"Victoria, October 21st, 1898.-Lieutenant governor to Hon. R. W. Scott. Can I constitutionally grant a request for dissolution before the new legislature has formally convened? Please wire reply. (Signed) T. R. McInnes.'

Scott replied as follows: "While technically you might have the right to grant dissolution on the advice of your ministers, yet' the exercise of that power under existing circumstances would be regarded as extraordinary and unprecedented; and I would advise against its exercise. STEVENSON IS NOMINATED

KANSAS CITY, Missouri, July 6.-

Scenes in the Convention.

The Democratic national ticket was completed today by the nomination of Adlai Stevenson for vice-president. The nomination was made on the first ballot, state after state joining in the wild scramble to record their support of the winning candidate. It was not accompanied by any such frantic demonstration of approval as had marked the proceedings at previous stages, although the result followed a spirited and at times, highly dramatic contest between the advocates of Stevenson, Townle, Hill and the lesser candidates.

The distinct triumph of the day in the way of a popular ovation was that accorded to senator Hill, and in its spontaneity and enthusiasm was one of the most notable features the convention has produced. It was accompanied too by a remarkable scene, when Hill earnestly protested to his friends against being placed in nomination and then, finding his protest in vain, when he strode to the platform and in tones which left no doubt of their sincerity he earnestly besought the convention not to make the nom-· ination.

The proceedings today moved with greater briskness than either of the two preceding days, for there was none of the tedious waits for the platform and committees. The aspect of the vast auditorium was truly democratic when the session began. Anticipating the close of the convention the general public was admitted freely, and as a result great crowds emptied into the body of the hall, not only filling every available seat in the arena and aisles, but also overflowing into the arena reserved for delegates, while some adventurous height on the 30,000 people packed below. The crowd practically took possession of the proceedings at times. The chairman and his officials were so powerless to proceed, that they gave up to the multitude until the various demonstrations

spent themselves. On the call for nominations Alabama yielded to Minnesota and the latter state presented its young champion of silver republicanism and democracy, Charles A. Towne. The mention of his name was the signal for a flattering demonstration in his honor, men and women joining in the outburst. Far off in a corner of the auditorium a young woman could be seen frantically waving in one hand a lithograph of the Minnesotan and in the other the stars and stripes. On the floor the Nebraska, Minnesota and one or two other delegations joined in the demonstration, but it was noticeable_that_it_did=not=exciteany widespread enthusiasm among those who were about to do the voting.

Gradually other delegations began to rise, some of the New Yorkers getting to their feet, and for a moment it looked as though the convention might be carried off its feet, but against this was heard a counterstorm of protestation and

discordant hisses. For ten minutes the demonstration for Towne lasted with varying degrees of intensity. Meantime attention was being directed to a group who marched to the New York section with Hill as the vortex of a struggling throng of delegates. They pressed forward from all quarters of the hall urging him to permit his name to be placed before the convention.

The face of the New Yorker was a study as the demands upon him came from all sides. He sat in the front row of delegates with exsenator Murphy on his right and judge Van Wyck on his immediate left. A second seat away was Mr Croker. Hill protested vociferously. Judge Van Wyck said he could not refuse. Murphy and Croker pleaded with him to obey the will of the convention and accept. While the pleadings continued, the call of Delaware was heard above the roar and Delaware yielded her place to

RUSSIA CIVES HER CONSENT

Japan Will Suppress Troubles.

LONDON, July 7, 2:40 a. m.—The Russian government announces it will give Japan a free hand to apply military force in China. The terms of this consent are summar ized in the following dispatch from St. Petersburg under date of July

It is in consequence of this, no doubt, that Japan is preparing to embark 20,000 more troops.

Political considerations that were thought to have been benumbing the action of the powers are thus laid aside, for a moment at least, by the government supposed to have the clearest purposes respecting China's future.

Japan's sending of troops now can have little bearing on the fate of the foreigners in Pekin. Baron Kayhashi, the new Japanese minister who arrived in London on Friday, said that ten days would probe required for the carrying of troops to China. His dictated statements contained these sentences:

"If all the conditions Japan asked were conceded, I see no reason why Japan should not undertake the task of suppressing the troubles. The powers are all agreed in wishing to put down the rebels, but it does not seem that they are agreed on the means.'

From these authoritative utterances, it is inferred that Japan does nominate conditions and that the concert of the powers is a little taugled....

Stories of further horrors in Pekin are gathered by correspondents at Shanghai from Chinese sources. especially of the slaughtering in the Chinese and Tartar city of thousands of native Christians, so that the capital reeks with carnage. Prince Tuan's coup d'etat is de-

scribed by the Shanghai correspondent of the Daily Mail as a sequence to the grand council of ministers, at which Yung Lu advocated the suppression of the Boxers promptly. The downger empress gave her whole support to Yung Lu and a scene of disorder began. Prince Tuan passionately intervened, backed by Kang Hi, they rushed from the council and there partisans raised the cry "Down with the foreigners." The effect was electrical. The eunuchs, palace officials of all sorts and most of the populace took up the cause of prince Tuan and his agents immediately and put the emperor and the dowager empress under restraint.

The Chefoo correspondent of the Express, telegraphing on Thursday, says there is no longer any doubt that disaster has overtaken the Russian force of 3000 that left Tien Tsin for Pekin on June 11th. The Russians had a full field gun complement and carried their own transport. As nothing has been heard from them for 24 days it is assumed that they have been overwhelmed. Trustworthy news is received to the effect that all the country to the northeast of Pekin is covered with the corpses of men and horses of the western garrison.

A dispatch from Shanghai to the Daily Telegraph says that the loss of the allies up to June 28th totalled 600.

