FOOTBALL PRACTICE GAME

Notes on Athletics.

The practice football match at the recreation grounds last night proved to be an interesting game, and while the play might have been improved upon in many respects, it sufficed to demonstrate the team's weaknesses and to give the players a first-class practice. The ball was kicked off at 7:15, the teams lining up as follows:

The teams played half an hour each way and the play was fast throughout. The players were inclined to play offside, and although the referee did not detect this feature, there were half-a-dozen off-sides on each side. No goals were scored. Various free and corner kicks were placed in splendid style, but the forwards did not seem to be strong at critical points. The club must improve in combination tactics before the Kaslo game, and the forwards, while conscientious and quite aware of the necessity for team play, have not yet acquired the knack of passing at the right moment. Games such as last night's are of considerable value in developing team play and it is probable that another game will be arranged next week, particularly as the picked team were disappointed in securing a couple of strong forwards whom they believe would have turned the scale in their favor. Rev. William Munroe made his first appearance on the field for the season, playing goal. He distinguished himself several times by saving his goal and raising the ball over the 25-yard mark from a scrimmage. Wallack got a nasty cut over the left eye in a collision with Dr. Morrison.

A new candidate for honors in the long distance running contests on Dominion Day has loomed up in the person of Wallack, who played in last night's football team. Wallack has been exercising with George Nunn for several nights, and if he enters the races at the celebration he will probably surprise some of his opponents. It is stated that he has competed in England against Bacon, the amateur champion, and has won a long string of prizes on various occasions. Any man who is in Bacon's class is a crackerjack and Nelson runners should buckle down to business if they are to hold their own.

The backdown of the Greenwood club over the proposed visit of the Nelson Lacrosse Club has left the home team in a quandary. It is of course impossible under the circumstances to bring Greenwood here for a game on July 3rd as was contemplated, and the intervening time is altogether too short to arrange for another team to come here. This is most regrettable, for the fast Macleod twelve could doubtless have been secured for a game had the management felt dubious about the Greenwood match materializing. A meeting is to be held next week, of which ample notice will be given, and the matter of the club's policy for the balance of the season will be gone into. It has been suggested that by dividing the fast men and recruiting new material three city teams could be organized and a city league formed which would keep up interest in the pastime. Otherwise there seems to be no alternative than to let the game go by the board for the season at least. Many of the lacrosse enthusiasts, needless to state, are most averse to this course and will make a strong effort to keep the game to the fore in the hope that the revival of interest which seems to have struck the eastern towns and cities will reach Nelson by next season.

It is stated that the fast steam yacht Oriole will be brought from Trail to Nelson for the summer. The Oriole has the reputation of being a flyer. There are the elements of a splendid launch race in Nelson, and every sportsman would like to see the little steamers come together. The Flint is undoubtedly the fastest of the lot were she in first-class trim, but it is generally understood that she has not received the best of treatment, and her effectiveness may be seriously

impaired. The Vedette can raise a good deal more steam than her engine can utilize, so that it is somewhat difficult to say how fast she can move, probably her owners do not know accurately themselves. The Pretoria has a larger propeller than she ever carried before and may prove to be speedier than is generally thought. The Fern also has a new propeller, which is expected to improve her speed materially. The Mischief, if given a thorough overhauling, would never cross the line at the tail end of the procession, and the Oriole is altogether an unknown quantity. It will thus be seen that a race between the launches would be well worth witnessing, and it is to be hoped the event can be pulled off, if not during the demonstration then at some date in the near future.

The challenge cup donated last year by the Kootenay Cigar Manufacturing Company for bicycle races is on exhibition in Jacob Dover's window. The conditions attached to the trophy are that it must be won three years before becoming private property. At last year's celebration Charles Hiperson carried off the trophy, but he is out of the city this summer. Three annual wins is almost too big a string to tie to a cup in a non-bicycling city like Nelson. If a man could retain it after two successive victories more interest might be taken in the contest.

