## AN IMPORTANT DEAL

REVENUE ON THE MOHAWK  
LEAD SOLD ON MONDAY

## THE BOND HAS BEEN TAKEN UP

And the Money Paid Over—Another  
Property on Pool Creek to be Put  
Under Development—A Rich Lead  
With the Promise of a New Camp in  
Near Future—Pool Creek Properties  
Last August a bond was given to  
Mr. Otto Abeling on the Revenue on  
the Mohawk lead on Pool creek, and  
on Monday the deal was put through  
by W. B. Pool and the cash paid over  
to the owner, Arthur Ellis. The  
Revenue is situated on Pool creek,  
about eight miles from Thomson's  
Landing, and is reached by a first-  
class pack trail. There is plenty of  
timber and water on the claim for the  
purpose of mining. The ore is of a  
similar character to that found on the  
Beatrice and is on the same ledge.  
Beyond all doubt the Mohawk lead  
has the best showings of any lead in  
the whole of Kootenay today. It has  
been the wonder of all mining men  
who have visited that district. With  
the extensive development work now  
being done on the Beatrice, the Mo-  
hawk lead should be well advertised  
and will bring the Pool creek camp  
into prominence next year. It is the  
intention of Mr. Abeling to push the  
development work on the Revenue, and  
the HEALD wishes the new owner  
every success. A shipping mine will  
be the result of the work at an early  
date there is no doubt.

## ON THE BEATRICE

The Property Bonded by the Boucher  
Bros. Looks Well

Most encouraging reports are being  
received concerning the Beatrice, in  
the Lardeau, recently bonded by O. J.  
and Joseph Boucher. No. three tunnel  
at the foot of the hill has been run  
80 feet and will probably crosscut the  
ledge in a few days. Those who are  
doing the work say that at the bottom  
of the shaft they drifted on the vein  
to the surface, a distance of 95 feet,  
and at the top of the shaft they have  
been drifting and crosscutting about  
30 feet.

A large ore house has been  
built at the mouth of No. 3 tunnel, and  
82 sacks are stored there ready for  
shipment. There is altogether 332  
feet of work done on the property.  
Snow began falling on the property  
about the middle of September and at  
present there are between three and  
five feet on the claims and it is a big  
undertaking to get up or down. The  
force of men will be increased as soon  
as a railway trail can be constructed.  
—Trail Creek News.

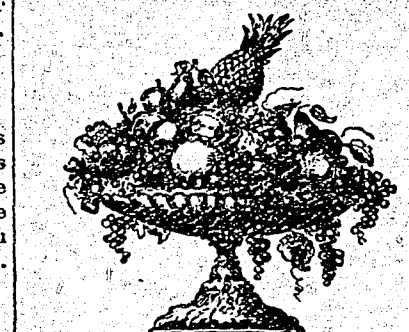

## CLOSING LONDON OFFICE

THE B. C. GOVERNMENT GETS  
A SCORCHING

## IT WAS VERY FALSE ECONOMY

The Schoolboy Tactics of the Local  
Government Calls Forth a Storm of  
Condemnation from Officials, Finan-  
ciers, Shareholders and the Press—  
Wouldn't Even Send a Box of Ore  
London Correspondent of the Rossland Miner  
What is the new British Columbia  
government up to? First it closes the  
London office and then it refuses to  
participate officially in the proposed  
mining exhibition to be held here  
next year. The group getting the  
the latter affair together has  
not done much at present, but  
any effort made to enlighten the  
public regarding the mineral wealth  
of the province is deserving of recog-  
nition, and it would not have done  
the government any harm to promise  
to send a box or two of representative  
ores so that those persons who are  
shareholders in British Columbia  
companies could go and see the kind  
of mineral deposits which are in  
due time become dividends. The  
closing of the London office is a more  
serious affair. It was stated that the  
government, after getting rid of  
Vernon, contemplated placing its  
affairs in the hands of a firm of  
estate agents in the city. Their con-  
duct drew forth a storm of condem-  
nation from officials, financiers, share-  
holders and the press. To shut off all  
available supplies of information was  
too bad. The situation was admirably  
summed up by Sir Charles Tupper in  
an interview with him a few days ago.  
He said he was sorry, indeed, to hear  
that the office of the agent general  
for British Columbia had been shut.  
"I consider it of the utmost impor-  
tance," said Sir Charles, "that the  
government of British Columbia  
should have a well informed agent  
here, thoroughly acquainted with the  
province, and able to give persons  
interested in this country reliable  
information, particularly at the  
present time, when so many events  
of momentous importance in the de-  
velopment of British Columbia are  
happening. The interests of the  
province demand that there should  
be some agency for the distribution of  
accurate information regarding the  
country. So in the development of  
British Columbia and Canada generally,  
that it is absolutely indispensable  
that statistical and other data should  
be readily forthcoming from some  
office situated in the city." Sir Charles  
seemed to think that the decision in  
question would probably be followed  
up by the appointment of a new  
agent-general in London, and if a  
rumor current in that city is correct,  
the British Columbia government has  
already regretted its mistake and  
speedily endeavored to atone for the  
bad impression previously created by  
the decision to close the Westminster  
agency. Let us hope that this is true,  
for it would be a piece of gross  
stupidity to let the new man have his  
office up in Victoria street West-  
minster, far from the haunts of busi-  
ness men. It is in the city that we  
want information; it is in the city that  
the London agency should be located.

