## THE KAISER DECLARES WAR

## Germany Must Be Avenged.

BERLIN, July 3.—In addressing the detachment of German marines which sailed from Wilhelmshaven for China yesterday, the emperor made a remarkable speech during which he notified the world of Germany's intention to avenge the murder of the baron von Kettler, the late minister of Germany at Peking, and the missionaries, and to dictate terms to the Chinese from the palace at Peking. The emperor said:

"The firebrand of war has been hurled in the midst of the most profound peace. Unhappily this was to me not unexpected. A crime of unspeakable insolence in its barbarity has been committed against the person of my own representative, and has taken him from us. The ministers of the other powers hover between life and death, and with them the comrades sent for their protection. It may be that while I speak they are fighting their last fight.

"The German flag has been insulted and the empire treated with contempt. This demands exemplary punishment and vengeance. Events, which have moved with frightful rapidity, have become profoundly grave and still graver. Since I called you to arms, what I hoped to effect with the help of the marine infantry has now become a difficult task, which can only be fulfilled with the help of the armed ranks of all civilized states.

"This very day the commander of the cruiser Squadron has asked me to consider the dispatch of a division. You will have to face an enemy who are no less courageous than yourselves and trained by clever officers. The Chinese have learned the use of European weapons.

"Thank God your comrades of the marine infantry, and my navy when they have encountered them, have proved themselves to have old German valor. They have defended themselves with glory, have won victory and have done the duty committed to them. I now send you out to avenge the wrong. Do not rest until the German flag, joined to those of the other powers, floats triumphantly over China's flag and until it has been planted on the walls of Peking to dictate peace to the Chinese.

"You will have to maintain good comradeship with the other troops whom you will come in contact with over yonder. Russians, British and French, all alike, are fighting for one common cause, for civilization. We must bear in mind, too, something higher, our religion and the defence and protection of our brothers out there who stake their lives for the Saviour. Think about the honor of our arms, think of those who have fought before you—Go forth with the old Brandenburg motto, 'Trust in God and stand bravely.'

"This is the whole of my honorable duty.

"For who, helped by God, dares battle heartily, is never driven from the world."

"The flags that here float above you go under fire for the first time. See that you bring them back to me clean and stainless, without a spot. Many thanks. My prayers and my solicitude are with you."

The emperor's departure for Norway has been postponed.

## Will Test McInnes' Assertions.

OTTAWA, July 3.—[Special to The Tribune.]—In the senate today petitions were presented asking that the senate do not reject the Chinese restriction immigration bill. Bowell moved for all papers and correspondence in connection with the dismissal of lieutenant-governor McInnes. He did not do so for the purpose of championing the lieutenant-governor. He referred at length to how McInnes spoke of having letters from the government, written by the secretary of state, asking him to pursue a certain course, and that afterwards he (McInnes) was asked to burn them. Scott said he would bring down the returns. As an old personal friend he had written McInnes personal letters giving him his views of what should be done. Now that these letters were referred to, he had no objection to bringing them down. It was very improper to have referred to these letters, but he would now ask McInnes to have any restrictions to bring them down, removed. If his advice to McInnes had been fol-

lowed he would be still lieutenant governor. Mills said that when the correspondence came down it would be shown that in the light of English parliamentary practice McInnes' conduct would be found indefensible. He denied that McInnes had offered to resign. He had offered to give up his position for one he thought more important. The motion for the papers passed.

## Emperor Backed Up by Press.

BERLIN, July 4.—The emperor's address is commented upon enthusiastically by a majority of the press. The Post says: "The speech moves by its contents and fires by its energy. As a representative of an enlightened modern nation as well as of a people which does not allow a blow to their national pride to go unpunished, Kaiser Wilhelm dwelled very strongly not only upon German, but also upon general interests. The Peking deed of horror to him, is an awful crime against civilization itself." The Tageblatt dwells strongly upon the emperor's use of the word "war," and says the kaiser meant thereby not formal war, but a campaign of redress. The paper declares that it is highly advisable that the reichstag should hold an extra session, which would show that the emperor has, in all measures which he deemed necessary, a united nation behind him.

