SLOCAN LAKE MINES SHIPPING ORE

NO IDLE MEN AT SILVERTON.

SILVERTON, July 13.—Today two more carloads of Noonday ore were sent to the Trail smelter. This brings the ore shipments for this week from this point up to 110 tons.

Yesterday a carload of ore was taken from the Bosun mine at New Denver.

A good strike of ore was made on Tuesday on the Torpedo claim, lying near the Vancouver. The owners are preparing to at once develop it.

The Wakefield management wished to put twelve more men at work around their mine on Wednesday. Only six could be found around town.

The Noonday keeps adding to its force, having now forty-five men on their pay roll. Beginning next week they expect to send out a carload a day. It is breaking all records as an ore producer.

Purchasing Newfoundland Ore. PHILADELPHIA, July 13.—The announcement has been made in ship circles that thousands of tons of iron ore have been purchased in Newfoundland by local capitalists for shipment to this port, to be manufactured into steel, and that already a schooner with a sample cargo of iron ore is now bound for Philadelphia from Newfoundland.

The Bill Got Through Committee. LONDON, July 14.—The house of commons in committee had an all-night session last night over the tithes rent charge rating bill, the second reading of which was carried on June 29th by a majority of 314 against 136.

Maccabees Used Him Rough. JAMESTOWN, New York, July 13.—Roy Terry is at the Jamestown hospital in a serious condition the result, it is alleged, of injuries received while being initiated into the Maccabees. Terry has placed the matter in the hands of an attorney and demands financial satisfaction for his injuries.

Germany's Exports Decreasing. BERLIN, July 13.—Germany's exports to the United States for the quarter ending June 30th last were \$21,000,000, as compared with \$24,500,000 for the corresponding quarter last year.

Big British American Company Formed.

NEW YORK, July 13.—The Tribune tomorrow will publish the following: A business alliance of American and English capitalists has been recently formed which is of unusual interest and importance because of the leading positions held by the members on both sides of the Atlantic, because of the many millions of dollars involved in it, because the United States government is about to be asked to give the compact official sanction and moral support, because England has already approved of it, and because the field of operations of the alliance is beyond the jurisdiction of both nations.

Lively Times in Cape Colony.

CAPE TOWN, July 13.—The cape parliament will open tomorrow and some exciting scenes are anticipated owing to the attitude of premier Schreiner on the Transvaal question. A large number of the opposition members are in favor of the premier's impeachment.

Victoria Notes.

VICTORIA, July 14.—The Australian liner Aurangi, from Sydney 20th of June, and Honolulu, 6th of July, arrived this evening well filled with passengers and a large general cargo. The trip was uneventful. The two other ships of the line were sighted on their way to Australia, the Mowena on the 23rd of June and the Wairimu near midnight of 6th of July.

Another Brush With Filipinos.

MANILA, July 13.—On Tuesday the United States troops had an engagement at Mantapula on the south shore of the lake. They found 500 insurgents entrenched near the shore. The Napedian shelled the rebels and a party of American troops, numbering 135, landed and drove them by a sharp running fight to the hills, where they were too strongly entrenched for a small force to attack them.

The French Shore Difficulty.

ST. JOHN'S, Newfoundland, July 13.—Another evidence of the determination of the British to force a settlement of the French Shore question was afforded by the action of the colonial legislature last night in passing a bill granting mining leases along the shore. Mr. Morine, minister of finance, in moving the reading of the bill said he expected within a few months that all restrictions upon mining operations along the coast would be removed by the action of the British government.

A Brantford Tragedy.

BRANTFORD, Ontario, July 13.—James O'Reilly, cigarmaker, aged 34, drove into the country on a spree with Thos. Cunningham early this morning. His horse was captured near town with O'Reilly's lifeless body entangled in the reins. It was dragged for over a mile. Cunningham told contradictory stories and an inquest has been ordered.

Police Man the Trolley Cars.

LONDON, July 13.—Trolley cars manned by police are running today. A. Howay a prominent citizen, was committed for trial today on the charge of breaking car windows. Summons are issued for a large number of rioters.

VOLUNTEER LOSS WAS HEAVY

Climate Their Worst Enemy.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 13.—Advices received by the transport New York from Manila, dated June 11th, are as follows: The volunteers are greatly debilitated in consequence of their hard campaigning through three months of tropical weather. Since the middle of May no volunteer regiment has had a sick list of less than 20 per cent. Most of them at present have 25 per cent ill, and a few of the regiments have less than one-third of their men on duty.

