MEMBERS of a government should devote their entire time to the duties for which they are paid by the people. If their salaries are not sufficiently large to maintain them in the style in which they lived while in private life, then let their salaries be increased. No man having a responsible portfolio in a government should be permitted to devote any part of his time to carrying on business as a private citizen. Subordinate officials are not allowed to do so, and the heads of departments should set their subordinates an example. The charge is made that ministers neglect the public business in order to attend to their private undertakings, and it is often insinuated that in cases where their private interests conflict with their public duties, the interests of the public are nearly always sacrificed. The members of the present government of British Columbia are no more blameable in this connection than their predecessors; but, then, they should be above blame.

ALDERMAN FLETCHER stated on Monday night at a meeting of the city council that the old council saddled the present council with \$15,000 indebtedness. Alderman Fletcher misstates facts, and no one is better aware of it than alderman Fletcher.

ALDERMAN BEER wants the city to spend \$15,000 on a city building. It is strange how liberal alderman Beer is with money that is not his own.

THE report of the minister of mines for the year 1898 is the most complete that has yet been printed. The reports of the different districts are concisely worded, and the data arranged so as to be readily found. A feature is the illustrations, forty-one being printed, ranging from views in and out of mines, smelters, mills and electric power houses to scenes of nature like mountain divides, waterfalls and canyons. Some of them are worthy of preservation; in fact the report is worth preserving for the illustrations alone. According to the report the total production of minerals in the province has been \$123,417,320, of which \$56,000,000 was gold and \$40,000,000 coal. The production for 1898 is placed at \$10,006,861. The following are the officers of the department: Hon. J. Fred Hume, minister of mines, Victoria; M. Richardson, secretary of the department,

Victoria; W. F. Robertson, mineralogist, Victoria; H. Carmichael, assayer, Victoria; Thomas Morgan, inspector of coal mines, Nanaimo; and James McGregor, inspector of metalliferous mines, Nelson.

JUDGING from the notices sent out by the assessor, every lot in Nelson is assessed for more than it could be sold for under the hammer. This is in keeping with the "swelling" that has marked all the actions of a majority of the present city council.

THE Miner is the Hansard of the city council. Members, like the chairman of the public works committee, write out their speeches and hand them in to the Miner, then trust to providence that the meeting will not be postponed. The speeches delivered and the speeches printed are widely at variance.

Two weeks ago, W. J. Devitt, Trail's provincial constable, accomplished the extradition of J. H. Sinclair, which proved to be the first successful extradition in this district out of nine cases. Yesterday he saved the province the heavy expense of a similar action by chasing on foot, for a distance of twelve miles, a man who was heading for the international line, after having committed robbery with violence. He realized that it was too serious a violation of Canadian law to let go unpunished, and although he had to walk for a distance of twenty-four miles over a trail so bad as to be impassable for a horse, he felt that the capture of the criminal fully compensated for the hard trip.

IRISH COUNTY COUNCILS.

The new County Councils bill gave the Irish counties 670 councillors, and the last-received old country papers give the result of the elections in 649 cases. They are as follows:

Home rule has scored a majority in every one of the four provinces of the island, Ulster not excepted. The only counties in which the Unionists have a majority are Antrim, Londonderry, Down and Armagh. In Tyrone and Fermanagh the two parties are equally divided, while in most of the other counties the Nationalist majorities are large. In Cork, Clare, Mayo, Sligo, Leitrim, Meath, South Tipperary and Cavan no Unionists were elected. In Longford, one of whose divisions Mr. Blake represents in parliament, one Unionist and fifteen Nationalists were elected.

Writing of the event to the London Chronicle, Michael Davitt declares that the Nationalists were practically challenged to show their strength, and they did so. The election, moreover, he says, disposes of the statement that the strength of home rule lay in intimidation by the league and the active sympathy and encouragement of the priesthood. In the election that has just closed he points out that Messrs. Redmond and Healy made an appeal for "toleration," an appeal, namely, that the electors should not vote against candidates just because they were Unionists. The priesthood to a large extent adopted this view and incited it among their parishioners. Mr. Davitt points out that the "toleration" policy was made impossible by reason of the announcement which was made in some quarters that the County Councils bill would kill home rule. Had the toleration principle been adopted the result would have been blazoned by the opponents of home rule as an indication that the agitation was dead or dying. The electors have taken it out of the mouths of their political opponents to say that.

