The Reco is owned, in the main, by its original owners. The St. Eugene has not been saleable on stock excapped by lack of working capital through over-capitalization. It is safe to say that had the nine mines named above been stocked at a fair price, and a reasonable amount of the shares been placed in the treasury to provide working capital, every one of the nine would today he/paying handsome dividends. and British Columbia would be classed as a good field in which to invest capital in mines. But, instead, the getrich-quick methods of the mining company promoters were adopted, with the result that dividends are not being paid regularly and shares in British Columbia mining companies are not looked on as good investments.

The Date of Meeting Postponed.

John Houston, M.P.P., of Nelson received word from Victoria on Thursday afternoon that the date of the meeting of the legislative assembly had been postponed from Thursday, March 12th, to Thursday, April 2nd. No reason was given for the postponement but the general opinion is that the government is afraid that it will be defeated when the house meets, and the fateful day is postponed in the hopes that something may be done to prevent defeat. The government is manipulating the Provincial Mining Association in its interest, and through that association it expects to get a lease of life for at least a year or a renewal of power if a general election is brought on. The Provincial Mining Association is a mere catepaw, and it is being used to prevent the forming of a government on party lines, as no party-line government would dare make the changes in the mining laws that are desired by the element that is engineering the Provincial Mining Association movement.

his wealth so rapidly in fifteen years, he is a pessimist and believes the United States has dark days before it, all because of labor unions. There States, for there must be something at the suit of wrong in a system that allows one man, a president of a railway company, to accumulate more wealth in fifteen years than all the thousands under him have been able to accumulate. James J. Hill has made more money in the last fifteen years than have the thirty thousand other employees of the Great Northern railway system combined, and yet when any fraction of the thirty thousand ask for a 10 per cent increase in wages they take chances of losing their jobs. There may be dark days ahead for the United States, but not darker days than were the days in 1859 and 1860, when freemen were struggling with the slave power. The slave power was smashed after thousands of lives were sacrificed. There need not be any sacrifice of lives to smash pessimists like James J. Hill. alone. Their greed will smash them.

The publisher of the Nelson Daily News says that that newspaper is not owned or controlled by the Crow's Nest Coal Company or the coal company's manager. If it is not owned and controlled by the Crow's Nest Coal Company or the coal company's manager, then why does the coal company furnish the money that is required to keep it on its financial legs, and why is it that its books are audited by employees of the coal company who take their instructions from the manager of the coal company? The Tribune knows that it takes money to run a daily newspaper in Nelson, and it knows that the Crow's Nest Coal Company crowd have spent over \$20,000 in order to crowd The Nelson Tribune to the wall. All the money that crowd can raise will never make the Nelson Daily News a newspaper acceptable to a majority of the people of southeastern British Columbia, not even to a majority of those who profess to be of the Liberal faith