The baseball club got away for Spokane in good style yesterday morning with a strong contingent of followers. The results of today's game are to be received by innings over the wires as the match progresses, and will be announced at the Manhattan saloon.

SIR HENRI JOLY SWORN IN

McInnes Not Pitied.

OTTAWA, June 22.—[Special to The Tribune.]—Lieutenant-governor McInnes was officially notified today that he was dismissed. There is but one opinion expressed here on the subject and that it was well deserved. Had he dismissed Duns-muir, Turner and Eberts for their extraordinary conduct in giving in to the resolution to censure the man he swore to faithfully serve, he might have gained a little in the public estimation, but he lost that chance.

Sir Henri Joly was sworn in as lieutenant-governor in his place, and M. E. Bernier takes the place of Joly as minister of inland revenue. Both were sworn into office today. Chief justice McColl will act as administrator until Joly arrives.

The appointments were given out today in the house and the senate.

The Political Tangle.

VICTORIA, June 22.—[Special to The Tribune.]—Premier Duns-muir received word from Ottawa today that Joly, the new governor, would leave for Victoria on Monday. Chief justice McColl has been appointed administrator pro tem. Writs for the Wells, Prentice and McBride by-elections were issued today, but will not be signed until McColl reaches here from Vancouver on Monday. The house will meet on July 19. Eberts is to be opposed in South Victoria by Sangster, whom he defeated in the general election. R. E. Gosnell, formerly of Greenwood, has been appointed secretary to the premier.

Galena From Boundary.

A new departure has been made by a Boundary mine and a car of galena has been sent out to be treated in the lead stack at Trail, says the Grand Forks Miner. This is one of the first, if not the very first, shipments of such ore sent out of the district. The City of Paris over in Central camp is the property which is making the shipment and it was hauled down to Grand Forks by wagon and here loaded onto the cars for the smelter. During the early development of the property a considerable showing of galena was made and subsequent development opened up a good sized lead of the mineral. It was from this lead the shipment was made.

Relief of Kumasi.

PRAHSU, June 22.—There is no fresh news to hand from Kumasi, but the local authorities think that the relief of the town may now be effected any day. The casualties of the relieving forces of all ranks aggregate 300 already.

CITY LOCAL NEWS.

A few finishing touches are being put on T. G. Procter's houseboat, which will be occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Procter in a few days. He will have the craft towed to a point near the end of the street car line and anchored there for a couple of months at least.

The proposition to form a salvage corps in connection with the local fire department which was mooted after the Burns fire seems to have fallen through. Alderman Irvine, who had the matter in hand, wrote to the insurance underwriters' association and received a reply stating that the plan would be laid before the board. Since then nothing whatever has been heard.

Robert Bullock was charged at Fernie on Thursday with having in four instances obtained money under false pretenses from Chinamen, and of having stolen moneys collected by him as licenses. The latter charge was dismissed, and on the first four counts defendant was committed for trial. P. E. Wilson appeared for the crown. Bullock was released on two sureties of \$100 each.

Thursday was a record breaker with the street car company. During the day 2000 fares were collected, which is the best day's business the company has yet had.

Travellers who have occasion to use the Nelson & Fort Sheppard road will not be sorry to learn that as soon as an engine can be obtained a tri-weekly freight service

is to be introduced. This removes the necessity for the passenger train hauling freight and will do away with the vexatious delays which have been the rule of late.

A party was given yesterday evening at F. L. Irwin's residence in honor of A. G. Lambert's birthday. The guest of the evening was the recipient of several valuable presents, after which a pleasant evening was passed.

Henry Ferland, son of Arthur Ferland, returned yesterday afternoon from St. Boniface College, Winnipeg, to spend the summer holidays with his parents.

The duties of the postmaster at Kitchener are being fulfilled by a deputy, the postmaster, Mr. Curry, having been brought down yesterday to spend six weeks in castle Fitzstubs. John Collins and John Couture, also of Kitchener, were in the party and will serve similar terms.

