

To Make New Colors.

A very simple process of making new colors is that of placing together sheets of glass on which various tints have been spread. A large number of these shoots are prepared, embracing a wide range of colors and shades. After being thoroughly dried two or more of them may be held to the light. The blending of the tints as the light passes through suggests new tones ind shades and permits the experimenter to settle upon whatever is most desirable without the trouble of mixing and working with liquid dyes. In addition to this as a commercial advantage the experiment as a color study is instructive and entertaining. Defeat of the Government - A French Statement-Salisbury in Consultation Fa-hoda to be Evacuated

Paris, October 16 .- The French government has been defeated and has resigned. On the motion of the deputies requesting the government to "End the campaign of insult against the army," there was a majority of 40 against the government reported, after the result of scrutiny had been declared. Bertcaux moved a vote of confidence in Brisson which was rejected by 286 to 254. Most dis-graceful scenes followed in the chamber. On the streets the Cuirassiers were called out to assist the police. Dreyfus was burned in efflgy and cries of "Vive l'armee." The present crisis is an extraordinary one and the next few weeks will be full of paril for the French republic.

FASHODA TO DE EVACUATED

Paris, October 26.—M. De Presense, editor of the Paris Temps writes to the Daliy Chronicle saying it is the settled intention of the French govern-ment with the perfect assent of the French people to evacuate Fashoda. 
