and since by the president and manager of the Granby.

It is stated that 380,000 shares still remain in Canadian hands, while 950,000 shares are owned by Boston, New York, Spokane and other American people. As the direct management remains where it has been for the last six years, in the hands of Jay P. Graves,

the same policy will probably be continued regarding the plans of the company, which is good news for residents of the Boundary country.

### Boundary Mining Notes

The work of erecting the ore bunkers at the Brooklyn mine was started this week.

Ore shipments were started from the Athletan this week, at the rate of a carload daily.

Forces are gradually being increased at all the mines of the Montreal & Boston Consolidated.

Active work was resumed at the Last Chance mine this week, under the direction of D. W. McVicker. The mine is owned by a Spokane company, is equipped with machinery, but has been idle for about five years. It is said that a long tunnel will be driven from a low level.

### SKYLARK TAKEN FOR \$30,000

Bonded by Five Residents of Phoenix.

ACTIVE WORK ALREADY STARTED

Well Known High Grade Claim Two Miles from Phoenix Is Being Pumped Out—History of the Mine.

The rich Skylark claim has at last passed into the hands of a syndicate of Phoenix men under lease and bond. Negotiations have been going on for some months to this end, and now A. B. W. Hodges, O. B. Smith, Jr., W. S. Macy, Dr. R. B. Boucher and H. A. Wright have started a force of men at work on the property, which is located about two miles from Phoenix, in the high grade belt. The owner, Giovanni Lavagnini, of Salt Lake City, Utah, and the bond is granted on favorable terms, the payments extending over two years. The price is not made public, but it is understood to be in the neighborhood of \$30,000.

Last Saturday the initial work consisted in getting a No. 5 Cameron pump and a boiler on the ground, and already the water in the shaft has been reduced some 30 feet under Foreman Roe. As soon as this is completed, the active work of development will commence and be carried on energetically. A number of parties have been trying to secure a bond on this well known property for nearly a year past—since more attention has been directed to the high grade prospects of the Boundary—but none of them were successful up to the present.

The Skylark is one of the oldest and best developed claims in the camp of the same name. It was located in July 1893, by James Atwood and partner, and later was bonded to Howard C. Walters of the Spokane and Great Northern Mining Co., who worked the property and shipped about 100 tons of high grade ore the following winter. Considerable work was done in 1898 by C. E. Ruger, of Butte, Montana, but owing to the lack of transportation facilities work was suspended. The property is developed by an incline shaft of 100 feet, with some 325 feet of drifting, besides surface cuts.

The shipments that were packed out in the early days by Mr. Walters, gave from 150 to 300 ounces in silver and \$15 to \$20 in gold, the second class ore running somewhat less.

J. C. Eden and other Great Northern officials gave a dinner in Spokane Monday night in honor of the Montreal & Boston party then on the way home from the Boundary.

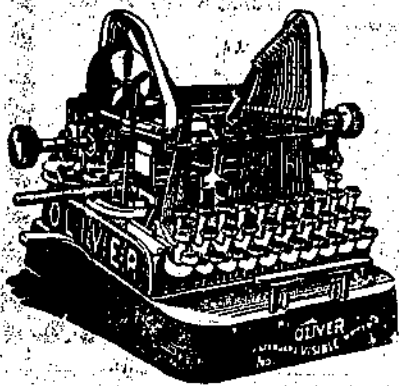

YALE-CARIBOO**Their Line-up in Last Pro-  
vincial Election.**FIGURES TO INTEREST POLITICIANS**Out of a Total of 5,537 Voters, the Conserv-  
atives Secured More Than the Liberals  
and Socialists Combined.Now that the Conservatives and  
Liberals and Socialists have made  
nominations to contest the constituency  
of Yale-Cariboo in the approaching  
Dominion elections, some figures in  
regard to the vote in this Dominion  
constituency at the last election—a  
provincial election—which was held on  
October 3, 1903, will be found of in-  
terest, and will be worth while pre-  
serving, as being an indication of the  
trend of the voters' opinion—at least  
in that contest. In this Dominion  
constituency of Yale-Cariboo there are  
eight provincial constituencies, and the  
total of the votes cast in these con-  
stituencies, by parties, in the election  
referred to was as follows:

From these figures it will be noticed  
that the Conservatives polled more  
votes than the combined other two  
parties by 157 ballots. In detail the

Conservative nominee being returned  
by acclamation, and the total of names  
on the voters' list being used in that  
case. In some of the other consti-  
tuencies there were a few spoiled  
ballots, but the totals are substantially  
the same. The Socialists had nomi-  
nees in Grand Forks and Greenwood  
ridings only, out of the eight. In  
Cariboo there are two members, each  
voter being allowed to vote for two.As the campaign becomes more in-