Several citizens who have come in over the Crow's Nest road during the last day or two state that great interest is being manifested at Fernie, Fort Steele and other points along the line in the Nelson demonstration and that these towns will each send strong contingents to take in the festivities.

A party of tennis players leave this morning to play at Rossland. Among those who propose to go are F. A. Macne, W. P. Dickson, P. Criddle, H. W. F. Pollok, Mrs. Pollok and Mrs. M. Bird. A series of singles, doubles and mixed doubles will be played against the Rossland club.

At the present time 37 prisoners are confined in the provincial gaol. This number has only been equalled on one previous occasion and is unprecedented for this time of the year.

The midsummer examinations at the Central school concluded yesterday. The papers written by the pupils, who are taking the high school entrance exams, will be forwarded to Victoria for scrutiny, and it is not known when the results can be announced.

The officer commanding the local militia company states that every member must be on parade at the armory tonight sharp at 7:30 o'clock. Sergeant Knight will be present to instruct the company in Maxim gun drill and the order for the drill is imperative.

Sending Reinforcements.

WASHINGTON, June 22.—The administration is endeavoring to stimulate the dispatch of troops and naval reinforcements to China to meet the emergency at Tien Tsin. Reports that have been received over night at the navy department, but which are temporarily withheld from publication, are, it is believed, confirming the reports from Europe of the need of reinforcements for the international forces at Tien Tsin. It is understood that low water in the Pei Ho river is preventing the naval vessels at Taku from going to the assistance of the small force in Tien Tsin, and it is probable that no boat drawing more water than a torpedo boat can get that far up the river. In that case, the purpose of the navy department in hastening the gunboat Nashville and the old Monocacy to Taku has been in part defeated for even with their light draft, it is improbable they could ascend the Pei Ho as far as Tien Tsin during low water. In this case, the only recourse is in the use of troops and naval battalions after. The distance from Taku to Tien Tsin is about 30 miles, but the traveling is bad, and if there is much opposition, the journey might occupy several days. The emergency described in admiral Kempf's despatch led the war department to make an extra effort to hurry forward the Ninth regiment from Luzon to Taku. It was reported by general McArthur upon the receipt of the original to send these troops to China, that owing to the break in railway communication between Talarac, the headquarters of the Ninth, and Manila and the prevalence in the harbor of a typhoon it would probably not be possible for the troops to get away before the 24th. The war department is now determined that this movement shall be hastened if it is possible to do so, and has instructed general MacArthur in such fashion as to warrant the belief here that the troops will be on their way to China not later than tomorrow evening, thus saving one or two days on the original calculations.

ROBERTS' NET IS COMPLETE

Strathcona's Horse Praised.

LONDON, June 23.—3:45 a.m.—President Steyn's forces in the Orange River colony are, for the time being, drawing most of the attention of lord Roberts, rather to the neglect of commandant general Louis Botha and president Kruger. The severance between the Transvaal and the Orange River colony was completed yesterday, as lord Roberts said it would be, on the arrival of general Buller's advance under lord Dunderdald at Standerton. The wide net around the 8000 or 8000 men under Steyn will now contract. Adroit manoeuvring and brisk fighting are likely to take place, because it is necessary that all resistance south of the Vaal cease to make it safe for a line of communication.

President Kruger's sons, who surrendered to general Baden-Powell, are back on their farms working peacefully. General Baden-Powell rode with only 800 men from Mafeking, and he made the last section of the ride to Pretoria with only 35. Lord Roberts met him in the outskirts of the town and escorted him to the residency.

General Dewet's farmhouses have been burned to the ground by the British. General Buller has issued a special order eulogizing the services of Strathcona's Horse. Captain Jones and the brigade from H. M. S. Forte have been ordered back to their ship at the admiral's request.