The dream of an Irish parliament has become fixed in the minds of the masses of the island, and the county councils, it will be found, are simple a long step in that direction. If those who oppose the realization of that dream will look into history and find any instance under even moderately free institutions in which an idea so fixed in the mind of a whole people has ever finally failed of being triumphant they may comfort themselves with the precedent, but it will, we think, be very difficult to find. Otherwise all reports write in saying that the state of Ireland is improved. The process by which the land is passing into the hands of those who cultivate it cannot but be a mighty influence for peace and order. Every landowner, no matter how small his interest, becomes a hostage for tranquility, and a great many hostages of this kind have been secured since Lord Ashburton's act first became law. We may be sure, therefore, that the elements which seek to attain home rule by disorder will become less and less influential continually, and we believe that the final goal will be reached more quickly by a steady, orderly, constitutional agitation than by some of the methods which were employed in the past.

A Chapter in a Village Romance.

The death of Lieutenant Lester F. Sisson, of the First Nebraska regiment, at Manila, and the finding of his fiancée's photo near his heart, where the fatal bullet entered, is the final chapter of a pretty romance, whose introduction was written in a Nebraska village several years ago. The photo is a likeness of Miss Anna Taylor, one of the belles of Columbus, and youngest daughter of John F. Taylor, wholesale lumber merchant, and a distinguished citizen of Nebraska. Today the young girl is inconsolable, and her grief is pathetic to witness. When the sweethearts parted, Lieutenant Sisson carried a circular photograph of the girl, hung by a ribbon from his neck, worn under his vest, and laughingly remarked, the day he sailed for the war, that he would wear the photo on the left side, and if a bullet

took his life from that direction it must first pass through the likeness of the girl he loved best.

BY-PRODUCTS OF MEAT PACKERS.

The great Chicago packing houses get a great deal more money for the by-products incidental to the killing of a steer than the meat sells for. On the average the meat and its compounds bring \$40, while the by-products bring in at wholesale \$55. The latter sum is roughly made up as follows: Hide, horns, hoofs and hair, \$25; fats, blood, sinews and bones, \$15; miscellaneous other wastes \$15. It is only in the large and well-appointed slaughter houses that the full value of the animals dealt with can be realized, and these become factories for a great many products, besides finding the proper and most profitable markets for each of the raw products into which they separate the animals. Nothing is allowed to go to waste, and ten years ago one of the largest butchers in this city declared that the Chicago packers were paying the entire cost of slaughtering cattle out of what the butchers here were paying to have carted away. Hides, horns, hoofs and hair have had their markets for many years and their value increases steadily. This is particularly true of horns, for the practice of dehorning cattle has become so general that in one great Chicago packing house it was found during a two-year count that the returns only showed one horn to every three bullocks. Horns are now worth about \$150 a ton. The hides go to the tanner, the hair for mixing in mortar. The tails don't go with the hides. Down at the tip is some long hair, and this is sold to be turned into curled hair for up-holstering. If the hoofs are pure white they have

a peculiar value. They are sent to China for jewelry making. Those which are striped, black or damaged go into the kettle to be boiled for glue and the residue made into hoof meal, a valuable fertilizer. In fact, everything which is not used for other purposes is at last turned into some form of fertilizer, even to the tankage water in which the course of the refuse is boiled to extract its fats. The coarse bones are either carbonized and sold for sugar refiners' use or turned into fertilizers, and the blood is mostly dried and turned into another aid to agriculture. Some of the blood is sold in liquid form to sugar refiners, but not a great deal. The white bones suitable for knife handles and such purposes bring from \$70 to \$80 a ton and go mostly to Germany.