## As Seen in Shanghai.

LONDON, July 4.—4:55 a. m.—The Shanghai correspondent of the Times, telegraphing on Monday, says: "The edict issued at Peking on June 26th amounts to an open challenge to the powers, and practically declares war. It commands the provinces to enroll the Boxers and troops to assist to expel the foreigners." A special dispatch from Shanghai, dated July 2nd, says that the Tao Tai of Shanghai has notified the Chinese newspapers, that, beginning with July 5th, no notice will be taken of decrees of the so-called imperial government, as prince Tuan had seized the power on that day.

## Situation in Tien Tsin Desperate.

CHEFOO, July 3.—It is reported that all foreigners have been ordered out of Tien Tsin. The situation is considered desperate. The Chinese are pushing their entrenchments under the walls. The railway between Tien Tsin and Lu Tai is in the hands of the Chinese.

## TROOPS MASS AT HEILBRON

## Feed Starving Boers.

LONDON, July 3.—The following dispatch has been received at the war office from lord Roberts:

"PRETORIA, July 3.—General Hunter's division has crossed the Vaal and should be at Frankfort today, where he will be joined by colonel Macdonald's brigade from Heilbron.

"General Buller's leading brigade has left Standerton for Graylings.

"Both here and at Johannesburg several families of the men who have been fighting against us are being fed. Some are in a state of destitution.

"At Heilbron, where the food supplies ran out, groceries, meat and other supplies of food are being distributed among the inhabitants under the supervision of the relief committee. Arrangements are being made for the distribution of oats for seed purposes for farmers actually in need of it, and those who are unable to procure seed oats in any other manner."

LONDON, July 3.—The following dispatch was received this afternoon at the war office from lord Roberts:

"PRETORIA, July 3.—General Hunter reached Frankfort on July 1st without opposition and Macdonald joined him there yesterday. He found two men of the Seaforths and eighteen of the Derby militia in the hospital. They had been well treated by the Boers.

"Methuen reports from Paardes Kraal, on the Heilbron-Kroonstad road, that he has captured the commander of Dewet's scouts, two other prisoners and Andies Wesels, the head of the Afrikaners band."

The war office has received the following dispatch from general Buller:

"STANDERTON, July 3.—Clery occupied Greylingstak yesterday without opposition, but met with a good deal of sniping. There were four or five casualties."

## SPORTS WERE A SUCCESS

## The Second Day.

The second day of the big celebration was even greater than the first, and the Nelson athletes covered themselves with glory, winning the hub-and-hub, wet test, baseball game and the association football match. The baseball game attracted over a thousand spectators and was undoubtedly the best exhibition of ball ever seen in the country. The celebration was fittingly closed by a magnificent water carnival, a display to which our beautiful lake peculiarly lends itself. Though a little marred by a slight shower early in the evening the procession of lighted boats over the dark water was a beautiful sight, while the pyrotechnic displays and bonfires across the lake with the searchlights of the big steamers all added to the effect.

The sports in detail follow: The races and Caledonian games on Baker street yesterday afternoon were witnessed by several thousand spectators who thronged the course from Stanley to Hall streets.

The greatest interest naturally centered about the horse reel races, in which the Nelson team distinguished itself as usual, capturing both events in splendid style.

The hub-and-hub race came first Nelson being drawn against Greenwood. The home boys won the heat in 17½ seconds. Later they defeated Grand Forks somewhat easily. The time was not taken in the second heat.

The wet test also fell to Nelson's share. The Greenwood team ran first and made the race in 27.25 seconds. This was regarded as a splendid performance, and it was felt that Nelson had a big contract on hand to win out. The enthusiasm of the Nelsonites can be imagined when it was announced that the home team had made the test in 25.35 seconds. Grand Forks followed but played in hard luck. Their leader had been hurt in the bicycle race and water was turned into the hose before the nozzle was coupled, thus ruining their chances. The Nelson men offered Grand Forks a chance to run again for first money, but the offer was declined with thanks. Then it was decided to give Grand Forks \$50 for competing.