KASLO LOCAL NEWS.

KASLO, June 22.—[Special to The Tribune.]—Some of the swimmers of the town are busy at practice, with a view to entering at Nelson on Dominion Day.

Sam Sing's laundry caught fire yesterday morning and visiting insurance men had an opportunity of seeing how the local volunteer brigade works. The fire lads had the blaze under control in a few minutes.

The "boys," old and young—had a great time the other night, chartered the Alberta and went on a moonlight excursion to Ainsworth. There were about seventy jolly good fellows on board and they had a jolly good time.

Just before Mr. Duns-muir became premier he made a provisional arrangement to visit the Slocan. He is the chief owner of the Noble Five. His visit has been indefinitely postponed.

The men who were set to work by order of the Martin government on the South Fork wagon road have been paid off. About \$400 was spent on the road.

It has been learned here that W. W. Turner, who was formerly editor of the British Columbia News of this town, has resigned his position as principal of the normal school at Cheney, Washington.

A good fall is looked for in this region. There is some inquiry for mining properties, particularly in the Lardo district.

The books and documents for the Kaslo supreme court registry have arrived and the court will be established in a few days. The court will fill a long felt want.

Cable to Belle Isle.

OTTAWA, June 22.—[Special to The Tribune.]—It is learned at the public works department today that a tender has been accepted for the supply of material for a cable between Belle Isle and Canada. The cable must be delivered in Canada within eight weeks and before the season of navigation closes connection will be had with Belle Isle by cable.

Where Laws Are Enforced.

WASHINGTON, June 21.—Immigration inspector W. D. Morse today notified the commissioner of immigration that he had interviewed the superintendent of construction of McKenzie, Mann & Co., contractors for building the Manitoba and Southern railway in Canada and the Minnesota and Manitoba railway in the United States, relative to the employment of Canadian

laborers in the United States. At present operations are in progress between Sprague station and the Minnesota border line. About 100 laborers are employed, 75 per cent being reported as employees from the United States and the balance from Canada. The superintendent has been instructed that he could work his entire gang on this side of the line as long as their camp remains in Canada, but as soon as it is necessary to remove the camp to the United States he will be obliged to discharge his Canadian laborers and employ only Americans.

Relief Column for Tien Tsin.

LOME, June 22.—A dispatch from Taku, dated yesterday (Thursday), says: "An international column consisting of British, Russian and Japanese troops left Taku this morning for Tien Tsin. An Italian detachment, commanded by an ensign, will remain here to guard the Italian flag which, with the flags of the other powers, has been hoisted over the forts. The detachment of Italian sailors which participated in the capture of the forts suffered no loss. The German reinforcements from Kiau Chou and the British reinforcements from Hong Kong have arrived here."

Dutch Railway Employees.

AMSTERDAM, June 22.—The Netherlands Railroad Company of South Africa has received official notification of the expulsion from the Transvaal of 1400 of its employees with their families. The Dutch consul at Lorenzo Marquez telegraphs that a proclamation has been issued to the effect that the company's officials who refuse to do British military transportation duty will be sent to Europe via East London, Cape Colony.

ORDER TO RUSSIAN PAPERS

Extraordinary Rules.

LONDON, June 22.—The correspondent of the Daily Express says that the Russian minister of the interior, M. Sipiaguine, has issued the following instructions for the guidance of newspapers in dealing with the far eastern question:

First.—No reference to the movements of Russian troops on war ships.

Second.—Papers must bear in mind that the czar is actuated only by a desire to maintain peace and good will among the nations.

Third.—No gossip about differences among the powers that would be displeasing to the government.

Fourth.—No criticisms of Russian diplomacy or of military or naval strategy.

Fifth.—Editorial writers should recollect that Russia is predestined to predominate in Asia.

Sixth.—Comparisons may be made between Russian and foreign troops and seamen when unfavorable to foreigners.

France and Morocco.