The main parts of the animal as they are sent to market are all carefully trimmed, but there is no piece of good meat but has its market. Tongues and tails are regular articles of commerce, and even the meat from the cheeks is added to the supply for sausages and the lips are cut off and pickled. Each character of fat is separated from the others and finally these are marketed in the various forms of neat's foot oil, oleo oil, tallow and stearine and oleomargarine. Before the horns are sold the pith is extracted from them and the finest grade of gelatine is obtained from the pith. The sinews are all separated to be used for glue stock, the bladders are sold for holding snuff and the greater part of the

intestines are used for sausage casings. Parts of these have, however, a special use and value, and are sold separately to be made up into goldbeater's skins. The lining of the windpipe is also of particular value, being used for a fancy sausage casing and also as a lining for pipes through which beer is passed in breweries. Beef extract, pepsin and many other things are made in some of the big gest houses.

A new use has recently been discovered for the contents of the paunch, which until lately had to be thrown away. It has been discovered that a good quality of cardboard can be made of it and it is now being saved for that purpose. Of course, the large receipts from these by-products are not all profit, but there is a manufacturer's profit made out of each one of them which aggregates a handsome sum, and all of this helps to keep down the price of the fresh meats to the consumer.

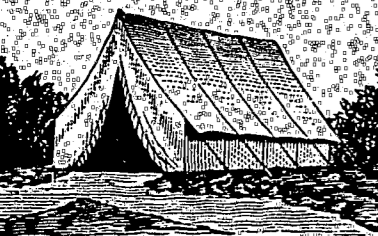

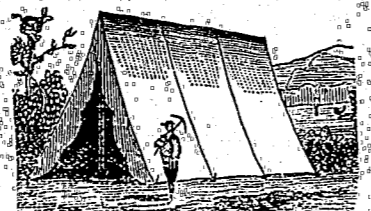

LOCAL NEWS AND GOSSIP.

A miners' union has been formed by the miners employed at the Silver King mine. It is understood that 120 of the miners have become members of the organization.

The price of Exchequer stock has advanced again, some transactions having taken place yesterday at thirteen cents. The advance is supposed to have been caused by the improved appearance of the drift from the main tunnel. In the breast of the drift the ledge is now four feet eight inches, and the values indicate that the ore chute upon which the shaft has been sunk is being entered.

The trial run of the 250-ton blast furnace at the Hall Mines smelter has proved satisfactory, and the furnace was blown out last night.

The first four cars of coke from the Crow's Nest Coal Company's coke ovens which were consigned to the Le Roi Company's smelter at Northport were entered in the customs as having a value of \$360.

The McLean brothers, who have been contracting on the Robson-Penticton road, have returned the bulk of their grading outfit to Spokane. It was valued at \$1563.

H. W. C. Jackson, secretary of the Rossland Board of Trade, writes to the secretary of the South Kootenay board that so far none but favorable replies have been received upon the subject of the joint conference of all the boards of trade throughout Kootenay. So soon as a date that will be convenient for all can be decided upon for the holding of the conference, it will be announced.

During the month of April the value of the dutiable goods imported through the port of Nelson was \$32,745. The revenue of the port for the month was \$9743.74.

C. W. Riley, foreman at the Athabasca mine, left yesterday evening for Grenfell, Manitoba, where he will remain for a month.

Paul Johnson is at Daulton, California, building a copper smelter. He will be in British Columbia in five weeks to build and manage a smelter for the British Columbia Copper Company, Limited.

Martin O'Reilly, did not go east on Monday evening, as announced exclusively in THE TRIBUNE. He remained in Nelson to decorate the windows in his store in a unique and artistic manner.

The owners of Gray's mills, have secured the registration of their company, and from this time on the business will be run by the Nelson Saw & Planing Mills Company, Limited. The officers will be chosen as soon as the certificate of incorporation is received.

The steamer Kokanee, which has been on the ways at Kaslo undergoing repairs to her hull, will be brought to Nelson on Thursday and receive the finishing touches in the local shipyard.

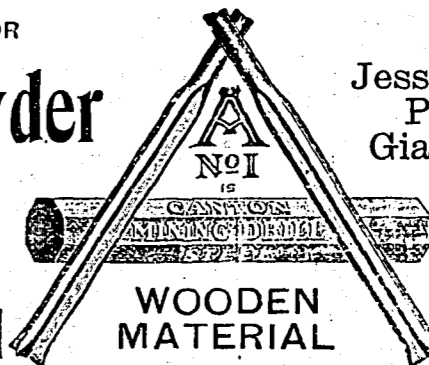