## Charlie Off to China

## CLAIMS NEAR FERGUSON

PROPERTIES THAT WILL MAKE  
THE LARDEAU HUM

## TRANSPORTATION NEXT SEASON

Almost a Certainty and Nothing Re-  
mains but to Get the Ore to Smelters  
—The Lardeau Bound to Surpass the  
Slocan—Property Holders in That  
District Well Satisfied—Other News  
MOUNTAIN VIEW AND BLUE JAY  
Are located at the head of Silver Tip  
creek and is reached by way of the  
north fork of Lardeau creek. A  
wagon road extends for a couple of  
miles up this stream and after reach-  
ing it a trail leads up to the property  
by way of the Big Five claim. The  
ledge is about 15 feet in width and  
contains from six to twelve inches of  
clean ore, the balance being good con-  
centrates. Returns from assays taken  
on the clean ore and concentrates  
mixed give \$57 to the ton in silver.  
The lead is very strong and extends  
plainly in sight for over 1800 feet and  
ore has been knocked from it at  
intervals for the entire distance. The  
property is owned by Messrs. J. and  
P. Comerford. Considerable work is  
being done on this property and so far  
the operations have been very satis-  
factory.

## BRUCE

This claim is situated about three  
quarters of a mile northeast from  
Ferguson and is approached by a trail  
leading from that town. The ledge on  
this property is about 40 feet wide and  
carries galena and carbonates. Sam-  
ples of the carbonates have been  
assayed and gave returns of \$22 in  
gold. The Bruce adjoins the Oriental  
and is on the Great Northern lead. It  
is owned by Arthur Cunningham.

## COPPER QUEEN GROUP

This group comprises three claims,  
the Copper Queen, Silver Cup No. 2,  
and the Montana, and is situated on  
the mountain side about four miles  
down the lake from Trout Lake City.  
The lead on these claims is very well  
defined and has been worked con-  
siderably. Assays from the product  
of the operations gives \$40 and seven  
ounces silver.

## AMERICAN

This property is situated at the head  
of Haskins creek, a tributary empty-  
ing into Haley creek, about two miles  
from its mouth. The lead, about 14  
inches in width, lies in a formation of  
gray slate, and carries a galena ore  
which assays from 60 to 80 ounces of  
silver and 80 per cent. lead. All the  
work done, and it is considerable,  
shows the vein to be continuous, also  
that the quantity and quality of the  
ore remains unchanged. A good trail  
commences about 1 1/2 miles from the  
foot of Trout Lake and leads up the  
mountain, about four miles, to the  
claim.

## THE ALICE

This group lies about four miles  
north of Trout Lake and two miles  
from the Silver Cup mine, and is  
reached from 8 miles down the lake by  
a trail leading to the property. The  
ore is a quartz gangue carrying galena  
and gold and lies in a formation of  
black slate and porphyry, which can  
be traced clear across the claims. The  
ledge is about five feet in width and  
has been worked extensively giving  
returns of 25 ounces silver and \$53  
gold. The ore shipped was taken out  
by way of Trout Lake City to Thom-  
son's Landing.