LONDON, June 23.—The Times says this morning: "On June 9th the government of Morocco sent a formal demand to the French government for European arbitration of the questions in dispute between Paris and Tangiers. Morocco contended she possesses a mass of correspondence with the Algerian Drais (Turkish government of Algiers) before the French conquest of 1830) conclusively proving that the oasis of Tuatt (nearly equally distant from Morocco, Algeria, Tunis and Pessean) formed part of the Moorish empire and was so recognized by the predecessors of France in title."

Situation in Pekin.

LONDON, June 22.—A special dispatch from Shanghai, dated Thursday, says: "A prominent resident of Pekin received at Tien Tsin, on June 15th, reports that the soldiers were troublesome in Pekin, that a night attack on the legation was feared and that the advent of the relief force would be the signal for a general riot in Pekin."

Russia's Troops Mobilize.

LONDON, June 23.—The Petersburg correspondent of the Daily Mail, telegraphing Thursday, says: "The Russian minister of war, general Ouropatkin, yesterday ordered the mobilization of all the Siberian regiments of the line."

Bernier Will Be Unopposed.

OTTAWA, June 22.—[Special to The Tribune.]—The elections in St. Hyacinthe will take place on July 11th. Bernier is not likely to be opposed.

HARD FIGHT AT TIEN TSIN

Pekin Still Silent.

LONDON, June 23.—3 a.m.—The silence of Pekin continues unbroken. Four thousand men of the allied forces were having a sharp defensive fight at Tien Tsin on Tuesday and Wednesday, with a prospect of being reinforced. This is the situation in China, as set forth in the British government dispatches.

"Eight thousand Americans are taking part in the fighting at Tien Tsin," says the Shanghai correspondent of the Daily Express, cabling last evening, "and they apparently form a part of the supplementary force, arriving with the Germans and British after the conflict started. It is impossible to estimate the number of the Chinese there, but they had a surprising number of guns."

This information appears to have been brought by the United States gunboat Nashville to Chefoo and telegraphed thence to Shanghai.

The Chinese are deserting Shanghai in large numbers and are going into the interior. Reports from native sources continue to reach Shanghai of anarchy in Pekin. According to the statements, the streets are filled day and night with Boxers who are wholly in control of the Chinese troops and are working themselves up into a frenzy and are clamoring for the death of all foreigners.

The consuls at Shanghai still believe the foreign missionaries at Pekin are safe, although Japanese reports received at Shanghai allege that up to June 15th 100 foreigners had been killed in Pekin.

The Daily Express says: "We understand that Mr. R. T. Tower, secretary of the British embassy in Washington is to succeed Claude McDonald at Pekin, and that the reason for Mr. McDonald's recall is the break down of his health."

A dispatch from Vienna says: Li Hung Chang has wired the various Chinese legations in Europe, directing them to inform the governments to which they are accredited that he is called to Pekin by the emperor to act as an intermediary between China and the powers, and negotiate a settlement of the points at issue, and begs the powers to facilitate his mission by ceasing to send troops to China."

Shang, director general of telegraphs, wires from Shanghai to the Chinese legations in Europe that the foreign legations in Pekin are safe. It is reported that the British government will immediately send 1200 marines to China and, possibly, according to some of the morning papers, 1000 of the regulars are now with lord Roberts.

Printer's Eight-Hour Day.

Rosslund Typographical Union some time ago decided that nine hours was too long to work in one day, and accordingly changed the scale to provide a shorter day. It also did away with piecework. The matter was placed in the hands of the executive committee, which went quietly to work and secured the assent of every employer in Rosslund to the proposed change, and also an agreement between them and the union for one year. At a special meeting of the union held last Sunday it was decided to put the new scale into effect at once, and the next day the shorter work day was inaugurated without trouble of any kind.—Industrial World.

Too Much Ore.

