A mining deal was closed here claims. Since then development yesterday whereby J. H. and J. L. Vanstone of Nelson acquired a lease and bond on the Fourth of July group, a well-known Coffee creek property owned by James Fitzpatrick of Ainsworth. The Fourth of July lies 31 miles south of Ainsworth and has about 1500 feet of workings upon it. The ore is almost a dry product, carrying excellent values. A considerable tonuage of ore is now ready for stoping. The Messrs. Vanstone will place a gang of mon at the mine on Monday, and J. H. Vanstone will be in charge as manager. The lesees intention is to ship consider-. able ore from the property this winter and develop extensively next summer, their bond covering a period of two years. The Fourth of July was originally staked ten years ago, and the man who staked it sold the claim for enough to take him back East, where he bought a farm and settled down.

Republic Ore Assayed.

Joe Duhamel, owner of the Republic claim on Forty-nine creek, is the authority for the statement that a sample of ore taken, across the face of the wide ledge on his claim went \$12.20 in gold. A fraction adjoining the Republic has been added to the claim. Duhamel leaves this morning with several men to recommence work on the property. On the Paradise, adjoining the Republic, John Miles is working steadily. The tunnel is in about forty feet on the vein. The ore encountered is thirty inches in width, estimated to average close to \$40.

A Morning Mountain Strike.

A rich strike is reported from the Royston group on Morning mountain. It is stated that two feet of fine ore was struck yesterday, from which an assay of \$240 was had. The group is owned and operated by the Royston Gold Mines, Limited, of Nelson, which was formed a few months ago to take over the John W. Moore.

COOD NEWS IN FRAGMENTS

BUT THE MISSING FRAGMENTS ARE NECESSARY

Before the Average Newspaper Reader Can Understand What It

Is all About.

The Associated Press sometimes sends news in fragments. The first fragment regarding the following was lost at Vancouver or in transmission between Vancouver and Nelson. The fragment that got through reads as follows: "Marseilles. (Add Bulletin.) The attachment of the line was due to the heroic efforts of twenty-five fishermen, who attempted what appeared to be a foolhardy task. Their flatbottomed craft was tossed about like a straw on the waves. Several times it appeared as though the small craft was lost, but it finally got into a current which carried it to the starboard side of the Russie's bow. A line was then thrown on board the wreck. The captain of the Russie, standing on the bridge, shouted: We have not lost heart, and have confidence in you; but be quick!' A moment later amid great excitement, among the spectator ashore, the line was seen to part. The fishermen then got a line on board of the stranded vessel. They then returned to the beach, where hundreds of willing hands pulled their boat high and dry. Later the line again parted, causing much anxiety, as the sea was becoming rougher. Then the same fishermen made anether attempt to reach the Russie in their flat-bottomed boat. On the first attempt they were capsized into the surf and the men were thrown back on the beach. They made a fresh effort with a few new comrades, and the same crew again succeeded in getting a line on board the Russie. This time its security was ensured by a line being attached to several rafts between the wreck and the shore."

Has Withdrawn the Proposal.

WASHINGTON, January 10.-As some of the foreign powers do not look with favor upon the proposition of the United States recently made as to the withdrawal of certain features of the negotiations from Pekin to Washington or some other capital, and other powers hesitate to decide the question, the president has deemed it advisable to withdraw the proposal, and has directed the representatives of the United States abroad to so inform the different governments.

INTERESTS WERE CLASHING

AND THE POWERS DID NOT LIKE THE PROPOSAL.

Of the United States to Shift the Seat of Negotiations From

- Pekin.

Paris, January 10 .- As the result of inquiries in authoritative quarters, the Associated Press is given the following statement in regard to the Chinese situation: "The Chinese plenipotentaries signed the joint note yesterday, thus conclud. ing the preliminary stage of the negotiations." It was added that this important step was insignificant compared with the difficulties to be met with between the powers

themselves, whose clashing interests will have full play in the coming discussions. The United States' proposal to shift the seat of negotiations finds no favor in the European chancellories. The reasons are given for this opposition:

First.—It is considered a great mistake to transfer the negotiations from China, where all the information is at hand respecting the situation, and the feeling among the Chinese themselves, and more especially regarding the conditions of trade and commerce at which the negotiations will be chiefly con-

Second.—The United States commerce with China is comparatively small when compared with that of several other countries, therefore the United States is not entitled to expect the negotiations to be carried on at Washington.

The third and most delicate reason advanced is that the European powers have not felt sufficient confidence that the United States government might not find itself influenced in the negotiations at Washington by the pressure of interests having an eye to the exploitations of China.