## BLACK DIAMOND

Is located between the south fork  
of Lardeau creek and Haley creek, and  
is reached by a trail starting from the  
foot of Trout Lake and extending a  
distance of five miles to the property.  
The lead contains a body of clean ore  
ranging from 12 to 18 inches in thick-  
ness, the character of which is a mix-  
ture of galena, iron and copper, lying  
between walls of lime and slate. Assay  
values average 57 ounces silver, \$10  
gold, 42 per cent. lead and 34 per cent.  
copper. The work done on this claim  
consists of an open cut of 20 feet and a  
tunnel of 8 feet, showing the vein at a  
depth of 25 feet to be increasing in  
value. The Copper Leaf, an adjoining  
property, is staked on a parallel lead  
which shows about 12 inches of yellow  
copper ore lying in a slate formation.  
Very little work has been done on this  
claim, but what has resulted in re-  
turns from samples taken from the  
workings, of \$73.82 copper value, 18  
ounces silver, 7 1/2 per cent. lead and  
\$2.60 gold.

## A RAILWAY ACCIDENT

A SPECIAL CARRYING SOLDIERS  
AND MARINES DERAILED

## TWO KILLED THREE INJURED

The Soldiers and Marines Were En  
Route to Esquimalt—The Engine,  
Two Baggage Cars and Three Colo-  
nists Off the Track—A Broken Rail  
the Cause of the Accident  
WINNIPEG, Nov. 1.—At 1:50 yester-  
day morning while the westbound  
special passenger train with the Brit-  
ish Government soldiers and marines  
were passing a point 1 1/2 miles east of  
Rat Portage—the tender of the engine,  
baggage cars, and four colonist cars  
were derailed. The engine with the  
exception of the rear driving wheels  
remained on the track. The tender,  
two baggage cars and three colonist  
cars went over the embankment,  
which is ten or fifteen feet high and  
were considerably damaged. The  
fourth colonist car left the rails but  
remained upright on the ties. The  
confiscatory car and sleeper on the  
rear end were not derailed. F. Fleck-  
ney and W. Miller, boys from the  
trainship "Agincourt," Chatham,  
England, were killed, Samuel Harri-  
son, stoker from Edinburgh, and Thor-  
burn, ordinary seaman, were injured,  
also a man named Sam Smith from  
Papineauville, Que., who was borrow-  
ing a ride, having got on the train be-  
tween two cars at Hawk Lake. He  
had his right arm broken. A train of  
coaches to replace those damaged was  
started from Winnipeg early this  
morning. The passengers and baggage  
are now being transferred and will  
reach this city this evening. The  
injured men were attended by their  
own doctor who was on the train, and  
other medical help was immediately  
sent from Rat Portage. The cause of  
the accident was a broken rail. The  
track at this point is laid with heavy  
72 pound steel and long, single bars  
covering three ties.

## MISS JANE COOMBS

What the Troy Record Says About This  
Remarkable Woman—Her Acting in  
"Black House" Was Amazing.

From the Troy Record: Last night  
it was refreshing to look upon the  
audience that witnessed "Black  
House." Most of those present at  
some time during their life had fallen  
under the magic spell of Charles  
Dickens had been enthralled by the  
wonderful power of his "matchless  
stories and with a thrill remember yet  
the old old tales of human misery and  
despair that darkened the pages of  
that immortal.

Miss Coombs as Lady Dedlock, was  
a revelation. The curtain had scarce-  
ly risen before the strong dramatic  
subtlety of the woman could be seen  
to fall upon the house like a spell,  
calm and subdued the affairs was  
completely possessed of all the exact-  
ing situations of the play an arce  
faute to each climax. Her care-  
ful guarding of her secret in the scene  
where Talkingham subjects her to a  
cross-examination to extort a con-  
fession, her forced composure during  
her agony, and finally her defiance of  
Talkingham after he had gained pos-  
session of the letters which places her  
in his power, were masterly, and the  
house rang again and again with ap-  
plause. In the fourth act where Lady  
Dedlock discloses her identity to her  
child, it is no exaggeration to say that  
the audience was bathed in tears for  
the repentant mother.

It was perhaps the most remarkable  
bit of character work ever seen in the  
city, the Hortense of Jane Coombs  
will not be forgotten by anyone who  
has ever witnessed it. It was pre-  
pared by a crafty, revengeful, passion-  
ate, reckless delivery that was start-  
ling. The supporting company was  
very good indeed. The return en-  
gagement of Miss Coombs will be  
looked forward to with much interest.