On Wednesday the men at the Old Ironsides engaged in stoping were temporarily laid off, simply because the bunkers are full and there is no place to put the ore. There is now 8,000 tons in the bunkers and at least double that amount stowed out in the mine. Shipping will begin early next week, and as soon as the present overflow is met, work will be resumed.

Standerton Occupied.

KAATSBOSCH, June 22.—General Dundonald with the Third cavalry brigade occupied Standerton today without opposition. The burghers left yesterday after having blown up the railroad bridge and doing other damage. The infantry marched 22 miles today and camped at Kaatsbosch spruit to night.

Britain Buys Cannon.

LONDON, June 22.—It is announced that the British war office has bought forty batteries of Krup field artillery.

THE people of Manitoba are becoming very much worked up over the so called prohibition measure which premier Macdonald has caused to be introduced in the provincial legislature. From the controversy which is raging in the press, it is apparent that the social reformers of the prairie province have not yet progressed beyond that stage wherein they desire to make a certain element of the community more virtuous at the expense of the property values of others. This naturally created a strong opposition to the measure, and behind those who raise the cry of compensation will doubtless be found many who, while they would favor total prohibition, look with distrust upon the present measure which promises to breed all the evils of prohibitory legislation and give none of its advantages. It

may fairly be said that the chief results of the enforcement of the Manitoba measure would be to deprive that province of its revenue from the liquor trade. It makes the retail trading in liquor illegal, but places practically no restriction upon the consumption of liquor; and without in any way attempting to enforce an effective prohibition destroys the property and assets of what was formerly a legitimate trade. It looks like another prohibition failure.

OWING to the immigration policy of the Laurier government, which aims at filling the Great West up with assisted immigrants from foreign lands, the Conservative government of the prairie province has found it necessary to materially amend the election laws. It is now proposed that naturalized British subjects, whose names do not appear on the present voters' list, shall be denied the franchise for seven years unless they are able to read the Manitoba Act in either English, French, German, Swedish or Icelandic. No matter how desirable the end sought by the Manitoba legislature may be, it is apparent that the introduction of any such legislative restrictions upon the exercise of the franchise will provoke trouble. If the aim of the Conservatives of Manitoba is to prevent the Laurier government from filling the West with assisted emigrants at the expense of Canada as a whole, and then working upon the sympathies of the people so assisted for political support, it might be accomplished in another way. Why not treat assisted emigrants in the same manner as annuity or treaty Indians are treated? Why not disfranchise all assisted emigrants, or others, who receive government assistance within a certain period prior to their application to exercise the franchise?

THE Liberal newspapers are endeavoring to find excuses for premier Laurier's failure to grapple with the Japanese immigration question. The Manitoba Free Press says there no longer exists any necessity for anti-Japanese legislation, because the Japanese government has issued regulations restricting the number of Japanese who may migrate to fifteen per month. It is rather humiliating that Liberal newspapers should look to the Japanese government for the relief of British subjects in British Columbia. It would not be well for Liberal newspapers to attempt to advance any such argument in British Columbia. British subjects in this province look to the dominion and imperial governments for relief. Though their livelihood may have been imperiled by Japanese competition they have not yet transferred their allegiance to the emperor of Japan. Nor will they be fooled by promises that the Japanese government will apply a remedy for their grievances. They know that for years there have been Japanese laws against emigration; and they know further that they have had

about as much effect in checking emigration as the Laurier government's alien labor law has had in preventing the importation of labor into Canada under contract. The Liberal newspapers can no more justify the framing of Canada's emigration laws in Japan than it could justify the making of Canada's tariff in Washington.

