BOUNDARY MINING NOTES.

Greenwood Times.

The Oro Denoro in Summit camp is to be equipped with a five-drill compressor plant. The company proposes making small shipments as soon as they can get cars from the C. P. R. The connection between the east drift from the bottom of the main shaft to the No. 2 tunnel is completed. Besides giving ample ventilation for the mine the connection has opened up a section of stopping ground fully 400 feet in length.

It was learned Wednesday that the deal on the Mountain Chief, in Myers Creek camp, was closed. The representative of the Montreal syndicate which purchased the controlling interest in the stock will shortly be in Greenwood to wind up matters. The Mountain Chief is owned by a Greenwood company.

The annual meeting of the Cariboo Consolidated Gold Mining and Milling Company was held in Toronto on the 7th instant. The directors recommended that an addition of 10 stamps be added to the mill, and stated that there was ore enough already blocked out to keep the mill going for several years. They decided to change the name of the corporation to the Cariboo-McKinney Mining and Milling Company. Total dividends paid to December 31st, 1899, \$109,337.52.

The shaft on the War Eagle, in Greenwood camp, has reached a depth of 45 feet. The ore now being taken out is a black hematite and copper. Captain Shields, the superintendent, has a force of 12 men at the mine, and is working three eight hour shifts in the shaft.

THE BANK OF BRITISH COLUMBIA NELSON

Is now prepared to issue Drafts and Letters of Credit on Skaguay, U. S., Atlin, B. C., and Dawson City, N. W. T.

The shaft on the Marie claim, the south extension of the Buckhorn mine in Deadwood camp, is down a depth of eighteen feet. The ore encountered is a calcite with iron pyrites and copper. Harry Shallenberger is the owner.

Eight car loads of ore have already been sent from the Winnipeg mine, in Wellington camp, to the Trail smelter. A ninth is now being loaded at Hartford Junction. Duncan McIntosh, president of the Winnipeg Mining Company says that the smelter returns were most satisfactory.

An English Traitor Shot.

New York, February 14.—A story sent to the Paris Temps from its correspondent at Durban, which tells of the execution of an English lighthouse-keeper, who was a spy in the service of the Boers, is printed by the Herald today. One day while a troopship was passing the high promontory on which the lighthouse is situated, an officer's attention was attracted by singular

heliograph signals that were being made on the other side of the lighthouse. The keeper was watched, and it was found that by the use of an ordinary heliograph code he signalled each new arrival of troops, each movement in the port, and the number of men, cannon and horses to accomplices situated on a mountain some distance away. These messages were repeated from post to post, and reached the Boer headquarters on the Tugela river in two or three days, and this had been going on for some time since the outbreak of the war. The keeper eventually confessed that he was paid \$300 for each telegram and before beginning his operations had received \$3500 on account. His guilt was proved by an examination

of his account at the Transvaal National Bank, which has a branch at Durban, and which paid him the money. He was a full-bred Englishman, sixty years old, and had been employed in the lighthouse for a long time. His wife and five children would not believe in his guilt and a painful scene took place when he was transferred on board a man-of-war where he was shot.

Had No Money on Him.

NEW YORK, February 14.—Police captain Reynolds tells an interesting story of how he captured W. F. Miller, the 520 per cent year syndicate man. He says he learned that a young man who was suspected of being a go-between was in New York, and shadowed him to Mont-

real. This man, and the fugitive met on a corner and shook hands. Captain Reynolds recognised him. "He turned in surprise and looked at me when I spoke to him," says the officer. "Do you know me?" I asked of Miller.

"I am captain Reynolds of Brooklyn," I told him.

"He did not seem much to care. 'I'm willing to go back,' he said. 'I'm tired of being away and want to see my wife and babies.'"

Miller had only seventy-five cents in his pockets when he was captured.

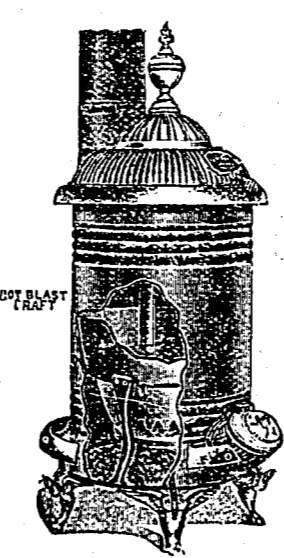