According to the Daily Telegraph's correspondent, in a dispatch dated Thureday, United States consul McWade has great influence with Li Hung Chang, and persuaded him to issue a proclamation containing detailed instructions to prefects, sub-prefects and magistrates. It orders them to detect, behead and otherwise severely punish Boxers. These officials, the proclamation says, will be held responsible for the safety of the missionaries and native Christians.

The Hamburg American Steamship Company has placed at the disposal of emperor William their steamer Savoia, due at Hamburg today (Saturday) for use as a hospital ship for China. The emperor accepted the offer with warm expressions of thanks.

ROSSLAND, July 6.—In consequence of the output of the Le Roi increasing in the manner it has done of late, and of the expected and Josie) and of the Le Roi No. 3 (Nickel Plate), it has been definitely decided to considerably enlarge the capacity of the smelter at Northport, which is at the present of a 650-ton capacity, but which is able to deal with a larger amount of ore through subsidiary treatments to a capacity which is nominally double, 1250 tons. New batteries of boilers. which are in the aggregate upwards of 750-horse power, have been or-

dered and are already on the way. A new engine of commensurate capacity has already been shipped. Some of the minor machinery which will be readily erected has not as yet been decided upon, though deliberations are now taking place as to what particular species of this machinery is most desirable. The addition of the new plant will double the present capacities of the smelter. As the excavations and grading for the new engines and boilers were provided for at the erection of the original plant, and as a flue has already been built for the new boilers, there will be no time lost in getting the new works into order. The new part of the smelter will probably blow in before the middle of September. In the meanwhile the ore of the B. A. C. mines which cannot be treated in Northport will be sent to Trail.

Another Big Surplus. OTTAWA, July 6.- Special to The

Tribune.]-Figures prepared by the finance department today show Canada's revenue for the twelve months ending June 30th last was \$49,034,597, as compared with \$44, 698,156, an increase of \$4,336,441 over 1899. The difference shown between revenue and expenditure shows a surplus of \$14,208,197, but there are yet large items of expenditure not to hand. However, when all are in, it will be shown that for the third time in the history of Canada, all expenses will be met out of revenue without adding one dollar to the public debt. For the year there was an increase in ordinary expenditure of over \$1,-000,000, and on capital account a decrease of over \$600,000.

THE BANK OF MONTREAL opened for business on Monday, 3rd November, 1817, in premises in a building belonging to the Armour Estate, situated on St. Paul Street, between St. Nicholas and St. Francis Xavier Streets, with a paid-up capital of \$350,000.

The first president was John Gray, and the first cashier was Robert Griffin. In the year 1819 the capital was increased to \$650,000, and in the following year to \$750,000. In

1829 the capital was \$850,000; in 1841, \$2,000,000; in 1845, \$3,000,000; in 1855, \$4,000,000; in 1860, \$6,000,000; in 1873, \$12.000,000, at which it now stands.

In the first full year (1819) of the Bank's operations, a dividend was paid at the rate of 8 per cent. per annum, and since then (with the exceptions of the years 1827 and 1828, when the Bank did not pay any dividend), the annual dividends have ranged from 6 to 16 per cent. (or say a dividend of 12 per cent. with a bonus of 4 per cent.), according to the earnings. But of late years 10 per cent. per annum has been the rate paid.

After 8 per cent. had been paid as dividends in 1819, a balance of \$4,168 remained on hand, and was laid aside as a rest. From that date of small beginnings the rest has steadily grown. In 1825 it \$30,780, going down to \$12,064 in the following year, and then up again to \$107,084 two years later; W in 1830 it stood at \$31,360. Five years later it stood at \$80,660, reaching \$197,828 in 1837; in 1840 it showed \$89,480; in 1850, \$120,192; in 1860, \$740,000; in 1870, \$3,000,000; in 1880, \$5,000,000; in 1883, \$5,750,000; in 1884, \$6,000,000; and now it stands at \$7,000,000, and there are additional undivided

profits amounting to \$427,180. On the 1st January, 1858, the system of decimal currency was adopted in the Bank of Montreal, and since that date all monetary transactions have been recorded in the Bank's books in dollars and cents. Previous to that date, the Bank's books were kept in what was styled Halifax currency-

pounds, shillings and pence—the pound being of the value of \$4.00. On the 1st January, 1858, the Montreal Branch was established as a distinct and separate business from the Head Office, Mr. E. H. King being appointed as its first manager.

In the year 1862, the designation of the chief officer of the Bank was changed from Cashier to that of General Manager. Mr. David Davidson was the first General Manager.

In 1863 the Bank of Montreal was appointed Banker in Canada for the Canadian Government, and on 1st January, 1893, Mr. E. S. Clouston being General Manager at the time, it became their Financial Agent in Great Britain also.

Some Big War Loans.

Tit-Bits. One hundred and twenty millions sterling, at 61 per cent, was the biggest loan recorded in history. The announcement of the loan was made by the French government on July 26th, 1872, the sum being required to secure the speedy payment of the war indemnity at the close of the Franco-German war, and the evacuation of the provinces held by the Germans. More than double the necessary amount was offered to them by willing French lenders. Only in the previous year, 1871, the French government asked for a loan of two millards of francs (about £80,000,000 sterling), and about four milliards were subscribed for in France alone. The heaviest borrowings by any British Government took place between 1803 and 1815, to meet expenditure of wars waged by Napoleon against this country. During that period £388,000,000 were borrowed, and the loans of the four last years were: 1812, £40,250,869: in 1813, £54,026,822; in 1814, £47,159,697 and in 1815, £46,089,603. The largest British loan at one time during that period was 26,000,000 pounds, and therefore the 30,000,-000 loan in respect of the South African War is a record both in the amount borrowed and in the amount offered—namely, 330,000,000 pounds or eleven times the amount required.