The attitude of some of the powers, moreover, is swayed by other motives in opposing the United States proposal. Great Britain, for example, which seems to be the most strongly antagonistic, has probably taken into consideration the United States attitude towards the Clayton-Bulwer treaty. The feeling here favors Shang-Hai, if any change is made, as it is pointed out that Shang-Hai is the most important trade center in China, and moreover that the southern viceroys, who are favorable to foreigners and anxious to further trade, could make their influence felt. Failing Shang-Hai, Berlin or Paris are likely to be chosen. The enormous British interests are in favor of the choice of London, but it is improbable that the other powers will agree to this.

There is no reason to suppose that Russia will withdraw from the joint negotiations. The treaty she has concluded with China concerns her special interests in regions contiguous to her territories, but she has great political interests to defend and further in the joint conference, which will bristle with obstacles to a speedy settlement. Russia aims chiefly at a wide expansion of her political influence; Great Britain wants to open the Chinese empire to her commerce, and at the same time strengthen her political foothold; the United States, apparently, will be devoted to securing commercial advantages; while France and Germany will desire to increase their trade generally and their political influence in certain provinces. The struggle between these conflicting designs will be bitter, and, in any case, will greatly protract the negotiations. One thing which Great Britain and the United States wish secured is the raising of the prohibition which now exists against foreigners acquiring landed interests.

Impossible of Acceptance.

SHANG-HAI, January 10.-A dispatch from Sian Fu (where the Chinese court is located) to a native newspaper says: "Some of the clauses of the conditions for peace are impossible of acceptance, consequently the emperor and empress have telegraphed Liu Kun Yi, the viceroy of Nankin, and Chang Hi Tung, the viceroy of Mankow, to proceed immediately to Pekin and confer with the foreign ministers and Chinese commissioners in an monia,

attempt to secure a moderation of the obstructive conditions. They have been instructed if they are unable to proceed to Pekin, to propose a suitable meeting place for the ministers elsewhere.

Another Report.

BERLIN, January 10.-A special dispatch from Pekin to the Lokal Anzeiger late this evening says: The Chinese court has abandoned its objections to the joint demands of the powers, and it is believed that prince Ching and Li Hung Chang will sign the joint note in a few days. It is reported that a telegraphic authorization will reach them from Sian Fu to use the imperial seal, which is under guard at Pekin."

BRITISH BECOME IMPATIENT

AT SUCCESS OF BOER RAIDERS IN SOUTH AFRICA.

They Carry Off Cattle and Stores With in Sight of British Garrisons With Impunity.

London, January 11.—The situation in South Africa grows worse rather than better. Lord Kitchener's dispatches are more laconic than those of lord Roberts, and little else of importance is allowed to come through. The Times, in an editorial today, finds comfort in the thought that the process of attrition is doing its work, and must shortly turn to the inevitable result. In many quarters, however, there is less satisfaction with the position of affairs, which has practically necessitated the formation of local guards for Cape Town.

No steps have been taken to comply with lord Kitchener's demands for reinforcements.

Lord Coleridge, in a letter excusing his non-attendance at a political meeting, says: "I loathe and detest this war, and the policy which brought it about, the mode in which it is conducted, and the undignified excitement over the defeat of a handful of persons defending their country at the hands of enemies, and numbers of trained soldiers backed by the wealth of England."

This morning's dispatch reports that a small party of Boers carried off cattle close to the east fort in Pretoria. Nine hundred Boers under commandant Kreitzinger are 15 miles from Richmond. Rumors are spreading at Porterville that former rebels have joined the Boers in the Calvin district. The_military_commissioner_o

Germans Have Their Innings.

BERLIN, January 9.—The war office has received the following dispatch from count von Waldersee: "Pekin, January 9.—The fortress of No Pu. which was stormed January 3rd, was the headquarters of the newly organized bands of Boxers. Over 1000 had mobilized in the district, and they were planning to march on Yen King and Chau Ping.'

Wiring from Pekin under date of January 6th, count von Waldersee says: "Colonel Panet's column is marching to Tsu Sang, on the Pei Hei Ho, to co-operate with colonel Madais' column from Yen Sing, 72 kilometres northwest of Pekin. Colonel Panet, after extremely severe marches, over by-paths and through high mountains, stormed the place January 3rd. It was defended by ten guns, and from six hundred to one thousand men. Having protected the mines, the column is returning in extended order through Yen Sing.'

Wants Distinction Abolished.

VANCOUVER TO BE A WIDE-OPEN CITY

Townley Was Elected Mayor Yesterday by a Handsome Majority.

HAD THE UNITED SUPPORT OF THE PROGRESSIVE ELEMENT

Special to The Tribune. |-Alderman Townley was elected mayor today by a majority of 350 over alderman James McQueen. Townley led in each of the five wards in the city, his highest majority being in Ward 4, which was supposed to be McQueen's stronghold, Townley's plurality there being over a hundred. McQueen was the special candidate of the Prohibitionists, the Religious, and the Moral Reform. ers. He was pledged to prohibit gambling and to place close restrictions upon every form of vice. BIG PROJECT FOR CANADA

NEW STEEL TRUST TO DEVELOP ONTARIO'S RESOURCES.