The last of the sports was the association game between Nelson and Silverton. The latter had carried everything before them on Slokan Lake, and were confident of victory. Nelson, however, won by one goal to nothing, which was scored towards the end of the first half after some very pretty play. Craugh brought the ball down the left wing and centered beautifully, Thompson passed out again to Martin, who put it cleverly between the posts with a swift low shot. The Nelson forwards kept the ball in the Silverton territory most of

the time, but missed several good chances of scoring. Their team play was better, but the passing was often very erratic. Silverton put up a superb defense, their backs tackling well, and kicking strongly and accurately. Dill did some excellent work for Nelson as back. Craugh was perhaps the pick of the forwards, but Joe Thompson and Martin also showed up well. Nelson plays Grand Forks this evening. The teams were:

The closing scene in the celebration was the water fete last night, and this feature proved to be one of the most successful and interesting events of the entire two days' programme. The fete might have been greatly improved upon, but the blame for such drawbacks as there were rests wholly with the authorities who control the weather bureau. About 8:30 o'clock a shower of rain fell, which soaked many of the lanterns used in decorating the craft, thereby destroying the symmetry of the exhibits in many instances and delaying the entire proceedings for an hour at least. This was followed by a strong wind, which prevented the craft from lining up in a procession as was intended, and which would have added considerably to the effect.

Despite these handicaps the carnival was a rare treat from a spectacular point of view, and fully justified the celebration committee in announcing it as one of their premier attractions. The water front was covered with boats of every description, from a Swish canoe to the C. P. R. steamers. The intermediate classes included skiffs, rowboats, sailing craft, steam launches and tugs, not to mention the barges crowded with spectators and towed by tugs.

When the tug cleared and the boats were enabled to get into a semblance of order the ensemble was charming indeed. The general decoration scheme was in Chinese lanterns and thousands of them were used on the hundred odd boats on the water. Some of the designs were very original. The C. P. R. boats were loaded with passengers and their busy searchlights were flashed about from point to point throughout the evening. The tug Hercules took a C. P. R. barge out well filled with spectators who desired to witness the pageant from the waterside. The tug Procter was employed for the band and judges. The Ontario Powder Company's tug, the Red Star, took out a handsomely decorated and illuminated barge, arranged by the members of the Young Canadian Club for themselves and a large party of guests. The launches Flirt, Vedette, Mischievous, Donna, Maple Leaf, Pretoria and Hale's gasoline launch were all in line and carrying decorations. Cleopatra's needle was a miniature of the famous obelisk, lighted up from within and surrounded by Chinese lanterns. It was mounted on a small barge which the wind blew up the lake before it could be got into line. When the tug sent to the rescue brought the Needle back into order, a number of the lights had burned out so that many spectators missed this feature. On the far side of the lake a host of lanterns were displayed against the side of the mountain, among the designs being a large star and a crescent. The McArthur & Co. pile driver was gaily lighted up and brilliant magnesium lights were burned from the top of the 40-foot upright with splendid effect.

The judges were R. F. Green, M. P. P., of Kaslo, and C. Mackintosh, junior, of Rossland. The prize for the best decorated launch went to the Flirt, the decorations on which were designed by Mrs. J. W. Troup. The launch Pretoria, owned by captain Gore and F. W. Peters, had aboard a chorus of children who sang sweetly as the craft steamed past the judges stand. They were awarded the prize for the best music. In sailboats the honors were carried off by W. J. Astley's Bobs, which was handsomely decorated to the top of her mast and yards. Mrs. W. A. Macdonald won the prize for the best decorated rowboat in close competition with half a dozen other craft of similar size. The prize for canoes was awarded to C. B. Winter.

## NELSON WINS A FAST GAME

## First Class Ball Played.

Yesterday the Nelson ball team wiped out Monday's defeat. It was an excellent game of ball and was witnessed by fully one thousand spectators. The feature of the game was the pitching of Kelly, who was formerly with the Stanford University team. He put up the best specimen of ball that has been seen in Nelson, which was made effective by the magnificent support which the local team gave him. Three hits were charged up against him, but two of them were of the doubtful variety which with proper handling the Nelson fielders should have secured. Waters went behind the bat for Nelson, and, considering the fact that he had never caught Kelly before made a very good showing. He had two passed balls, which advanced Davy from first to third, and eventually enabled him to score, but aside from this he put up a faultless game.

Olsen, who went into the box for the visitors, put up a very strong game. The locals, who had knocked him out of the box in Spokane, thought they were going to have a soft thing, but in this they were disappointed. The Rossland man caused no less than nine of the locals to strike out, and all told they secured but five hits off him. He received good support, and saying a fumble by Fay in the eighth innings, none of the three errors made by the visitors were costly.

The local team went in to bat. Houston the first man up was presented with a base, and it looked as if Nelson would go on the score cards. Partridge, however, forced Houston out at second, and Waters with a sharp grounder enabled Gibson to make a double play by retiring him and catching Partridge between the bags.