## Naval Activity in Britain

LONDON, Nov. 1.—Although at the  
present time there is a slight lull in  
the excitement regarding the Fashoda  
question, naval and military activity  
continues unabated. The British  
emergency squadron is now assem-  
bling at Davenport. Three first-class  
battleships have already arrived. A  
very significant incident in connection  
with the naval preparations is the fact  
that the press has been notified  
not to publish any information which  
might prove useful to a possible  
enemy.

### STORMS AND BLIZZARDS

CONDUCTOR KILLED.

PRECAUTIONARY MEASURES.

Montreal, October 26.—The British government have issued instructions to the Canadian Pacific railway to hold their Pacific liners in a perfect state of readiness for active naval service at a moment's notice.

THE MISSING DOCTOR.

The missing Doctor Ireland is now said to be en route to Great Britain.

MILITARY MOVEMENTS.

Halifax, October 26.—Extraordinary activity continues in naval and military circles here. The Colonial Imperial troops will be mobilized today. Two more cruisers have arrived.

SMALL POX IN ONTARIO.

Toronto, October 26.—A case of small pox is reported from Cobourg, Ontario.

SOUTH ONTARIO NOMINATION.

The Hon. Dryden and Charles Calder were yesterday nominated for South Ontario.

WISE MEN IN THE EAST.

Regina, October 26.—K. McInnis has retired from the contest in North Regina, and Wm. Trant from the contest in South Regina.

EDITH COLE RETURNS.

Ottawa, October 26.—Edith Cole, who was thought to have been abducted, has returned to her home in a dazed condition.

## MINISTRY RESIGNS

### CRISIS IN FRENCH POLITICS

#### WANT OF CONFIDENCE MOTION CARRIED

Defeat of the Government.—A French Statement—Salisbury in Consultation—Fa-hoda to be Evacuated.

Paris, October 16.—The French government has been defeated and has resigned. On the motion of the deputies requesting the government to "End the campaign of insult against the army," there was a majority of 10 against the government reported after the result of scrutiny had been declared. Bertinot moved a vote of confidence in Brisson, which was rejected by 286 to 254. Most disgraceful scenes followed in the chamber. On the streets the Cuirassiers were called out to assist the police. Dreyfus was burned in effigy and cries of "Vive l'armee." The present crisis is an extraordinary one and the next few weeks will be full of peril for the French republic.

FASHODA TO BE EVACUATED.

Paris, October 26.—M. De Presense, editor of the Paris Temps writes to the Daily Chronicle saying it is the settled intention of the French government with the perfect assent of the French people to evacuate Fashoda. Marchand is to be recalled by the minister of war, and the friendly offices of the British and Egyptian governments will be accepted.

THE FASHODA CLAIM.

Paris, October 26.—A despatch to The Temps from London asserts that the precise question regarding the Upper Nile question is this: Great Britain, having declared her claims on Fashoda, asked France to submit whatever proposals she wished to make. M. Delcasse, the French foreign minister, replied plainly that France demanded an outlet on the Nile, a reservation being made concerning the geographical points to be determined upon. Lord Salisbury, the prime minister, is now consulting his colleagues on the subject.

Canadians are not doing well this season on the London markets. They have arrived there in bad condition, spotted and partially blighted, hence the price is down. Gravenstein brings from 12 to 17 shillings, pippins 23 to 30 shillings only per barrel.

## CORRUPTION RAMPANT

Another Edmonton Man Writes Interestingly from Dawson.

The editor of the Alberta Plaindealer has received a letter from F.H. Herbert, formerly of South Edmonton, now of Dawson, in which he says: "I have been here three months but have made very little yet. It seems to me that it is all luck and that hard persistent work does not count."

There is a man at the mills and creeks all summer and have dug and worked faithfully and found very little. I have found several places where I could wash from \$5 to \$8 a day but I could not be content with that. The thousands that are here are taking everything they can get. I believe lots of them are making less than \$5 a day. The country has been terribly overworked and thousands have begged themselves in coming here. All down the Yukon, up the Selwyn, White, Stewart Pelly and other rivers has been prospected by men who have worked faithfully and not a single thing has been found that has anything on bed-rock. There has been no new strike. Eldorado creek is very rich in spots, so are its benches. There is a man at the mouth of it who has raked \$2,000 in a day with one assistant. Skookum gulch comes into Bonanza at No. 2 above Discovery and there is perhaps the richest spot in the country, or on earth for all that is known. You can see the gold in the gravel in nuggets. I staked a good bench claim on Bonanza but lost it by not standing in with the officials. I tell you I have been sore to see the way that British law and justice have been dealt out here. The shame that has been put on the British flag here has never been known in British territory. From the boundary at Lake Bennett to Dawson corruption has been rampant all summer. It seems that all officials, from the lowest constable to the gold commissioner have just been "in it" for all they could make. If a man staked a claim that the recorders thought was a good one, that man would have a hard time to get it. They would send some friend to stake it and tell the other man to come back in ten days, at which time they would tell him it was recorded. I never had occasion to feel ashamed of being a British subject until I came here. Ogilvie came in ten days ago. He may be able to change things, but it is doubtful.