It Will Take Advantage of the Power Possibilities of the Old Welland Canal,

London, January 10.—The negotiations toward the formation of another American iron and steel combine, which have been carried on recently in London, reached a point this evening where their culmination became practically assured. The companies intending to amalgamate are the Canadian Steel Co., the Lake Superior Power Co., the American Steel Co., the Otis Steel Co., the Pittsburg Steel Co., and the Wellman Seaver Co. of Cleveland. Combined with these, when the deal completed, will be several English firms, which will take part in the enterprise, financially and commercially. It is the intention of the projectors to erect plants at various places, with the Welland canal as an outlet. The object is to minimize expense, and acting with the English co-operators to secure markets here and elsewhere. The project may be termed an English-American-Canadian combination, to take advantage of existing opportunities. It is freely discussed in the English press. The reason for holding the meeting in London was that English capital and trade are desired. The capitalization has not been decided

The President Insists.

WASHINGTON, January 10.-The proposition submitted by the president to transfer the negotiations of the questions of indemnity and revision of commercial treaties to some other place than Pekin was designed_to_facilitate_the_conclusion of the Chinese negotiations as a whole by separating those still requiring considerable moderation from those already determined. As some of the powers do not look with favor upon this separation, and others hesitate to decide the question, the president has deemed it advisable to direct the diplomatic representatives abroad to press the proposition, and to inform the governments to which the proposition was addressed.

No Umbrage Taken.

LONDON, January 11.—There is no reason to believe that the American proposal to transfer the Pekin negotiations to Washington has given umbrage in any quarter, says the Vienna correspondent of the Times, since the suggestion does not appear to have been prompted by selfishness toward the European powers. They have had more experience of diplomacy than the United States, and know that these tend to reveal and emphasize the difference of opinion, which in the case of China they are particularly desirous of avoiding.

Boers Seem to be Successful.

As interest grows in the project for enlisting 1000 recruits in Canada for Baden-Powell's constabulary the number of applicants for vacancies increases. In Nelson about 15 likely looking men have been attracted by the prospect of active service and good pay in the new corps, and if instructions were issued to recruit here, it is probable the number would be doubled or trebled in a day or two. There is a difference of opinion as to whether or not the water rates at Nelson are fair and reasonable. THE TRIBUNE contends that the rates here are as low as present conditions warrant, and it is always willing to give any facts that are presented to sustain its contention. The following statistics, prepared by mayor Comstock of Spokane, were printed in the Chronicle of that city:

Spokane has a population of 40,000; Nelson has a population of 7000. The owner or occupant of a 4-room house, with bath-room and water closet and lawn sprinkler, in Nelson, pays \$19.50 a year for water; but if advantage is taken of the best discount given for prompt payment, he only pays \$15.60. In Spokane, for the same sized house and like conveniences the rate is \$19.50 a year. A six-room house in

advantage of, \$20.40 a year. In Spokane the rate is \$22.50. Apparently, water rates are lower in Nelson than in Spokane. The following are the rates charged in cities in the United States, all of from 100,000 upwards. The rates include one bath, one closet and fifty square yards of lawn:

The average of these nine cities is a yearly rate of \$15.60, which is exactly the Nelson rate, with the discount off, for a 4-room house and all conveniences. The average for 12-room houses in the nine cities is a yearly rate of. \$25.90. Nelson has no rate for 12-room houses; but the rate for 6-room houses and over is \$25.50, or, with the discount off, \$20.40. These figures would indicate that Nelson had better not change the existing water rates until its population increases so as to warrant a decrease.

However, despite all the scientific theories of learned doctors, it is improbable that the esearches of the new century will discover the elixir of life in salt or any other combination of elements. The laws of longevity do not seem to always conform to the theories of the medical profession. One old resident of Chicago, for instance, gives credit for having celebrated his one hundredth birthday to the fact that he has always been a good Presbyterian and used tobacco and whiskey; while an old Irish lady, who celebrated her one hundredth anniversary the other day, attributed her good physical condition to her abstinence from liquor and tobacco and her devotion to the Catholic faith. Donald Maclaren of Toronto, who hasseen the light of three centuries, says he used tobacco very treely for half a century, and during another half century refrained from it. Doctors will have to disagree on his case. In a town in Indiana lives an old Canadian who was born in St. John's 109 years ago, and who even now can dance a jig with the most supple of his neighbors. He has 47 grandchildren, 55 great-grandchildren, and the chances are he has never worried a moment of his life about microbes and always ate and drank what was set before him, asking no questions for conscience sake. 