In the second innings Rockenfield got as far as third, but failed to score. With Kelly gone, Olsen sent Rockenfield to first. He made a neat steal on Shea and travelled to third on Herron's sacrifice, but Mills with a fly to Olsen shut out possibilities. In the next innings Nelson did not reach first.

Partridge opened the fourth with a two-base hit to center, and Waters, the second man up, got first by being hit by Olsen. Kelly followed Waters, with a pop fly to Olsen, which was gathered in, and Rockenfield contributed a strike out. Herron then sent a grounder to Vaughn, who cut Waters off at second and retired the side.

Nelson bunched three hits in the fifth and secured two runs. Mills, the first man up, got in his usual hit; and Eacritt, who followed him, drove the ball into the left garden for two bases, advancing Mills to the third bag. Worth then drove a hot grounder through the center of the diamond for a safe hit, and Mills and Eacritt crossed the plate. Houston then made a short hit to Davy, who returned it to Vaughn, who shut Worth out, and then shot it in to Gibson in time to make Houston's slow base running fatal with a double play. Partridge then struck out, and the score stood two to nothing.

It was one two three order for Nelson in the sixth. In the seventh, however, Herron got first on an error at second. He was advanced to second on Fay's fumble of Mills' hit to third. Eacritt then sent a liner to Fay, who redeemed himself by shutting Herron out at third and throwing Mills out at second. Worth striking out retired the side.

Two runs were added by Nelson in the eighth. Houston got first on an error at third. Partridge then put in a long hit to right. It got into rough ground, and bounding over McDonald's head, Partridge jogged home before the ball could be returned. Waters then struck out. Kelly and Rockenfield were in turn presented with a base and advanced on Herron's sacrifice. Mills then struck out, and the score stood four to one in Nelson's favor, the locals not reaching first in their half of the ninth.

Erbe was the only Rossland man to reach first in their first innings. He was the first man up and was presented with a base by Kelly. Erbe did not advance. Dovey was caught out on a difficult fly by Houston, Vaughn went out on a fly to Kelly, and Shea struck out.

In the second inning, Russell, the first man up, got in a hit and got to second on an error by Eacritt.

Gibson Fay and McDonald went out in succession.

Rossland did not reach first in the third, and in their fourth, Russell, who got there on a charity, was the only Rosslander to reach Partridge. In the fifth inning with two men gone Olsen got in a two-base hit, but Erbe went out on a pop fly to Kelly.

Rossland's solitary run was made in the sixth. Dovey drew a charity, traveled to second on a passed ball, got to third on another and travelled home on Waters' throw to Partridge to shut Vaughn out at first, after he had fanned the air. Shea then sent a long fly right, which Herron should have secured but which was charged against Kelly as a hit. Russell was hit by Kelly and given a base, after which Gibson sacrificed and advanced both men. Fay then retired the side with a short hit to Eacritt.

In Rossland's seventh McDonald sent a grounder to Houston and was thrown out at first. Olsen repeated the performance with the same result. Erbe then sent a very difficult fly above second, which was cleverly secured by Eacritt.

The eighth was unlucky for Rossland. Davy opened with a long fly hit to left which looked safe, but Worth got under it, and made a grand stand catch. Vaughn got in a safe hit to left. Shea then went out a fly to Houston. Russell got his base on an error by Eacritt, but Gibson going out from Kelly to Partridge retired the side.

McDonald was the only man to reach first in Rossland's half of the ninth. After Fay was thrown out by Eacritt, McDonald was given a base by Kelly and stole second. Pitch, who was substituted for Olsen, went out on a fly to Houston and Erbe completed the game by striking out.

## Are Under Rifle Fire.

TIEN TSIN, June 20—via Chefoo, July 1st, and Shanghai, July 3rd.—A courier from sir Robert Hart, inspector-general of customs at Peking, has just arrived. He left Peking on Monday, June 25th, and reports the situation desperate. He reports that baron von Kettler, the German minister, and his secretary attempted to visit the tsung li yamen. The minister was shot four times and died at the rooms of the tsung li yamen. His secretary succeeded in making his escape. All of the legations except the British, German and Italian have been destroyed. The diplomats and missionaries are in the British legation under rifle fire. Cannon command the legation but they are not being used.

## Are Under Rifle Fire.

It is impossible to start relief to Peking at present. Captain McCalla, commander of the United States cruiser New York, estimates that 50,000 soldiers will be required for the rescue of the ministers.