The morning after the Washington troops took Morong, a week ago, only 203 men responded to the roll call. The Washington men have been engaged since March 12th preventing the insurgents of the north and south from forming a junction on Laguna bay, and they engaged at the same time with the enemy in opposite directions. Twenty-four of the Nebraska regiments officers are on the sick list and the Montana, Washington and South Dakota regiments show twenty or more officers in hospitals or sick in their quarters.

Of the regiments that have borne the brunt of the fighting their losses in killed and wounded range from 160 in the Montana regiment to 280 in the Nebraska. The loss of the Kansas regiment is second to that of Nebraska, while the Washington and South Dakota regiments follow closely, each with losses of about 200. The Oregon regiment also suffered severely. Of the regulars the third artillery is the heaviest loser, its killed and wounded numbering 123.

The Mouthings of a Vaporing Romancer.

P. A. O'Farrell, a vaporing romancer, writes as follows to the Roseland Miner: "The silver-lead mines of the Kootenays are no longer hives of industry, affording good wages to the toiler, good dividends to the capitalists and freight and revenue to railroads. There is gloom and poverty in a thousand homes where a year ago was comfort, happiness and money. Millions have been spent building railroads to the silver-lead districts. Millions have been spent opening up and developing these mines, and the eight-hour law has locked up in the mountains of the Kootenays all the treasure which those millions were spent to exploit and recover. All the enterprise and opportunity and business and trade which has been built up in this country by ten years of unremitting toil and labor, is suddenly paralyzed by a law fathered by the present government. Nobody in the Kootenays demanded an eight-hour law except, perhaps the gambler of the bunch man, who hankered for greater opportunity to fleece the working miner. In Roseland, where there are great machinery plants and shaft mines, an eight-hour shift has become a necessity. In the Slocan such a law was undesirable, unnecessary and vicious. The passage of such an act stamps those responsible for it as utterly unfit to shape the destiny of the province. It has paralyzed industry and brought grief and suffering and disappointment into thousands of happy homes. It is incomprehensible to the people of the Kootenays that Mr. Seftin or Mr. Cotton should have ever permitted the enactment of such a law; and the only way that they can redeem themselves before the country is to proceed immediately to its repeal."

Trying to Beat Out the Bylaw.

Although the city council is supposed to be opposing the breach of the fire limits bylaw which is being made by the erection of the addition to the Broken Hill block, the building is being rapidly completed and the chances are that when it is up it will stay up. The first move of the acting city solicitor in the matter was to commence proceedings against the owners of the block for not furnishing lines and levels of the new building. S. S. Taylor, Q. C., who is handling the case for the owners of the block took objection to the summons issued on the ground that the erection now under way is not a new building but merely an addition to the present one. In view of this objection the acting city solicitor was not ready to proceed with the case and an adjournment was asked for until Monday next. In granting the adjournment the magistrate said that he was ready to hear the case at once, but that he could not interfere with such arrangements as the counsel on either side might make.

Texada Iron Mine Sold.

VICTORIA, July 13.—It is reported that J. D. Rockefeller has purchased the Texada iron mines, the consideration being in the neighborhood of \$125,000. Six years ago an offer was made to buy the mines and \$250,000 was asked for the property. That was at a time when an iron foundry was taking a portion of the output and Northwest prices were much higher than at present. The Texada iron mines are the best in the west. The quality of the ore is excellent and the mines are within two hundred feet of tide water. Steamers which would carry away the product could lie at that distance and load with the raw product.

THE Rossland Miner, as is well known, is owned by F. Augustus Heinze of Butte, Montana, who came to British Columbia in 1895 with a shoestring and departed with a grip sack full of good Canadian money in 1898. It is also well known that the late Turner government was very kind to Mr. Heinze. All Mr. Heinze asked for in the way of land and subsidies and water rights and timber limits, he received. And F. Augustus, being a shrewd young man, was not at all bashful when it came to asking. The Miner, therefore, never loses an opportunity to praise the benefactors of its owner; likewise, it never overlooks a chance to rib-roast the men who turned its owner's benefactors out of office. In a recent issue it published a letter from E. A. O'Farrell, who is either fulsome in his flattery or rancorous in his abuse, in which the Soulin government is berated for its treatment of aliens like James Cronin, John H. Finch, D. C. Corbin, F. A. Heinze, Oliver Durant, William Hennessy, and others. If British Columbia owes any of these generous gentlemen anything it shall be paid them, and Pat O'Farrell will be hired to write them to that effect.