On hearing the name of his host, he turned round, and, nudging Sir James, whispered: "Is that the great Sir Sydney?" "Yes, yes," said Sir James, much amused, and giving Sydney Smith the hint, he instantly assumed the military character, performed the part of the hero of Acre to perfection, fought all his battles over again, and showed how he had charged the Turks, to the infinite delight of the young Scotchman, who was quite enchanted with the kindness and condescension of "the great Sir Sydney," as he called him, and to the absolute torture of the other guests, who were bursting with suppressed laughter at the scene before them. Nothing would serve the young Highlander but setting off at 12 o'clock at night, to fetch the piper of his regiment to pipe "the great Sir Sydney," who said he had never heard the bagpipes. Upon this, the party broke up, and dispersed instantly, for Sir James said his Scotch cousin would infallibly cut his throat if he discovered his mistake. A few days afterward, when Sir James Mackintosh and his Scotch cousin were walking in the streets, they met the Rev. Sydney Smith and his wife. He introduced her, upon which the Scotch cousin said in a low voice to Sir James, and looking at Mrs. Smith, "I didn't ken the great Sir Sydney was married." "Why, no,"

said Sir James, a little embarrassed, "not exactly—married—only an Egyptian slave he brought over with him; Fatima—you know—you understand."

DESTRUCTION BY DYNAMITE.

It was reported from South Africa that the Boers recently attempted to destroy a railway tunnel by starting from the opposite ends two locomotives, heavily loaded with dynamite; that these locomotives collided at full speed midway in the tunnel, exploding the dynamite and, of course, completely wrecking the engines; but according to a later dispatch that the resultant injury to the tunnel itself was relatively small, and could be repaired easily and rapidly. According to another report, the official mining engineer of the Pretoria government, in charge of the Johannesburg gold mines, said that all the mines of the Witwatersrand could be destroyed in two days by the use of dynamite, if such a step should become necessary. The surrender of Johannesburg to the British, however, with the mines intact, disposed of all these reports of contemplated vandalism.

In view of the fact that a proposition to destroy the mines was made and actually discussed, it may be mentioned that "destruction by dynamite" is not so easy and its projectors are accustomed to consider it. This statement, illustrated already by the experience of anarchists, fenians, strikers and inexperienced miners, seems to have received its latest confirmation in the railroad tunnel mentioned above. The fact is, that when the impact of a dynamite explosion is communicated to a large body of air (as was the case in the great Johannesburg explosion five years ago) it may, through that medium, work wide-spread wreck; but when it is immediately received by solid masonry or rock, its energy is largely expended in the molecular work of local pulverization, being generated too instantaneously, and too simultaneously throughout the mass of the charge, to permit its seeking "lines of least resistance,"

or following such lines, once found, with the persistence due to a more gradual expansion, such as the slower, progressive explosion of black powder produces.

Recent Naval Experiments.

The British ironclad, Belleisle, built in 1878 and condemned last year, was fitted up as a target, and used in some recent firing exercises by the channel squadron. Krupp plates were placed in position upon the Belleisle, with the result of proving that the latest type of armor is invulnerable to modern ordnance, for every shell that struck the Krupp plates rebounded into the sea. The value of the fighting tops in cruisers was also demonstrated for in spite of the splinter nets, the five pounders in the tops of the Majestic swept the decks of the Belleisle, which was furnished with a crew of dummy figures. It was made quite clear that the explosion of a live shell inside a ship sets up a volcanic eruption.

Chinese Government Responsible.

BERLIN, June 20.—The responsibility of the Chinese government for recent events, said a high official of the foreign office today, is now clearly proved. It has been ascertained that 10,000 Chinese troops, who deserted to the Boxers, did so under the orders of the Chinese government.

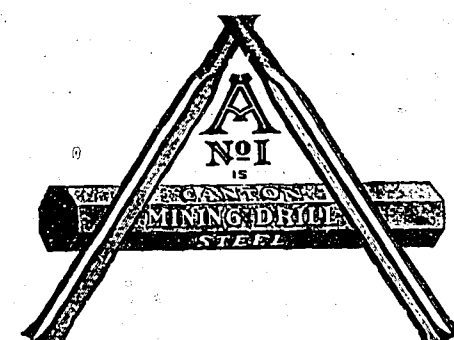