## Campaigning in Ashanti.

FUMSU, July 3.—The road between here and Prahsu is in some places five feet under water. The headquarter's staff with 150 men of the expedition for the relief of governor sir Frederick Hodgson, of the Gold Coast colony, and 1000 carriers and one gun, is marching at the rate of 1½ miles per hour. Nothing definite is known regarding the situation at Kumassi.

## Precautions Against Spies.

PRETORIA, July 3.—Lord Roberts, in order to check the operations of spies, requires that every man over 16 years of age, shall be registered and shall carry a permit.

## IS A NEW DRILLING RECORD

## Feat by Ross and McLeod.

The drilling contest on the vacant lots east of the Queen's hotel was the first important event on yesterday's program and it proved to be one of the most interesting of the entire celebration. Five teams drilled and one of these made a record which is said to be the best by half an inch. The contest was witnessed by a couple of thousand spectators who crowded every available vantage point. The Slokan Star and the Greenwood teams won the money.

The officials in charge of the event were Bruce White and E. R. Woakes, judges, Jacob Dover and Harry Howson, timekeepers. The stone used was a fine block of coarse grained granite without a trace of iron and six feet long by two feet square, set upright. The day was only moderately warm and the conditions favorable to good drilling.

The teams which had complied with all the conditions required to compete for the Robertson trophy and purse were drawn to drill as follows:

Granite mine—Welch and McNeil. Slokan Star mine—McLeod and Ringwood.

Ymir mine—Oddie and Moriarty.

Teams were also present from Rossland and Greenwood, but the judges refused to permit them to compete on the ground that they had not met with the requirements in forwarding their entries. W. A. Gallier, came forward, however, and announced that the city would give a purse of \$100 for the deepest hole drilled regardless of the competitors' qualifications. The two crews in question then lined up as follows:

Greenwood—Ross and McLeod. Rossland—Stevenson and Durham.

The contest was not started on time, but at 11 o'clock the Granite mine started work. It was their first competition and they seemed rather nervous but both men proved to be clever drillers and good stayers. McNeil got a bad smash on the hand before the steel was set, and although he stayed pluckily with the game the team was practically out of the running, although they beat Ymir by a long lead.

The Slokan Star men, who have won several prizes in similar contests, then took the platform. Their performance was splendid. The drilling was clean and the men finished strong.

The Ymir team were the last of the trio to compete for the trophy, and while they changed steel neatly, they did not put the weight into the hammers that the other teams used.

The Greenwood men were found to drill. Ross was a giant in strength and his blows were delivered with tremendous force. McLeod was lighter but faster, and he changed steel with lightning speed. They started in with full vigor at the first stroke and when time was called the spectators realized that their performance was above the ordinary.

The Rosslanders came last and drilled well. In the last three minutes they had trouble with the steel, the drills becoming stuck in the bottom of the hole through faulty smithing.

The holes were then opened and declared to measure as follows: Greenwood team, Ross and McLeod, 42½ inches.

Slokan Star team—McLeod and Ringwood, 41 5-8 inches.

Rossland team—Stevenson and Durham 35½ inches.

Granite team—McNeil and Welch, 36 inches.

Ymir—Oddie and Moriarty, 31½ inches.

The Robertson trophy with \$100 added goes, therefore, to the Slokan Star team. The boys from the Granite mine won \$50 second money and the extra \$100 given by the city goes to the Greenwood team. As stated above the 42½ inches made by Ross and McLeod is said to be a record.

## Immense Chinese Army.

LONDON, July 4.—The Times' St. Petersburg correspondent says that on June 30th the grand staff of the Russian army estimated the Chinese army to number 1,752,000. He also says that about 900,000 Mausers have been imported within the last three years.

### IMPERIAL PRIVY COUNCIL.

A little more than two hundred years ago a London topographer described Downing street as "a pretty, open place, especially at the upper end, where are four or five large, well-built houses fit for persons of honor and quality, each house having a pleasant prospect into St. James Park with a terras walk." Sir George Downing, secretary to the treasury, in 1661, Arthur de Vere, the last earl of Oxford, sir Robert and lady Walpole, the elegant Horace Walpole, and others of honor and quality have lived in the street and walked on the "terras," but the old houses and their inhabitants are gone, and the short, gloomy street between the treasury and the foreign office cannot now be considered a "pretty, open place." It is, in fact, a business street, and, like other such streets, is not a very desirable place for residence. To be sure, it is the business of a great empire which is there conducted, and so the very name of the street has become a proverb and a household word, smacking at once of all that is formal and official.