WHAT a farce the law is, to be sure. The City of Nelson has a city solicitor who receives a salary of one thousand dollars a year. At present he is indisposed, and the city's legal business is looked after by the city solicitor's law partner. The law partner, before becoming acting city solicitor, advised a client how to evade one of the city's by-laws. After becoming acting city solicitor he is called on by the city to prosecute the same client for doing what he advised him to do before becoming acting city solicitor. It is needless to say the interests of the city have not been very vigorously defended so far.

In the by laws recently revised at an expense of several hundred dollars are to be broken at will by our best citizens, the city can be saved several hundred dollars by the cancellation of the order for their publication in book form.

More than one hundred thousand dollars will be expended this year for buildings within the fire limits. Had there been no fire limits less than half as much would have been expended.

The fire limits by law is to be repealed. This is because it is working a hardship on some of our best citizens. A law that works a hardship on a good citizen should always be repealed. Laws are only made to be enforced against bad people, like Chinese who run wash-houses and laboring men who drink whisky.

This cause must be weak when coarse abuse is resorted to instead of argument.

Emperor William has elevated Herr von Bulow, minister of foreign affairs, to the rank and title of count. His elevation is a recognition of his services in securing the Barolone islands for Germany.

According to the Chicago Times-Herald a New York Chinaman has been sued by his wife's dressmaker. This disposes of the old theory that Chinamen are incapable of partaking of western civilization.

The Montreal girl who is suing her septuagenarian uncle for breach of promise wrote him a loving letter a few months ago asking him for a lock of his dear hair. Now she wants his scalp, says the Toronto Globe.

It has been definitely decided that the young duke of Albany, grandson of queen Victoria, is to succeed to the throne of the grand-duchy of Saxe-Coburg and Gotha, on the abdication of the duke of Edinburgh and the renunciation of the duke of Connaught.

The Gaulois of Paris publishes an insulting letter addressed to president Loubet by lieutenant Arnal, in which the writer says: "I hate you because you harm France. Twice have I blushed with shame at having to carry a sword and being obliged to salute you." The Gaulois asserts that a hundred other officers are following Arnal's example.

The Chicago Times-Herald's statement that the Republican campaign fund in 1890 was \$2,000,000 invests with some interest the fact that James Buchanan was elected president on an expenditure of \$23,000. The authority for the Buchanan figure is colonel James G. Berret, of Washington, who was a member of the Democratic committee charged with the expenditure of money.

Professor Benjamin Ide Wheeler of Cornell university, who has been elected president of the California state university, although still a comparatively young man, has gained much fame as a philologist. His speciality is Greek, and he served for several years as instructor in the classical school at Athens before going to Cornell. A recent history of Alexander the Great, written by him, has attracted much attention.

Dr. Daniel Folkmar, formerly lecturer in zoology at the university of Chicago, has been appointed as professor of anthropology at the new university of Brussels, Belgium, being one of few native Americans who have held a foreign professorship. He has also just received the title of doctor of social sciences from the university. His thesis, a large volume on "Philosophical Anthropology," will shortly be published in both French and English.

George Wray, aged one hundred and three years, secured a divorce in Columbus, Indiana, on June 22nd, from Susan E. Wray, aged thirty. He had been married four times, outliving three wives. He said that his last wife came to him and offered to take care of him if he would marry her, but that she had robbed him of over one thousand dollars in gold since they were married, eight years ago. He is the progenitor of a great part of the Wray family in southern Indiana, having several great-great-grandchildren.

Captain William A. Andrews started from Atlantic City on the 18th ultimo, to cross the ocean in a little sloop-rigged boat, twelve feet long, five feet wide, and twenty-two inches deep. He carries provisions for two months, and expects to reach the Azores in forty days. He has made the voyage before in a boat not much larger than the one which now bears him. On the same day, Howard Blackburn sailed from Gloucester for England by way of the Newfoundland coast and the Irish channel in a boat thirty feet long.

Professor Axenfeld of Perugia has discovered that three-fifths of all men of distinction are first-born children; the other two-fifths are either second or third children, or else the youngest of very large families. Among the first, he points out Luther, Dante, Rafael, Leonardo da Vinci, Confucius, Heine, Schopenhauer, Goethe, Ariosto, Mohammed, Shelley, Aramis, Milton, Byron, Moliere;

She has also exhibited paintings in the Salon. Her portrait is the last one ever painted of Miss Bonheur, and is said to be one of the best ever executed.