Lord Rosebery is still one of the most popular men in England. He is shrewd, clever, rich, and fortunate in all he takes hold of. It was said of him that in youth he had three wishes. One was to win the Derby, another to marry the richest woman in England and the third was to be prime minister. And he got them all. He would be a great fellow to bull thorn-bones.

Nelson Miner: A local paper gravely announces the birth of a child in this city two weeks old. This extraordinary occurrence shows the phenomenal fecundity of this neighborhood. The ozone in the atmosphere is believed to have something to do with it. But scientists aver that it is entirely due to the latitude. After a while, when this grand province gets a good start and shakes off the inertia that now restricts its powers, children will be born here big enough to vote.

## KITCHENER IN LONDON

### ARRIVAL OF THE GENERAL

#### A RUMORED EGYPTIAN PROTECTORATE

Paris News—The New Cabinet—Storm in Chicago—The Governor of Illinois and Labor.

Dover, England, October 28.—Lord Kitchener, of Khartoum fame, arrived at Dover yesterday afternoon from Paris, and was frantically cheered by enthusiastic crowds of people who had assembled to welcome him home. He was met at the landing place by Major General Sir William Francis Butler, military commander of this district, and by the mayor, corporation and other celebrated local functionaries, who presented Kitchener with an address of congratulation.

KITCHENER IN LONDON.

London, October 28.—General Kitchener, the hero of the Egyptian campaign, arrived here yesterday afternoon, and was greeted by the Commander in Chief of the British forces, Lord Wolseley, and other high military officers. On being interviewed in Paris by leading English correspondents he stated that he believed that the diplomats would settle the present difficulties between France and England.

APPLAUD A FRENCH SONG.

An audience assembled in Birmingham, England, cheered loudly the French military song "La Marseillaise."

THEY TALK WAR.

Paris, October 28.—At 9:30 o'clock last night a report reached here from London that Lord Salisbury and the members of his cabinet had voted proclaiming a protectorate over Egypt. This was accepted as authority when ever it gained currency. For the first time during the present crisis Paris stopped discussing the Dreyfus case and talked of the war at its very doors.

DREYFUS CASE.

A motion for the revision of the celebrated case was presented in the Paris Court of Cassation this morning.

AWAY FROM PARIS.

Louis Napoleon is at present in Geneva and the Duc D'Orleans at Brussels.

ASKED TO FORM A CABINET.

Mons. Dupuis has been invited by President Faure, of the French republic, to form a new cabinet.

TALK TALK FOR A GOVERNOR.

New York, October 28.—Governor Taft, of Illinois, threatens to kill foreign laborers who attempt to enter the state looking for employment.

WILL LOSE THEIR JOBS.

Washington, October 28.—Six thousand United States civil servants are to be dismissed shortly.

DAMAGED BY STORM.

Chicago, October 28.—This city has suffered damage to the extent of \$81,000 by the recent disastrous storm.

SELLING RAILWAY TICKETS.

Free Press: Most people are unaware that it is a criminal offense to buy or sell a railway ticket outside of the regular agents of the company. But such is the fact, and the statutes of Canada provide that the punishment for this crime is a fine Canadian Pacific Railway have been up to \$50 or imprisonment. The patient for some time, but the evil of selling the return part of a cheap ticket has become so pronounced that the company has determined to put a stop to the practice, and hereafter will press for the imprisonment of a culprit as well as a fine. The man whom he had the ticket was taken off the train here and Hitchcock was made to refund the money and pay a fine of \$30 and costs or 60 days in jail. A special agent has been employed by the company to detect any one guilty of similar misdemeanors.

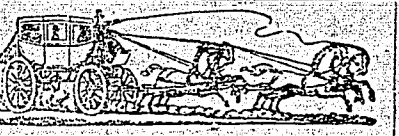