On the right hand side out of Whitehall is a brass-plated door, bearing the inscription "Privy Council Office," and if the curious visitor, having previously obtained the sanction of Mr. Preston, F.S.A., mounts the lead-covered stairs, he will find himself in a room on the first floor, in which some of the most important business of the greatest empire on earth is carried on. And such a room! A plain, staid, common-place room with a half library, half court of justice sort of look, and absolutely nothing about it which suggests Imperialism; nothing, in fact, but substantial bookcases, solid chairs of the common domestic pattern, and a solid table covered with green baize. This is the privy council chamber, the sanctum sanctorum, the ultimate court where the sovereign of the empire listens (by deputy) to the plaintiffs and suggestions of her subjects from all over the world. The sovereign is represented by several judges, members, of course, of the privy council. Among them is the lord chancellor himself, the lord chief justice, the lord justice of Ireland, the president of the probate and divorce court, and the five lords of appeal who hold life peerages for judicial work in the house of lords.

The procedure of the court is as informal as its housing is dingy. The judges wear no robes, and they relieve the monotony of a prolonged sitting by warming their coat-tails

at the fire. No one has ever suggested that their judgments are any the worse because their coat-tails are warm. Possibly, they are better. But, taken in conjunction with the meanness of the courtroom, the informality of the judges tends to impair the dignity of the tribunal. A much more serious evil arises from the long delay which often elapses between the hearing of a case and the delivering of a judgment. If it should happen that during this interval one of the three judges who heard the case dies, the whole proceedings must be re-commenced, and the parties must bear the extra expenditure.

These facts will readily explain the desire of Australian lawyers to set up an appeal court of their own, which shall take part of the work now done by the privy council. The same desire was expressed by Canadian lawyers when a federal constitution was established in Canada, but fortunately the power of the privy council was maintained, and its judgments have since been of the greatest value in interpreting the Canadian constitution. Even more value is attached by Indian litigants to the jurisdiction of the privy council as a means of correcting the possible errors of the presidency courts. In a recent pamphlet Mr. Haldane tells an ex-

cellent story of a remote hill tribe who were discovered by the district officer making sacrifices to a new god. "He is a very powerful god," they said, "for he has given us back the land the government wanted to take from us. He lives over the sea, and his name is 'Privy Council.'"

The proposal to transfer the work of the judicial committee of the privy council to the house of lords, and so create a single imperial court of appeal, is not, however, one that can be carried out off-hand. Mr. Montague Crackanthorpe, writing to the Times not long ago, pointed out some of the difficulties, and at the same time, took up the cudgels in defence of the present habitat of the privy council, which someone had described as a "shabby room up a dirty stair-case, off Downing street," while some one else with even greater irreverence, had actually described the august court itself as "the dowdy court of Downing street." Mr. Crackanthorpe does not agree with such talk, and considers the chamber admirably adapted for its purpose, the accommodation for solicitors and law agents being excellent. A more pleasant tribunal to practice before, he thinks, could not be imagined. The lord sits, minus his robes, as a simple English gentleman without thereby losing a particle of his dignity, and there are no full-bottomed wigs. Mr. Crackanthorpe points out too, that one of the salient features of the privy council is that there is only one judgement delivered, the opinions of the dissenting minority, if any, being suppressed, and so, as lord Selborne said, the moral weight of the council is much increased. When it speaks it speaks on undivided authority. Whereas,

in the house of lords each peer delivers his opinion separately, and so it may happen that a suitor who has had the judges in his favor in both the courts below, may irretrievably lose his case in the court of final appeal by what he may be excused for regarding as the accident of a single adverse vote. In the event of an imperial court of appeal being formed it would have to decide on one or other of the two methods—unity, or multiplicity of utterance. If the many-voiced system of the house of lords is to prevail, it is possible that the colonies and dependencies and the native Indians, whose causes are constantly before the privy council, will lose some of their confidence in the judges. It is a time of change and readjustment. Before long perhaps even such an ancient institution as the judicial committee of the privy council will have ceased to exist—merged in the house of lords—and its room, with its green baize table and chairs and book cases may be either swept away altogether or may become a mere lumber room.