American Revolution, on November 14th, 1802, his brother Charles, president of the National Life Insurance Company, and a resident of Montpelier, being admitted at the same time. William Turbox Dewey, son of Charles, became a member on November 9th, 1896. Recently the admiral received the compliment of an election as life member of the New York Sons of the Revolution (in lieu of honorary membership, for which that society has no provision), and is now entitled to wear the badge of both organizations.

One of the main features of the Rough Riders' reunion at Las Vegas, New Mexico, was the presentation to governor Roosevelt of a solid gold medal. It is pendant from a bar by gold chains, V-shaped, with the ends attached to the bar and joined to the medal at the centre. On the bar is the inscription, "Colonel Theodore Roosevelt." Between the bar and the medal the coat-of-arms of New Mexico is engraved. On the medal proper are crossed sabres, and above them is the monogram "R. R. R." Below the sabres, is the following: "Presented by the citizens of New Mexico; Las Vegas, N. M., June 24th, 1899." On the circular edge of the medal are the words "San Juan," "Las Guasimas," "Santiago." In the centre, just below the crossed sabres, is a diamond.

Japs Are Not Inferior.

The decision of the federal government to veto any hostile legislation against the Japanese on the part of the British Columbia legislature is an eminently wise course to take. Misery Makes Queer Bedfellows.
A. J. Marks is back from the Sloam, where he went intending to put a force of men on the California. He could not find miners willing to work for \$3 a day, and now he says he will not only not start work on any of his properties until the eight-hour law is repealed, but he will go to the board of trade meeting on Tuesday and vote with his friends Crossdale, Robertson and Fletcher to down the men who are opposed to making the board of trade an adjunct of the Mine Owners' Protective Association.

NELSON.
It is rumored that the president of the board of trade, now that he has become managing editor of the Miner, is to be knighted.

All indications point to the conclusion that the counsel for the defense in the case of Felix Pasto have given up their attempt of trying to save the prisoner's neck. Recently the prisoner received a communication from a relative at Cranbrook in which he was informed that there was no hope and that he should prepare for death. Pasto was sentenced at the last assize to hang on August 10th for the murder of a man named Edward Ryan. The killing took place at Cranbrook on the evening of March 27th.

The survey for the wagon road from Busk's Landing to the Molly Gibson mine has been begun, and the work of construction will start on its completion. Bruce White goes up today to see what progress is being made.

J. M. McGregor, inspector of mines, passed through Nelson yesterday on his way to Fernie, where he has been instructed to inspect the Crow's Nest coal mines.

F. S. Whitney, general passenger agent for the Great Northern railway came into Nelson yesterday on his private car, accompanied by several members of his family. He said he was only on a pleasure trip and declined to be interviewed.

Alex. Stewart sold yesterday lots 7 and 8 in block 3, addition A, to Thomas Raymond for \$250. It is the intention of the purchaser to build two cottages on the lots.

The annual report of the Hudson's Bay Company is an exceptionally favorable one. It shows a net profit for the year

ending May 31st of £125,595. 9s. 11d as against £69,373. 7s. 9d for the previous year. To this the sum of £26,372. 9s. 10d brought forward from last year must be added. The committee recommended a dividend of 15s a share and a bonus of 7s, amounting in all to £100,000. A sum of £10,000 will be set aside towards the formation of a provident fund for the company's employees, leaving a balance of £11,968. 9s. 9d to be carried forward.

Fresh proceedings are to be taken against the Giant Powder Company for maintaining a magazine within two miles of the city. The former proceedings were dropped on the ground of insufficient service.

The Nelson gas and coke company received word yesterday that the first car load of pipe has been shipped from Toronto. Negotiations are still dragging.

The subjects recommended included consideration of the land duties and the effect upon the mining industry of the eight-hour law. Nelson, July 12th, 1899.

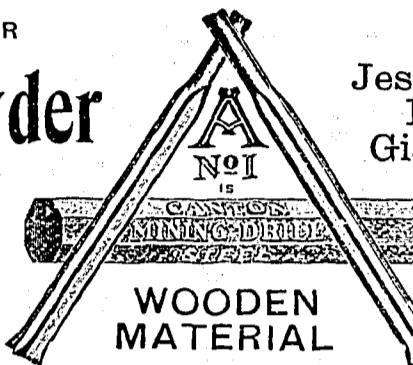
